The last one, the next one was nine, I was actually director of that one. It was in Toronto, which was our first international conference outside the United States went extremely well had huge mainstream press coverage, including TV, I was on TV twice in Toronto with interviews and stuff. So it was and the community accepted it very well. And then this this last year, 95 was in Portland, and it was a 10th anniversary.

Being that you you've been on the international level, you've gone, you've been the director or the director of oil when it was in Toronto, you see a difference. And you see more of a widespread spread difference in our communities across not only the United States, but in other countries. What do you what do you think about that? As far as Do you see it? Do you see that it's gotten any better? Or is it is it worse, or?

I think things it's regional, obviously. I mean, where are you goes, there's Toronto was very open. Canada is very weird, because it's so hard to get stuff in and out of Canada. But yet once you're in Canada, it's very open. Much, I think free or socially probably than the US a lot of us is but that's regional here, too. Yeah. There's aspects of Houston that it's very positive to be here. And same with Dallas and Atlanta, but you get into some of the other regions, and it's very homophobic and leather phobic. And

I said, Yeah, but what if he has a panic attack? What if he, what if he, you know, chokes to death on something. And another time the same guy didn't learn because he took a trip home and tied him up and went in the other room and and passed out drunk? So that's not saying

We work also with a group called pap, Houston pap, which is a predominantly it's hat, but they're also pansexual. But the group here is predominantly hat so we work really well with them and get the word out and they're a play club but they also try to educate and be informed and work with us. Right,

Fortunately, I think we're slowly breaking those barriers down. And NLA is is a good example of that because we have a sizable hat membership not in Houston, we'd like more and he's we're getting there. And when internationally or nationally, there are chapters that are predominantly have

been on the on the outside looking in. It seems to me that that gay and lesbian leather people are much more out in the open than then hit leather people. Is that a stereotype?

Or no, it's very much the truth because we, particularly with the gays, we have the leather clubs to go to and we can be out. And it's it's not an it's unusual to see gay men and leather. But at the same time, it kind of fits what everybody kind of expects Leatherman to be. I mean, before I came out, I thought you were either a drag queen or a leather man. I didn't know there was an immediate point. So it's just easier for us to be out. Even the lesbian community is very closeted with leather. Oh, yes, they don't have the clubs, there's a few that will come out and go to the venture and or go to PS or go to rip cord. But for the most part, they keep their leather life very closeted as much as the heads do. Because they're not welcoming in clubs.

Unless, unless you're involved in a club where you know, people at the club, but a lot of the lesbians don't go bars

and clubs just don't encourage even a leather jacket.

I was I stood out very much in the club, even though it's five, six o'clock in the afternoon, there's guys in there in blue jeans and T shirt, not very much leather, not not anybody really flagging anything. But I'm sitting there waiting for my lover and a skirt and heels. And it takes a little bit for me to get waited on more than usual. Again, it's because the lesbians don't get out and don't say, hey, look, you know, we're here also. And that's one of the reasons why I do the radio show. To say, hey, look, we're here. And we do this also?

There's still a lot of the lesbian community and there's gay, in the gay community that do not accept leathers, which is part of the reason that I became involved in the pride committee four years ago and five years ago, was to help dispel some of that I go as a leather man, I am there and they know that I have a lot of friends now that have started coming to leather functions and that have started getting involved and they're not afraid of us. And they know that we're very serious about the very

same thing that they want and that's their civil liberties. Right. But the peer pressure within the lesbian community is hard very hard. Because I think there's more strength in in the leather in the lesbian community, just my personal opinion. And so it tends to push out the, the leather.

And she had consented and he he won the case. And so it's actually in the court records. But basically, the domestic violence and abuse is very important to NLA into the other leather SM community, because obviously, we get pinned a lot. I don't know how particularly it is now and I'm starting an investigation on this from my own purposes, and for NLA, and so on. But there was a time when particularly lesbians who were in the leather community, in the SM lifestyle would go to a violence, domestic violence shelter, seeking shelter. And when that was found out that they were in an SM relationship, they were turned away, because basically you asked

for it. So you've got it. And that's we want to keep away from that. Because the whole point with SM and BD is that it's consensual. When you say no, it stops, right? Yeah. Doesn't stop then it becomes biased, is really

important. The important thing, I guess, is to give enough information out so that the people who who, when this does happen and someone does go to someone they can tell the difference between domestic violence is and what SNL right or

When it is you feel like you're a turd anyway. So what's the difference,
