It has been a tremendous response and a great love from the community, which both myself and Lou waves who's our director was very, very great surprise that we got such a wonderful response. It's really great.

We found out statistic wise that Brazil, Korea County and Fort Bend County are the fastest HIV population growing according to the state, from the Texas Department of Health.

No, I think the fact that it's the education that getting the now people are coming for testing now, and we are increasing testing at our agency has tried, as I say, has grown so tremendously, where and our own agency at Clear Lake, we were only testing like, three people have five people coming in a week. Now we're getting up to a dozen to nearly 15 to 20. So it's a great increase and and it's nice to know that people want to take the precaution and want to know about prevention and what to do. HIV knowledge wise and everything to so they make sure that you know, they're careful now, because a lot of people still ask about monogamous relationships, and we've stressed that but we also realized that people will have to be careful that if they're not in monogamous relationships, to wear condoms, take all kinds of precautions whatsoever.

And I've within in a month's time, I've received already three families like that, that are resident aliens only. And it's making I'm finding it hard difficult to get them getting started on their food stamps, or even though they're so secure. Sure.

park parking space to get up the high rise. They're going to decentralize that. They're going to try to do a pilot program to figure out how to decentralize that. So that the people who are providing the services are out there closer to where it's happening around the city of houston and harris county. And so they're gonna do that. And also, I understand from what you told me that, yes, they're gonna go seven and 24. Right.

And then there's another very interesting thing, I learned two new things. While I was attending the meeting, and I watched all the local media and television and news media, none of them, not a single one of them, dispense with this information. This particular information that Chief Bradford publicly announced and said, and it's this that victims of spousal abuse, whether you are gay, or lesbian, straight, bisexual, transgender, there is shelter for you.

Yes, there are there are. I never knew that. I actually didn't know that either. I knew that there were shelters for lesbians to go to because of the information we had had here and after hours with the folks from the Houston area Women's Center, but I did not know that there were several like 567 that would take in gay man. Right? I did not know that. Domestic Violence, also, and the police carry this information with them on a blue card, right? It's like a blue sheet of paper. It's I think it's it's half of a legal size. So it's about four and a quarter inches by 14 inches long. And it has all the numbers of the centers in both English and Spanish. Correct. And the police carry them and they're supposed to be making that information available to the victim. And in

addition, it also has on there, the crime victims Bill of Rights, so that if you are the victim of a violent of some other type of violent crime, there are rights that you do have or if you are, if you are the maid or the spouse or the parent or the the adult child of a crime victim. You have rights under the under the state of Texas. These are stuff that We did not know, I mean, criminals, they have their rights read to them every time. You know,

wow, in that in that regard, the second part of this program is, as chief Bradford mentioned, is that they're going to, again, have to increase the training for the police officers, those coming in to the, to the police department, and those who have been around for a long, long time, are all going to get training in this regard, and that's another of the changes that occurred.

the degree of violence increases at that specific time or shortly thereafter. So I mean, I went through this with my sister, when she left her husband, you make a plan, you get everything together, you do it quietly, secretly. You do not announce it to anyone other than those you fully trust. And then you go, and you go someplace other than a relative's. If your partner knows where your family lives, if your partner knows where you were, if your partner knows any of this personal information, you have to be someplace other than those places, because your partner will find you. And then the third thing that I got, but didn't quite get from, from what Chief Bradford said, was that they were also he brought up again, the hate crimes hotline number, which is area code 713-308-8737. And he was talking about that, as if he were giving thoughts to combine it with domestic violence, right. It really is pretty much the same, the same thing. It's violence, in one case, violence by someone you know, very well. And in the other case, it's violence. I said, when you don't know it all, he's just targeting you. But I think they're thinking of combining those together so that they have a bigger clientele. And that clientele can get to some place. Get to information, seven and 24/7 days a week, 24 hours,
