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one of the interesting things is that everything, every everything and everybody, all the inmates within those that were interned in those camps, were color coded, right?



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What were different colored triangles, except for the Jews who got the yellow Dark Star of David.



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Right? Unless they were gay. Yes, if they were against you, they would have a pink triangle pointing downward and a yellow triangle pointing upward. So they still had the Jewish star, right. But it was known that they were gay Jew. Now, it's been estimated that there has been anywhere between 100,000 to 1 million gay men who were actually sought out by the Gestapo and the SS, rounded up and thrown into the camps and killed. Yeah. And what people have to remember is, before Hitler came to power, between the period at the end of World War One and Hitler's rise to power, there was a very strong gay liberation movement. Oh, yeah, within Germany, within the Weimer Republic. And when the Nazis came to power, they attacked those places, and all those groups, and got lists got the names, right. And they in turn, the people that they arrested, were, in turn, in turn, had to give up who their boyfriend or the girlfriend was, sure. And that's how there were so many people that were rounded up. And

something I learned just recently is that lesbians who were interned in the camps wore black triangles, right? I never realized I never heard of that before.



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And gay men wore pink triangles pointed downwards, right? And which is the correct way to wear your pink triangle. And today, we wear I wear my pink triangle every day with pride with pride. It's not just a symbol of gay pride, but it also means never forget. And never again. That's right. And I am so happy that this a Holocaust Museum is opening up right now at this day, for the simple reason that as we're looking at the Republican presidential primaries, and we're seeing how, for instance, Pat Buchanan.
