**DAN DELEON:** Hi, I'm Dan DeLeon.

**SUZANNE** And I'm Suzanne Anderson.

**ANDERSON:**

**DAN DELEON:** And welcome to *TV Montrose*.

**SUZANNE** Yeah, it's a beautiful, cool morning here on *TV Montrose's* patio.

**ANDERSON:**

**DAN DELEON:** Sure is, Suzanne. And it really beats what we had to contend with this summer with the heat and humidity.

**SUZANNE** That's the truth. It's the kind of weather that kind of lets you know that the holidays are just around the corner.

**ANDERSON:**

**DAN DELEON:** Yeah, and speaking of, what are you doing for Thanksgiving?

**SUZANNE** I am going to go to Atlanta, taking my 20-month-old granddaughter to meet my 24-month-old, I guess, nephew,

**ANDERSON:** who looks like a sumo wrestler. He weighs about 40 pounds. So we're going to have a big vacation with little babies.

**DAN DELEON:** Oh, great, great. I'm staying here in Houston. All my family's here in Houston, so we'll have a good time.

**SUZANNE** Are you cooking?

**ANDERSON:**

**DAN DELEON:** I don't really cook, I buy pies.

**SUZANNE** You don't? OK, OK.

**ANDERSON:**

**DAN DELEON:** I buy pies. Lots of pies.

**SUZANNE** Let's get into the show tonight.

**ANDERSON:**

**DAN DELEON:** Sounds great. First up is our focus on art story.

**SUZANNE** Let's join Jama Shelton for a unique exhibition of pen and pencil artwork.

**ANDERSON:**

**DAN DELEON:** Great.

**JAMA SHELTON:**I'm here at the Lobo Bookshop and Cafe with Estevan, who is the first artist to show his work here at the Lobo Cafe. How does that feel, being the first artist? You feel special about that?

**ESTEVAN:** It was great. It feels really good. Thank you for being here. Thank you very much.

**JAMA SHELTON:**All right. Can you tell me a little about your work? You've got quite a collection of pen and ink drawings of women, particular women. Can you tell me how you chose these women?

**ESTEVAN:** I chose these women because these women were my favorite, either musically or from theater, and I chose them because they were strong female characters. ANDERSON:** In case you haven't heard yet, Baba Yega's is expanding and Steve the story on it now.

**STEVE:** Hi, I'm here with Molly Schnitzer, general manager for Baba Yega. Molly, welcome to *TV Montrose*.

**MOLLY  
SCHNITZER:** Thank you. You're welcome here.

**STEVE:** We want to thank Molly and Baba Yega's for allowing us to use Baba Yega here for our season premiere party. And one of the things that I'm interested in finding out is, I hear Baba Yega is growing.

**MOLLY  
SCHNITZER:** We have acquired a place next door to the herb shop, Wild Earth Herbs. We're calling it "Mother Earth, Father Sky." it's going to be a healing facility. We're going to have colonics, massage, acupuncture, iridology we're also going to have a really great juice bar downstairs. And we're also going to offer classes.

**STEVE:** How would you describe what you're adding here? Is that more like a new age center of some sort?

**MOLLY

**VICKI SHAW:** I'm Vicki Shaw at the Laugh Stop. Everybody turn around.

[CHEERING]

And you're watching *TV Montrose*. Good job.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

**DAN DELEON:** Welcome back.

**SUZANNE ANDERSON:** And next up is our feature story of the week, which is about the 20th anniversary party held by the Houston Pride Band and the Gay Men's Chorus.

**DAN DELEON:** Let's join Fred Walters with the story.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

[MARCHING BAND PLAYING]

**FRED WALTERS, JR.:** Tonight, we're at the Hollyfield Foundation, where a group of gay and lesbian musicians have gathered to celebrate the 20th anniversary of both the Gay Men's Chorus and the Houston Pride Band. What's the Houston Pride Band you ask? Let's walk around and find out.

**PIERRE TEJADA:** We're having a 20th anniversary reunion party for all the members that have been in the bands here in the Houston area.

**FRED** Which bands?

**WALTERS, JR.:**

**PIERRE TEJADA:** Well, it started out originally as the Montrose Marching Band, then went to Monterey Symphonic Band, then the Lone Star Symphonic Band, and now Houston Pride Band. The names changed, but it's the same people.

**FRED** How many members have come through the Houston Pride Band?

**WALTERS, JR.:**

**PIERRE TEJADA:** Oh gosh, I'm sure it's up in the hundreds. I don't an exact number, we'd have to ask the registrar over there, but it's well over 100 people.

**FRED** What are your goals for the next few years?

**WALTERS, JR.:**

**DEBBIE HUNT:** Well, we want to get out in the community a little more. Unfortunately, we've spent a lot of time practicing on getting our musical skills up to date and it hasn't been a good time for us to get out in the community and do a lot of music. Now we're ready to get back out and perform.

And so we're looking forward, especially starting next year, to doing a lot of community events, things that people don't have to pay money to come see, and just get out there and play music for the people.

[BAND PLAYING]

**FRED** Connie, you used to play in the Houston Pride Band in the Pride Parade, right?

**WALTERS, JR.:**

**CONNIE MOORE:** You bet. I've been a member of the Houston Pride Band since 1990-- '88, for about 10 years now. And I've marched every year in the Pride Parade with the band. I came out in 1986 and my first Pride Parade was a very emotional thing. And the, I guess it was my third year that I was out, I was actually marching with the band. And it's just been an incredible experience.

**FRED WALTERS, JR.:** How many people marched in the parade with you?

**CONNIE MOORE:** Oh, it varies. One year we had about five. And then we've had about 40 before. We all often have members of the Oakland Band from Dallas come down in March with us. Marching in the parade is probably one of the highlights of our year in one perspective.

We're really not a marching band, OK? We're a concert band, we're a lazy kind of group of people. We like to have fun. But one of the things that really gives us the most pleasure is getting out in the community. And when we do the Pride Parade, it's one of the most visible events that we have.

**FRED WALTERS, JR.:** Whereabouts do you all play in the community?

**IRVIN DECKER:** Well, for our Christmas season, we're doing it here at the Hollyfield Center, of course. And then we're playing at the tree lighting at Mary's, and we're going to do something for PFLAG. We're doing Galveston on the Strand again this year.

And the big thing is we're doing the Galleria on December 16th.

**FRED WALTERS, JR.:** Wow.

**IRVIN DECKER:** Doing holiday music there.

**FRED WALTERS, JR.:** It sounds like y'all are getting more and more well-known, just not in the gay community, but in the straight community as well.

**IRVIN DECKER:** That's part of my job. I want to show-- give vision to the group and hopefully get some growth in membership, and growth and exposure.

**J. DAVID FABER:** We happen to be celebrating our 20th anniversary season as well this year. We were going to culminate back to the concert at the Wortham Center, June 19th. As it is, we are working on a program for December 5th and 6th called "Way Out West." And so you're going to hear some cowboy tunes tonight.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

[MUSIC - GAY MEN'S CHORUS, "GHOST RIDER IN THE SKY"]

(SINGING) Yippee-yi-ay, yippee-yi-o, a ghost heard in the sky. Their brands were still on fire and their hooves was made of steel. Their horns was the black and shiny and their hot breath he could feel. A bolt of fear went through him as they thundered through the sky, for he saw the riders coming hard and heard their mournful cry. Yippee-yi-ay.

**IRVIN DECKER:** It doesn't matter if you haven't played for years, you pick your instrument up again, you'll be amazed how easily it comes back. And also, playing music is very therapeutic. We do it because it feels good, not because we're getting paid big bucks or anything like that.

**FRED WALTERS, JR.:** As you can see, the celebration is still going on behind me. And I have to tell you, this band is really good. I've never heard them before.

Tonight's celebration was also made special by singing from the Gay Men's Chorus. Now both groups are not going to stay in Montrose for long, they're being asked to sing in both the gay, lesbian, and straight communities, so look for both groups to go a lot of places soon.

[MUSIC - GAY MEN'S CHORUS, "THE YELLOW ROSE OF TEXAS"]

(SINGING) There's yellow rose in Texas that I am going to see. I'll kiss her when I find her and treat her tenderly. She cried so when I left her, it like to broke my heart. And if I ever find her, we never more will part. She's the sweetest rose in Texas, the best I ever knew. Her eyes are bright as diamonds.

**SUZANNE ANDERSON:** Dan, those people are really talented in those two groups.

**DAN DELEON:** They sure are, Suzanne. And they do an amazing job representing our community wherever they perform.

**SUZANNE ANDERSON:** Now not only are there changes happening at Baba Yega's, but also at Toohee's.

**DAN DELEON:** And for the scoop on what's happening, let's join Jama Shelton.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

**JAMA SHELTON:** Hi, we are at Toohee's on West Alabama, where there's been an evening of live poetry and music. It's been a lively evening celebration because Toohee's Coffee Shop, as you all know, it is changing and it's becoming a full service restaurant starting Tuesday, December 1st.

So this is kind of a farewell to the way Toohee's used to be and in anticipation for what Toohee's is going to become. Why don't we talk to a couple of people and see what they think about this?

So you guys, why do you hang out here at Toohee's?

**SUBJECT:** Really good coffee. A lot of really cool people come here and hang out. Have a lot of a friends here.

**JAMA SHELTON:** Do you think that's going to change once we become a full service restaurant?

**SUBJECT:** I'm a little torn about it becoming a restaurant because if I come here, I have to buy food and eat, which is great, but sometimes I just come here to study and drink coffee. So I don't know, I'm kind of excited, but then I'm kind of torn at the same time.

**JAMA SHELTON:** So you're worried because you're so cheap you might have to actually spend money when you come in here.

**SUBJECT:** Exactly. Exactly.

**JAMA SHELTON:** That's what I thought. What about you, Amy? What do you think about the change? Are you going to keep coming around and hanging out or do you think that's going to change?

**AMY:** Well, I like everybody here. It's cool, it's kind of laid back. You go to Starbucks and everybody's all stuck up. You can't even talk to anybody, you know? But here you can just start a conversation with anybody. That's why I like it.

I think I come here and be comfortable. You know what I mean?

**JAMA SHELTON:** Yeah, I think that's true. I think the atmosphere is a reason why a lot of people come. And I don't think that's going to be any different. You can have cute, little waitresses come wait on you at your table now. You don't have to watch us from behind the counter. That's a plus.

So you guys come check out Toopee's, December 1st. Tuesday, December 1, or any day thereafter, which will be a full service restaurant with lots of good food, great atmosphere, so come check it out. This is Jama Shelton reporting for *TV Montrose*.

**MICHELLE MEYERS:** Heard every Saturday night from midnight to 3:00 AM.

**BIG ROY:** On KPFT 90.1 FM, the sound of Texas.

**JIMMY CARPER:** Now stand by for the community calendar.



[MUSIC PLAYING]

**DAN DELEON:** Viewer response to our new Community "Mike" segment with Jason has been all thumbs up.

**SUZANNE ANDERSON:** Jason has this kind of personality that just seems to get people to open up and speak their minds.

**DAN DELEON:** Well, let's go back to Toohee's and find out what questions Jason had for our viewers.

[MUSIC PLAYING]

**JASON VINCIK:** Jason here with Community "Mike," and tonight we were talking about first dates. What was the worst first date you've ever been on?

**SUBJECT 1:** Well, I thought I was going out on this date with this girl. I'd asked her out, and it turned out she went out with me so that she could have me go out with a friend of hers that really liked me.

**JASON VINCIK:** Oh, oh no.

**SUBJECT 1:** So it really didn't turn out to be a date at all, and I was rather crushed. And it was a horrible experience.

**JASON VINCIK:** Did you ever talk to her again?

**SUBJECT 1:** Yes, but it was just weird.

**JASON VINCIK:** Well, what about the other girl? Did you ever hook up with her?

**SUBJECT 1:** Actually, I dated her sister for four year-- or for a year and a half.

[LAUGHTER]

**JASON VINCIK:** Oh no, so it all kind of turned out weird out.

**SUBJECT 1:** It came out in the wash, you know.

**SUBJECT 2:** Did you write a song about it?

**SUBJECT 1:** About 20.

[LAUGHTER]

**JASON VINCIK:** And I understand that you've been on a pretty bad blind date.

**SUBJECT 2:** Yeah, it was terrible. About a year ago after I had been in a relationship for several years, my roommate, actually they didn't tell me what was going to happen, they just said, you want to go to the Cattle Company with us? We live in Austin.

And we went out, and when we got there, she was with her girlfriend and they said, oh look, there's Jerry's cute, little friend Andy. Go talk to her. So they sort of kind of push me off on this girl. And I was like, I don't want to talk to her, I don't want to talk to her.

And I kind of got stuck with her and then a year later, I ran into her again and I asked her out. And--

**JASON VINCIK:** Well, whatever happened with that?

**SUBJECT 2:** The sex is great.

**SUBJECT 1:** I think it'd be a really good thing to see more people in our community out and on television. We see everybody else all the time and it'd be nice to see us represented.

**JASON VINCIK:** Absolutely. We need some good things represented in our community. I think *TV Montrose* would be a perfect vehicle for that.

**SUBJECT 3:** I think it's great. You guys are doing a really good job from the the shows I've seen. It's really good, the variety of shows y'all done. Just to covered a lot of different subjects.

**JASON VINCIK:** Great. It was great talking to you guys. For Community "Mike," I'm Jason Vincik.

**DAN DELEON:** If you want to throw a party and have Community "Mike" show up, give us a call or email us and we'll bring out the crew and have a little extra fun added to your party.

**SUZANNE ANDERSON:** OK, now the major requirement, listen to this carefully, is you have to feed and water us. And also, you've got to have somebody kind of interesting for us to talk to.

**DAN DELEON:** And when you call us about your party, be ready to tell us why your party is going to be the one we should be at.
