Now despite his claiming victory today after the weekend vote in Austin's repealing ordinance allowing insurance benefits for the same sex partners subsidy employees 62% of voters casting ballots Saturday supported that repeal. Well, 38% back the policy, the benefits package is now limited to the wives husband and children, government workers, also excluding unmarried heterosexual couples. With us to talk about the results. Diane Hardy Garcia of the lesbian and gay rights lobby of Texas, she worked with the mainstream Austin coalition to try to support that measure. Good morning, Miss Garcia.

So I think a lot of Austinites voted there, mistakenly voted their pocketbook, which is unfortunate, because this policy is good business, and it saves the taxpayers running.

They called it a moral issue. But later they found that that was not as palatable to to austenite. So they changed it to this false fiscal issue. But we had a tremendous coalition of women's groups of people of color who came together, leaders from the communities of color. We had a lot of been leaders and medical leaders who came together on a call volition to talk about the fact that preventative healthcare saves dollars. And this provided insurance to people at a very low cost. And it was fair, it was about equal pay for equal work.

Jobs gotta be Democratic Chairman, he blamed the unmarried factor rather than the gay and lesbian factor on the defeat, saying that the mayor's race where you had two relatively progressive candidates captured about three quarters of the vote bad in the opposite direction to saying this is a religious right mandate. How do you feel about that factor of the unmarried as opposed to gay and lesbian causing the defeat?

Yeah, the other side really presented that as an issue that that married couples, straight couples would be getting unfair economic values, that they wouldn't be responsible for winning one another when they have the option to, to be married. And I do think that unsettled many voters, unfortunately, leave for lesbians and gays, we don't have that option. And those leaders are the same leaders. The leaders of the the other side of this are the same leaders who tried to legalize discrimination and housing against lesbians and gays, they have a definite anti homosexual agenda. But unfortunately, they were able to cut enough voters into siding. But I do think that that played a part in them. But there's no way around that right now, was if you guys don't have the option to get married, and no one will certainly no one from the other side will ever help us try to attain that goal. And many of us want to be able to marry

most of the people who are affected by this just about 100 couples employed in city government, one of the spouses employed by the city government, those were heterosexual women.

Oh, yeah, domestic partners tend to be heterosexual people don't marry for a variety of reasons. But they also don't get the same tax benefits that you get from marriage. And they have to pay the cost of their benefits in the income tax where a couple of do not, that is a trend around the country. That that when these kinds of policies are instituted, about 70% of those who use them are heterosexual couples, and only 30% are gay and lesbian.

We're talking live with Diane Hardy Garcia, the executive director of the lesbian and gay rights lobby of Texas, she worked with mainstream Austin, to try to back that ordinance that allowed insurance benefits for same sex and unmarried partners of city employees, just to take the devil's advocate point of view for a moment.

Bring yourself as a domestic partner. And in that it says you're living together that you're responsible for one another's basic living expenses. And so in essence, it's a contract of some type. When you get married, you don't have to live in the same place, you don't even have to know each other. And when you separate as a domestic partner, you have to inform your employer immediately. And you do that and you sign that document under penalty of perjury. So there was a definite commitment here equal to that, if not more to that of marriage. So it was nothing that you could do fly by night, and just want to register a friend, you had to have them living together and agree to be responsible for basic living expenses, which leaves you open to suit if you had a partner who maybe had a tremendous amount of credit card debt.

We were at, of course, quite a bit about the Williamson County controversy with Apple Computer, that company coming in building the plant and allowing its employees to the same sex partners to have benefits. Do you think that this is going to affect this vote is going to affect any companies coming in and trying to have that same policy in Austin?

I think it will. I do think that a lot of people will call for a boycott of Austin and try to discourage businesses from coming. I personally will not do that. I think that you know, ultimately, we are Austinites and Texans first and people that, you know, do care about the whole community. And I don't think everyone else should suffer for on behalf of the bigotry of a small group. But I do believe that this is a small group who worked very hard to produce an effective message. I hope what we'll do immediately in the next coming weeks is sit down and analyze what happened. And then we're going to come out of this learning a tremendous amount. And we will be back. I mean, we will not give up on this issue at all by any means. There could be a legal challenge and we'll see I think this is not in any way over and often.

I think one thing that we did that was wonderful is that we made a commitment to teaching a whole crop of new people who did not know how to do elections and how to run elections and how to do kind of ballot initiative or organizing a chance to work on this issue. We trained a whole crop of new people, and they were between the ages of, oh, I guess, 35 and 20. And that was a commitment we made. So these people walk away with skills, because balanced initiatives that are anti gay are coming up across the country everywhere, that the Christian coalition and a radical right groups has become very proficient at putting them on the ballot, and they've been able to win most of them. I think, because lesbians and gays don't have that skill. We do know how to lobby. And we have been effective in our lobbying efforts. But we haven't said, that's not the same as campaigning. And that's not the same as electoral politics. So we trained a new crop of folks. And they were they were all talking about their next campaign where they were going to work next. And their real commitment now to winning another way.

Even though some people say that the lower court ruling that dissolved the 21 06, which penalizes homosexual conduct in the state of Texas, is, you know, they're saying it's unconstitutional. And that's what the lower court ruled and made it a de facto law. But other people are saying no, it's still in effect, and they're still using it to say, we're saying got no rights in Texas. So by golly, and so even if you make a lifetime commitment to someone, and you're with them for 30 years, and you're sharing everything
