Actually, they're one of the The only major oil companies that didn't Chevron shell Amoco, they all offer domestic partnership benefits. And Exxon does not have a non discriminate non discrimination policy for sexual orientation written that doesn't include sexual orientation. In fact, last year they had sent a vote to their shareholders. And it was voted down like 94%.

That always happens in the board of directors, because shareholders from everywhere, you know, they send you out a proxy card if you have zactly. And it says the board recommends this. And oh recommended now, and they recommended No, so most of the people are going to go with what the board right?

I mean, usually half the time, right, people don't even read it, but how the board wants it. And so they didn't have sexual orientation. Mobile did. Now they don't have it. The overall corporation doesn't any employees that were with mobile that had planned on enrolling. I mean, there are people that, you know, I know that there are many gays and lesbians out there that want to go with a company that has domestic partnership benefits, that has, you know, sexual orientation and their non discrimination clause. And now you've got employees that have gone to this company. And maybe prior to their registering for the new year, fiscal year for benefits, if they didn't do it, that they can't. They're saying that Exxon has said that they don't discriminate against anybody. They don't necessarily need to say sexual orientation. But the bottom line is, they're already discriminating against gays and lesbians, because domestic partnership benefits any kind of benefit in the company is basically an extra wage or salary. And so they are discriminating against gays and lesbians. And the bottom line is, is as a community, you may not care about Exxon or whatever, but it's in generally, the overall consensus in our country, we've got to make a statement, we've got to be the ones to stand up and say, Look, we're not going to buy your products we're not we're going to do everything we can to make sure you know how far the gay dollar goes. And we can do that. And that's why we got together organizing this rally in January. But like I was at a party Friday night, and it was, of course, it's the big buzz, sure topic. But the key thing is we can't do it with you know, 1000 people, that's great. But it's not enough. No, you know, we've got a lot more in our community and that care. So we've got to get everyone out there. You've got to everyone, you know, I emailed my entire family and said, cut your excellent cards, you bet. And I love you. And I trust you, Mom and Dad and everybody, but mail them to me that you cut your cards,

Well, you know, the easiest thing for him to do is just gonna say, Well, who the hell has these domestic partnership benefits?

So, of course, I'm not going to enroll in for my partner. And someone was like, Well, why not? You have that chance to sit because he's got better insurance than I do. Now. Why would I want to put them on this? So you're right, not everyone's gonna sign up domestic partnerships, because that's one thing, especially in gay couples that we've seen in all the reports about gay aid dollars is that, you know, a lot of the bigger companies are realizing that we have more to spend, because you're when you look at, you know, as a gay couple of lesbian couples, they know, most of them don't have families trying to raise, they've got more money to spend. And you know, it's the same thing with insurance. If you've got two working people in a relationship, then you know, they're probably they've probably got good insurance either way, and they're not going to need to do this, and some of them do, but it's not this big, huge change that they're scared of and think, Oh, God, we're gonna have you know, 5000 people sign up.
