And when you get into those rooms and is the correct interaction. Everything is well laid out the definition of that room is pretty sad. I had gotten into one room the other day where there was a boy on there that was responding to me and me being a boy but being assertive when I need to it wasn't a problem but a kind of ticked off a couple of the other masters that were online are like oh cute. Look at these two boys and one thinks he's a master and it's like, well, hey, just because you're submissive and your boy does not mean that you do not know how to handle yourself and take care of yourself. And that's another thing that my master has been quite proficient at is making sure that I can stand on my own two feet. And I have no problem doing that. And with no disrespect, because there is a certain protocol that should be there between interaction between boys, slaves, masters and daddies. And they've got their subscribers kind of divided up into different they call them cities, based on the interest where you put your homepage, so I have a homepage, for example, in the in West Hollywood, that's the Gay Lesbian area on Geo cities. And, I mean, they have literally 1000s of people that have homepages in each one of these areas. And that's just on Geo cities, that's just one server, on the website. And within any person's homepage, with shareware that's easily available on the web, you can set up chat rooms, you can set up conferences, you you can do all kinds of stuff like that. So potentially, there could be 10s of 1000s of chat rooms just on that one site. And of course, there's 10s of 1000s of sites like that around. Plus, there's all the stuff that all the the chat groups and news groups, and so on, that aren't associated with web servers that are on the internet, because the internet is more than just the worldwide web. So there's a fantastic opportunity out there to make contact with people. It's kind of like, I've been a ham radio operator since I was 14.
