And started the show out, it was mostly geared toward gay men. I remember that with some lesbian overtones. And then he got some women involved. And people kind of came and went, and then he laughed, and we started getting other folks involved. We got transgendered people involved, we got bisexual people involved, more lesbians, because, you know, I can sit here every week and talk about queer issues and transgendered issues and bisexual issues. But I ain't one. You know, it really makes a difference.

I've made that comment in talking about transgender people of color that I don't feel qualified to talk about that because I don't face those same issues, right? And boy, finding transgender people of color to open up is talking about looking for the proverbial needle in a haystack. We know they're there. But getting them to come forward is not easy. Has marathon gotten any easier?

And he jokes about having had three listeners and the dog who paid attention. But it was it was true. It was one of the first shows. And I guess what we're saying here is folks were asking for your money in a very roundabout way. You know,

So when we come back, then when we come back on the air next month, we should have some very interesting information about what the Human Rights Campaign Fund said, what they believe in, we should be able to tell you because we'll tell you directly out of their mouths. It's very interesting. I've told you this before, but the only reason up until they found out there was a transgender radio show. They were not interested in talking to us. Oh, and then they discovered that we could make really bad publicity. And then it was like, Well, yes. Mr. Palmer? Sure, we'll be glad to talk to you works. Another example of why KPFT is worth the money. And we have some other news. Now, this is very exciting on October 2, and third, well there and we are going to be holding an event called National transgender lobby that Yes. Now the idea behind this is that we are going to be having at least two representatives from every state in the country, go to Washington, DC to lobby their congress people. And in fact, here in Houston, thanks to Wendy Allen. We have many appointments with our legislators in in, in Washington. But while we're going to be there, six of us had been invited to go to the White House. Yes, that's the real White House, where were the Clintons live? Yes. And we are going to be meeting with a presidential aide. Now, as far as I know, that's the first time ever, that a transgendered people have been invited to the White House. And I'm very proud, very proud and very pleased that I'm one of the six people. But even more importantly, is that I'm very aware of the responsibility that we have. I'm on the internet. And since the announcement has gone out that we will be going to the White House. My mailbox has been flooded by people who are telling me what it is they think we ought to be telling the President. Well, we're not meeting with President. We're not even meeting with Hillary, we're not even meeting with socks. We are meeting with the presidential aide. Hey, it's a foot in the door, baby. It is but I want the listeners to be aware that yes, we are aware of the responsibility that we have. The people who are going to be meeting with this aid as of right now are Phyllis fry.
