

JEWEL: What I wanted to ask you, I know you just opened your new hair salon down on Hawthorne. But I wanted to ask you, on top of all this other stuff that you do, you stop in the care center. What's that for?

BIG ROY That's because I want to, that's for me. And because in my little way maybe I can help in some way.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: Well, I know you sure bring smiles to people's faces there.

BIG ROY I like to cook.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: That's the perfect thing to like when you come there.

BIG ROY Well, it's one of the few talents I have. I don't do much and we can't do everything. You don't have to help in big

MCCARTHY: ways, you can help in the little ways.

JEWEL: Oh, yeah. Sometimes just being there for somebody to say "Hi, I had a sore leg yesterday and it really hurt," sometimes that's all you need.

BIG ROY You say that one of the reasons I also joined the Quaker church is because they were always there for me. I've

MCCARTHY: had my downs too, I've gone through miserable periods, I've gone through depressions. It's just like a family, they're always behind you. And it doesn't matter what a problem you might have, you always know you have somebody you can go to. And it's like being part of a family and that's what I think is so remarkable about the friends.

JEWEL: Let me ask you a couple of questions just to close up. Questions that we ask a lot at the switchboard and we ask them in different ways. But if you could do anything in our community, just wave your magic little fairy wand and do anything in our community, just anything. What would it be? If you could make something happen in our community.

BIG ROY Hypocrisy.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: I mean, more specifically, you mean in our community, in the gay and lesbian community. What would you do?

BIG ROY The gay and lesbian community. We'll fight for the legal rights, especially amongst same sex marriages. I think

MCCARTHY: that is, until we get that, we'll never have any--

JEWEL: What thing would you change in our community that's out there?

BIG ROY Oh, there's so many things.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: There really. But one that's a special, the special to you.

BIG ROY Mostly the laws.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: The laws.

BIG ROY Because the laws are really for the criminal and not for the citizen.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: I just wanted to get a feel of what a Quaker, I mean a person who sees themselves as a Quaker would suggest as what you have to do.

BIG ROY If you have a cause, it doesn't matter what the cause is. If you believe in that cause, you go out and fight for it.

MCCARTHY: You may demonstrate, you may sign. I've marched with the homeless in this city. Not that there was any immediate result, I've gone gay Pride Week in the parade. I think it's that standing up for what you believe, if there is a cause that you're interested in go out and fight for it.

JEWEL: Well, I think that's a great way to close this segment. If there is something you believe in and you think that it's worthy of your time, then you go out and fight for it. If Grant can do it, you can do it. Is that what they say if you can't get-- that's right, then you can do it. You said when your play would be playing.

BIG ROY This weekend and next weekend.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: And tomorrow's a special showing for half price.

BIG ROY Next Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: Do you have any idea what you'll be doing next?

BIG ROY Yes, I'm going to be in an English gay play called "Entertaining Mr. Sloan" over at kumba house.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: A kumba house. Well, great, I look forward to seeing you and maybe we'll have you back in your theater. Your manager, who was that? Mike? No. That was from the Quakers. Well, that's it.

BIG ROY John Murphy.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: Well, that's it.

BIG ROY Call me at 523-6760. If you want to inquire about our gay and lesbian right.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: Well, that's it then. I really appreciate you coming down, Grant. I enjoy when you visit with his bearing and I enjoy when you visit with us down here. This is not the first time you've been down here, is it?

BIG ROY Oh, yes it is.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: Was it first time I thought you came down here one night with Roger?

BIG ROY No.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: No?

BIG ROY No, but I certainly appreciate your having me.

MCCARTHY:

JEWEL: Must have been another date. Must've been another date. So you heard it here, Quakers, gay Quakers here in Texas here in Houston. If you're interested and you think that you might be philosophically aligned with Grant and the people who believe like he does, you can get a hold of the Live Oak Meeting, the religious society of friends Quakers. You were listening to After Hours. KPFT Houston 90.1. I did right.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, you did it. That was great.

JEWEL: Well, it's only taken three years to know that.

JIMMY CARPER: Now, we're going to go to a song, another one by Pink.

JEWEL: Well, you really got Pink on the brain. So you got a cute tush.

JIMMY CARPER: This is really, it's a female.

JEWEL: Yeah, I was going to say this looks like the woman who was in this Renaissance group. I saw in a Renaissance group. Yeah, it was a group I think called Renaissance. And when I heard her, this song you played a little while ago sounded very much like the woman I saw, but there was several other people in the group and it was obvious they were all, they were all gay.

JIMMY CARPER: Well, if you heard that first, well, the thing about this on the inside of it, she dedicates this to the gay community and has a Pink Triangle.

JEWEL: Cool.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, see all of that? And if you heard the first song "Beautiful Body" and you think, "Oh, OK, Pink does dance music," well, guess again, because it's just a big mixed bag of goodies. There's quite a few songs on here that has that Kate Bush inequality.

JEWEL: I like Enya.

JIMMY CARPER: Get ready for a treat. This is called Native Mozart. Cool.

JEWEL: OK, we're back.

JIMMY CARPER: That was two in a row by Pink. If you thought that was, she was going to be dance music, it's really a pretty mix that was sorrow and before that Native Mozart. And there's one more I'd like to get in before the end of the show. And if so, this will be a first that I've never played four songs off of one CD and one show.

JEWEL: Well, that says something for that particular CD then.

JIMMY CARPER: Well, it came to me by one of the straight programmers here at KPFT. He said, "I've listened to this and it's good but it sounds like it's more for your show."

JEWEL: What a loss for him. Sounds great.

JIMMY CARPER: I really like it.

JEWEL: Well, Rusty, if you're out there, give us a call and we'll talk a little bit about the sock hop.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, and Matt wants to know if Christy is on the phone from last week. He wants to talk to her. I mean, if she's listening, he wants to talk to her.

JEWEL: There you go. So Christy, if you're listening, Matt sitting out in the lobby holding wants to talk to you. And we really appreciate what you did last week.

JIMMY CARPER: That was really, really, really, super.

JEWEL: We appreciate you being willing to do it on After Hours. Is that Rusty? Hold on Rusty, we're going to play with the phones here and see if we can't catch you out there on hold land. Are you there? No? No?

JIMMY CARPER: It's on number three.

JEWEL: On number three. Are you there, Rusty?

RUSTY Yeah.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: All right.

JIMMY CARPER: Hey, Rusty, how are you doing?

JEWEL: Thanks for waiting for us dude.

RUSTY No problem. Listen, I was calling basically to maybe correct something.

MORRISSEY:

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah?

RUSTY I don't know whether you thought it was, but I wanted to publicly thank you, excuse me, and John for doing so

MORRISSEY: much work for that sock hop ball.

JEWEL: And John sitting right here, Rusty. So he's got a big grin on his face.

RUSTY I'm sorry it was left out of the write up in the paper.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Well, that wasn't your fault.

RUSTY I know.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: But let's back up a little bit, you're talking about what sock hop?

RUSTY The sock up for Valentine's Day that we have.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Oh, Rusty. Rusty, baby, I know what sock hop. I'm trying to make you tell the people.

RUSTY We had a sweetheart sock hop ball for the eight-semester workshop's, gay and lesbian, Switchboard, and the Gay

MORRISSEY: Pride committee, and it was on the 11th. We didn't get all the people that we wanted to have there because we got late promoting it, but we had a good time, I think.

JEWEL: I thought it was a great time. Jimmy had a good time.

JIMMY CARPER: Great food and what a show.

JEWEL: Oh yeah, it was spectacular show. I really, really appreciated Arthur putting it together like that.

RUSTY Yeah, he did. And that's what he was going to suggest that we think next. But I want to congratulate you on

MORRISSEY: being nominated for the female grand marshal.

JEWEL: Well, thank you.

JIMMY CARPER: That's right. Our own Jewel Gray.

RUSTY And we are going to push getting you there.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Yeah, that's right because I was nominated among three people. Cecily Win and Ronnie who?

RUSTY Howlin.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Howlin.

RUSTY Howlin.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Well, Ronnie, if you're out there call us and tell us how to pronounce that.

RUSTY Ronnie has the privilege of being the only female member of the garden party.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: That's right. That's why Ronnie stands out.

RUSTY And we need more people like that in our community.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: We sure do.

RUSTY Especially in the women's group.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: That's right, we need some great, we need some real good cross-dressers.

RUSTY And everybody knows that the nominees for grand marshal were Stephen Bradley and Jay Allen from Pacific

MORRISSEY: Street.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

RUSTY Of the honorary, well, we only have one honorary nominee.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: In other words, this person will be the honorary grand marshal.

RUSTY I haven't sleep. Forgive me. Linda Huffman.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Who's the director at the Bering Care Center?

RUSTY Right, and we have to be careful what we say about that.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Yes, we do.

RUSTY But she is a dominant woman. She's one of those few people that not only does the job over Bering, but she's like

MORRISSEY: you, she cares about the client. She really does. And when we lose one, she takes it personally.

JEWEL: She does.

RUSTY That's what I commend her very much for. She's the only nominee right now. I don't know of anybody else.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: And who was nominated for the organization?

RUSTY Ski patrol.

MORRISSEY:

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, good.

RUSTY You got to Act Out South West Houston. You've got Northern Lights all turned into.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Which is the master.

RUSTY Which is the master. We don't want war, don't we?

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: I don't have that article.

JIMMY CARPER: That's going to be a tough decision.

JEWEL: Yeah, it is going to be.

RUSTY We've got a lot of good things going on at Northern Light, especially Michael Cole. Especially wanted me to take

MORRISSEY: the job for getting behind and helping us. And we're going to do some other things later together maybe.

JEWEL: Oh, the last nominee was the Gay Men's Chorus of Houston.

RUSTY That's right. I'm sorry to say I've found out that they are not going to be in town during that week.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Oh, how unfortunate. How unfortunate. I'm sure that will affect the voting. I'm sure that will affect the voting. Well, Rusty, tell me why is it that you're so involved in this. Didn't you just become part of the Pride committee?

RUSTY Yeah, I did. And somebody I think is near and dear to you. NU talk about arranging benefits and raising money. I

MORRISSEY: wanted to know if I wanted to get involved with other work groups, and so we got started doing and we're going to be doing multi-organizational fundraising. I think it's going to get a better class of people.

JIMMY CARPER: Yeah, you're right.

JEWEL: You also get to know the other organizations, up close and personal dealing with them.

RUSTY That's right. One of the big things that we're pushing on the Gay Pride committee is Drag Queens this year. I

MORRISSEY: don't know if you know that or not. But remember who started Stonewall?

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, yeah.

RUSTY It was a bunch of Queens in high heels running. And they actually got liberation started. So everything that we

MORRISSEY: do really through the committee is trying to get all branches of the gay community that's trans-sexual, whether they say it politically correct.

JEWEL: Transgender.

RUSTY Just the leather community, you've got the preppy community, you've got the kids, you've got the deaf

MORRISSEY: community. And that's another thing, we're going to need more volunteers to help interpret during these festivities that are coming out. Also vision impaired people need help with having somebody stand there and describe to them what's really going on and tell them about the colors and things. And we're going to need to work with people like that. And if you got any volunteers that are listening out there, they can always call me at home or they can get a hold of the Pride committee and talk to one of the members.

JEWEL: So you're doing fundraising, you're co-chairing with Evelyn Carroll for the Pride committee. Are you doing fundraising for the Northern Lights?

RUSTY Oh, yes.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: So you're doing fundraising for two groups.

RUSTY PWA.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: PWA Coalition.

RUSTY I think there's Mastery Pet ones. Of course, I'm talking about getting on the one helping her with my hands on

MORRISSEY: type thing with the switchboard, and I just haven't gone through any training.

JEWEL: Well, I think that's an excellent idea and I'll tell you a little secret just between you and me, Rusty. If you hold off on that training thing, I think there will be some new surprises in training very shortly. And I think you'd like to be part of that first training class coming out.

RUSTY I'm not sure I would like to get involved.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Well, I know that as a person from a Switchboard, I'd be proud for you to be part of it. And I know there are several other members here sitting here that-

JIMMY CARPER: You bet.

JEWEL: You would feel like that would be a plus, too.

RUSTY And also, I've got some experience but I can handle those funds at bang. I can handle.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: That's true. That's certainly true, those phones are bearing. Well, Rusty, I really appreciate you calling tonight. And I'm going to talk a little bit about Pride Week coming up and talk a little about the time change, and what's going to happen in some of the events that are going to be going on, I'm going to run down a little rundown here. I appreciate you calling us tonight and stay in touch, we always like to talk to you.

RUSTY Thanks.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: OK.

RUSTY Bye, bye.

MORRISSEY:

JEWEL: Bye. Well, if you haven't heard, that was Rusty Morrissey. He was a co-chair of the gay and lesbian Pride Week committee. He co-chairs with Evan Carroll and they had a great fundraiser recently, a sock hop, and it went well. And if you weren't there, listen, you wanted to be there. Believe me.

JIMMY CARPER: So now, we all have to go to Gay Pride meetings.

JEWEL: That's right, to elect me.

JIMMY CARPER: On March 15 and vote for Jewel.

JEWEL: That's right, to vote for me. you have to be there to make a vote, actually you had to be there at two consecutive meetings to make a vote.

JIMMY CARPER: Is that right?

JEWEL: They meet every week. Don't they meet every week? You have to be two consecutive meetings. So if you haven't been to already to a meeting, it's too late. I can't stuff the ballot box.

WOMAN: [INAUDIBLE].

JEWEL: I don't think that would work. That would work. I don't think that would work. Anyway, to talk a little bit about Gay Pride in the voice this week, they were talking about Gay Pride in what's going on. I want to give you a quick little rundown a theme for this year's Pride celebration is Houston Wall 25. And that's commemorating 25 years since Stonewall has happened.

To accommodate those planning to attend the monumental Stonewall 25 event this year, Houston's local observation of pride has had a different schedule this year. The Pride Week for 94 parade-- I mean, the Pride Week for 94 has been moved up to June 3 through the 12, now that's a week earlier than it usually is, or is it two weeks earlier?

JIMMY CARPER: Two weeks.

JEWEL: Two weeks earlier than it usually is. It's twice a month. Cool. Cool. It's two weeks earlier than it usually is because during the week that it usually is, the huge celebration in New York is going to be going on. And we want to make sure that everybody who can go can go without losing out on their local gay Pride Week. Let me go back.

Followed by a rally in Buffalo Bayou Park scheduled to take place on the 12th, that evening of the 12th, and I believe it's going to be rather early. I think the parade is supposed to start at 1:00. Is 1:00 now? It was 12:00. There was such a hoopla with the churches and some of the other organizations. So that they changed it to 1:00.

WOMAN: Police told us we had to have it, we don't have it before 1:00.

JEWEL: We have to have it before 1:00?

WOMAN: We cannot have it.

JEWEL: We cannot have it before 1:00. The City of Houston has decided we cannot have it before 1:00, so 1:00 will be the time. Other special events are planned for that week, they're planning a gay and lesbian film festival as well as workshops, seminars, concerts, and other fair. The committee is also working on a video project in cooperation with alternative broadcast service to produce a six segment program for cable television spotlighting the parade, and the Houston Lesbian and Gay Pride.

Several pride committees are planning their informational mail outs for early March and more detailed list of events will be available soon. I was wrong about the Pride committee meetings, there will be one. Oh, you can't go there. Well, there's only one. March 15 will be the general meeting, but you had to have been there one meeting before to vote. So you have to be there two consecutive meetings to vote.

JIMMY CARPER: That's right. So we can't stuff it.

JEWEL: We can't stuff the ballot box. But you can celebrate St. Patty's Day come a couple of days after that meeting at Pacific Street to benefit the Pride committee. So keep that in mind for St. Patty's Day at Pacific Street to benefit the Pride committee. And the more the Pride committee has benefited, the better our Pride Parade and the rally will be. March 15 to vote. Be sure that you attend one of these fundraisers. I mean, what is it \$10 or a door charge somewhere? I mean, what is that? A movie? A movie out one night for two?

JIMMY CARPER: Shoot, it's not.

JEWEL: Not really.

JIMMY CARPER: It's like \$6.75 or something for a movie.

JEWEL: That's no popcorn.

JIMMY CARPER: About \$5 for popcorn.

JEWEL: That's right. So finding your pocket to participate in one of these Pride committee.

JIMMY CARPER: You'd be amazed how much fun it is.

JEWEL: And participate, help put this together. I mean, a lot of you people out there, a lot of the people out there, a lot of you people.

JIMMY CARPER: A lot of you.

JEWEL: A lot of you. How is it that--

JIMMY CARPER: You. You out there.

JEWEL: You, specifically directly, whose what I'm thinking about? Edmundo wants us to talk to.

JIMMY CARPER: You.

JEWEL: You out there sitting in your chair wanting to be part of something, this is an easy way to do it, go out and have a good time. Just one of these benefits, that's an easy way to participate and help in the community. These benefits are necessary to keep some of these organizations running. And without the kindness and generosity of those people who do support these things, a lot of things that you hear about and a lot of things that happen in this city would not happen. You can be very important without being very involved. Join one of these benefits.

JIMMY CARPER: There you go.

JEWEL: I'm having a hard time. Well, I'm going to let Jimmy take over for about 30 minutes.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, you are?

JEWEL: Yes.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, OK.

JEWEL: But I do want to slip in something in here for Dan at Gentry's. Dan is doing the soirée Aubergine.

JIMMY CARPER: Soirée Aubergine.

JEWEL: The 1994 raffle benefiting, guess who? The Bering Care Center Meals program, that means me folks. That means me. And if I have more money, I can feed people better than they're being fed now. Believe me that's an important thing at the care center.

We have a lot of people that come there and use the services there and they get a hot meal, they get a breakfast, and we try to supplement whenever we can for that occasional Mr. Stone Soup. People end up in the hospital, they miss their days Stone Soup and we try to make sure people don't go hungry. And we could sure use some extra money right now, I think I'm working at feeding the meals that we feed. I think we feed something like 19,000 meals a year. I think that was the figure, it was either 14,000 or 19,000 meals a year.

JIMMY CARPER: That's up that far.

JEWEL: You have to understand because we're dealing between 30 and 50 people a day, 20 days a month. I'm trying to figure in my head.

JIMMY CARPER: Somebody can do the math.

JEWEL: Yeah, somebody else can. Maybe it's 1,900, no, it's got to be 19,000 meals.

JIMMY CARPER: You've got two a day.

JEWEL: Believe it or not, I'm the one who came up with that figure by multiplying and subtracting and adding, but I've forgotten it. But Stacey Cohn goes there could give it to you if you want to call her and find out if she's a she's there at the Bering Service Community Foundation, you get a hold of them. But this meals program is very important. And one of the things that they're doing at the soiree.

JIMMY CARPER: Yes.

JEWEL: I have a hard time with French. I took two years of French, believe it or not. And all I know is that Bijou has a grande bouche. That's all I know is that Jewel has a big mouth, and I don't even know has "a." I just know Bijou and grande bouche.

JIMMY CARPER: All I know is voulez-vous coucher avec moi.

JEWEL: Voulez-vous.

JIMMY CARPER: Coucher.

JEWEL: What is that?

JIMMY CARPER: In English. Would you like to go to bed with me?

JEWEL: Write that down for me. Write that right here. Write that in phonetically so that I can pronounce it right. That's better than where's the bathroom, where's the toilet?

JIMMY CARPER: That's right.

JEWEL: But one of the things that they're doing at the soiree is they're raffling off a motorcycle, a \$4,400 Yamaha. It's a Sikatu, let me see if that's right. Courtesy of action cycles and it's \$2 for tickets. I got mine. You bet I got mine. My bike is sitting in the driveway wishing it had more money and very lonely. Somebody cannibalized my bike. I can't believe it. We'll whine about that later.

JIMMY CARPER: Cannibalized your bike?

JEWEL: They came up with a screwdriver and took pieces of my bike.

JIMMY CARPER: No.

JEWEL: Yes. And let me tell you girl, I cruise the entire complex looking at every single motorcycle in the complex if they had the right kind of light on their motorcycle.

JIMMY CARPER: On your patio?

JEWEL: Out in my driveway.

JIMMY CARPER: Damn.

JEWEL: It's out in my driveway and my parking spot and the car is pushed up against it. Somebody had to come up there with their little screwdriver, it was taken apart carefully. It was obvious that somebody wanted to use it. It wasn't ripped off or snared by anything or knocked off when I dropped it something like that. They took it off with a screwdriver, patiently taking make the screws with it.

JIMMY CARPER: That's incredible.

JEWEL: I was so upset. Oh, well. My bike is sitting there. I have bought my ticket if you are interested and this is a good place to spend that \$2. It's a possibility you can't win if you don't put your \$2 in. That's the only sure thing, you can't win if you don't try. He wanted to hang out a little while tonight because the secret is that he might be making a splash announcement here in a couple of days about joining up with After Hours.

JIMMY CARPER: No kidding.

JEWEL: That's a secret. Don't tell anybody.

JIMMY CARPER: OK.

JEWEL: But he wanted to be here tonight and was unable to. Hi, Polo. We love you and stay under those covers guy. You sounded awful tonight and I don't want you to sound awful next month. JEWEL: Oh, man. When we were there for the Super Bowl, we went to watch the Super Bowl there. And I told everyone, I said, there is no place finer than to watch a Super Bowl surrounded by Queens. I'm telling you what, when the Dallas cheerleaders showed up, I knew I was in heaven. And they were magnificent. They were just magnificent. We laughed and cried because I was a KC fan.
