

And now, After Hours on KPFK Houston, brings you the news with Brian Keever, sports with Mark Schmidt, and our community bulletin board church report from Allen Sands. It's radio, celebrating life from the heart of the Montrose. And it's time now for the news.

And in the news this morning, Brian Keever, news director for *After Hours* is missing at large. He's out there somewhere in the streets of the Montrose. We don't know where he is. I went by and tried to find him, but anyway.

I saw him in the toilet, his picture's in there.

Maybe they--

Call them, maybe they know.

--superimposed him in there or something. We don't have Brian here, so I don't know what's going on other than there was a great election and George Greanias is going to be our comptroller now and not our--

The man with the plan.

Yeah, not our City Councilman. And I'm going to miss George. He was on the first-- beginning of the first month he was on with us on After Hours every day. And he's going to be making some special appearance as I hope for the holidays, so you need to stay tuned for that. In lieu of Brian's newscast we have a short little blip from Baylor College of Medicine. So we're going to hear that and then we're going-- I'm going to go right into the sports. Mark Schmidt standing by and then Alan's ready with the community bulletin board. So let's see what Baylor College of Medicine has to offer that we might be interested in.

The substance that prevents AIDS infection as a monoclonal antibody. Clones are duplicates of antibodies that attack AIDS virus cells without harming other healthy cells. It was developed by Dr. Nancy Chang, Dr. Shih-Wen Chang, and colleagues at Baylor College of Medicine. Dr. Nancy Chang says, the monoclonal antibody effectively blocks the two ways the AIDS virus spreads in the body-- in blood and by cell to cell contact.

You actually give them the protective immunity. Therefore, you can not only protecting the people already infected with AIDS virus, you can actually prevent the virus infection or spreading inside your body.

Chang emphasizes that this is not a cure for AIDS. It does not kill the virus, but it may stop AIDS from spreading in the body and keep others exposed to the virus from developing AIDS. The next step is to develop enough antibody and begin testing it in human blood.

We foresee this will be happening by 1989. We are also in the process of negotiating with several different companies to able to mass producing these antibodies for us for that purpose.

If the human blood studies are successful, the Changs will seek permission from the US Food and Drug Administration to begin giving the antibody to terminally ill AIDS patients and AIDS infected pregnant women. From Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, I'm Nora Rodriguez.

And you know, I said something about Councilman Greanias making appearances on After Hours before he ran for comptroller and then we had to pull him off the air because of FCC rulings or whatever. But when Councilman Greanias was around he had a lot of nice things to say to the gay community here in Houston. Things like this-- well, he did say something, but--

And to those of you who would like to come forward, but are a little hesitant. Don't worry, we're all human beings, we're all just trying to get a job done. And we all need each other if we're going to make the city all that it can be.

That's the kind of man that we've elected to controller. He really cares and a lot of people said he's just another politician, but he was a politician that was always there for us. And we'll see what happens with the runoff elections. In the meantime, let's see what Mark's got in the world of sports.

The group will meet the third Sunday of each month. All women over 55 are welcome. The Montrose Counseling Center hosts programs for the various members of the lesbian and gay community, including the AIDS Project, a support group; JOY, just older youth, a group for men over 40; The Houston Education AIDS Resource Team; and the More Program presenting the recovery experience.

Whether you're married or single, if you're a gay man and have children you may be interested in the Gay Fathers Group, a support and discussion group dealing exclusively with the problems a gay father can face. And we're turning to the gay community, and they're just sharing their love with us and their knowledge and their education. And we want to deal with AIDS with education. And I have a song that I want to play for someone very special right after this.

In the United States, AIDS is primarily a sexually transmitted disease. So if you're going to talk about AIDS and how to prevent AIDS, there's no way you can avoid talking about sex.

We don't talk about AIDS because one, we don't know about AIDS. And secondly, to acknowledge the existence of AIDS, we must acknowledge that other things are going on such as men having sex with men. We don't talk about that.

But it needs to be that you're not afraid to discuss it. You have to know you are saving a life, possibly your own if you can at least cut down that barrier and talk openly. If you can have sex with somebody and be that intimate, I feel you should at least be able to talk about it.



Each of us must take the responsibility for keeping aids out of our lives. Know the facts about AIDS. Know how to protect yourself and your family. Tell others. For answers to your questions about AIDS, call 1-800-342-AIDS.

I have a very dear friend for the first time in my life as a homosexual that has come in contact with the AIDS virus. I've heard of a lot of other friends that had friends and so on and so forth. But Ted really does have it, and it scares the hell out of me, because there's nothing I can do but be supportive.

And he told me to play a song for him this morning. And Teddy, I picked one out for you that I think you're going to like, because I heard you tell me one time that you enjoyed this when you saw it in the movie. So this is just for you, love. Take care of yourself, and I'll see you soon
