It was 1987. I remember because I heard oral arguments. And when you were there when I was there, right, with Hill versus Houston. The the it was 542. It was fine for the other way. Yes. And after that decision was handed down. Powell said he should have voted the other one he was he said he was wrong. He should have gone the other way. That's right. And I was sitting in the room when O'Connor's position on that went sour. On the issue of privacy right now, now, this case, had two major issues in it. One on equal justice, right? Equal Protection. And actually we got the six votes on equal just, well, no, we got one vote only. The only one that even mentioned it. Yeah. Sandra Day O'Connor said that she would have overturned the Texas law based on equal protection because it treated homosexuals differently than it treated heterosexual and she also said that she would not have overruled Bauer's case. So when that she joined in the image in the majority back and so she's

We lost her there, and she's still lost. Yeah, she never came back. But but you know, that, does it do that?

That's a liberty that we should enjoy as well as gay men and

lesbian now, just because the building block is there is because you can construct this building out of material available in the wall, doesn't mean that's going to happen. No, it doesn't. But that's how you start building the building, though. You put the bricks there and you hope they stay.

He wrote a note saying that a new suit that would protect the Liberty or interests of those charged with possession of marijuana would give an opportunity to introduce the full range of medical, scientific and sociological evidence about marijuana to show the lack of any rational basis for laws criminalizing the possession. And, you know, they're saying that if a trial judge was carefully selected, if one can do that, there's a good chance that the Lord warrants decision would excuse me it would serve as a basis for to show judicial discrimination of possession. And, uh, you know, I look at a paper you're talking about the editorials. I'm looking at one that is in today's Washington Post, and they're talking about Antonin Scalia Leah and I are blasting him as old school, old testament and you know, Misty over an era when military Institute's didn't have to accept women, when elite schools didn't have to make special efforts for blacks, when a gay couple in their own bedroom could be clapped in irons. And, you know, the man is being shown for what he is, you know, we talked about Strom Thurmond. And those guys, you know, they're ancient, they are old school, they are school of Inquisition, if you will. And I think this is wonderful news for all of us. It should help open the door to allow medical marijuana patients to sooner have access to a medicine that keeps them well, or that maybe even keeps them alive. Yeah.
