After two terms, Jackie was tired of being on the school board, and we talked about it and I decided to run for the school board, was elected in April of 91. been in office just over a year.

So away I had to voluntary sign that away, be able to walk away with an honorable discharge. And I don't know if you people understand what a dishonorable discharge is. It's not it's not just a piece of paper, you walk out and say, oh, there's a slap on the wrist. This follows you. It's part of your record, your federal and government record the FBI record, it's part of records that employers can get bankers, people that you want to borrow money from. This is really ugly thing and it follows you for the rest of your life. It does not stop it follows you the rest of your life. Anybody who wants to access the records that that are you in our computer age, will find out that you were removed from the service under less than honorable conditions. And if they push that they can find out what the conditions were. So we need to stop this stuff. It's not just a momentary thing. You're out of the service. It's a thing that follows you the rest of your life. Fortunately, because I was I knew some people that were way up I've managed to get away with just signing away my benefits so let's let's get out there and fight this. This bull that goes on about the service and the army I'm I'm very angry. because two years after I was removed from the service, they reinstated a lot of benefits to a lot of people. Unfortunately, I was not one of the persons that they reinstated benefits to, because I had taken an honorable discharge. So a little tidbit a little trivia about yours truly. And I want you to to get out there and do what you can to stop this from happening. There were a lot of gay people in the service that I knew. And what the service did at that time was go on what we call a witch hunt. they tackled one person, a weak person, and forced her to give names of people that she knew not people that she'd been intimate with, not people that she was friends with just anybody she had known or seen anywhere, in any context of being gay. She was intimidated into giving those names. And that's how I got it. I didn't even know this person who gave my name. And there were a lot of other names given to so let's, let's stop this kind of intimidation by the services.
