And it was a really great night to see that step forward for the organization.

So it's I mean, we're this new year for the caucus. As soon as the sport takes over in January, it's going to be no, no rest for the weary, it's going to be straight in there. We've got to get people involved in the primaries. One thing that I've heard a lot of people talk about, especially within the community is that they think that this is just gonna be a year where, you know, we try not to, like I just said earlier about being nonpartisan, I don't want to say either way, but we do have someone in the state who's really hasn't been very supportive of gay issues. And this next president, this is a very important year, because this next president is probably going to have the opportunity to appoint up to four Supreme Court justices. And the bottom line is that that is where everything ends up. If we want to move into the 21st century and still be moving forward with our fight for the gay and lesbian movement, that's where it's gonna end.
