

GREG: And the thing about the synonyms is we have so many synonyms for this, but still people are stuck in the missionary position. And perhaps we need to start exploring new ways. One thing we know about being in relationships is the intimacy is found in many different venues, not just in one.

MICHAEL OK. Now, while we're playing the mood-change music, I want you to run and get your pens and paper. And that's

CRAWFORD: the way you can jot down the list. And say, you're on that fifth date with whoever, these are a couple of things you can-- I don't know. When you're trying to express what you want, these are some of the things you could say.

GREG: Scrumping, humping, bumping, bopping, thumping, knocking boots, poking, drilling, shagging, burying the pickle, boning, dogging, riding, grinding, shoop, slam, shrug, bump and grind, horizontal bops, slam dance, laying pipe, bugging, doing the laundry, parallel parking, cooking and chilling, mashing, chum and bum, dredging, slapping beaver, doing the strange, boffing, trim, action.

Getting busy, whoopee, the nasty, hide the salami, balling, screw, kicking at the big slip, quickie, in and out, fluid exchange, which we don't want to do. Physical union, fornication, copulating, nookie, wild thing, 15 minutes is up, hoochie-coochie, romping, poontang, bonking, giving in the happy, donut, hoagie dipping, roll in the hay, deflower, make a wet spot, stuff the turkey.

Pile driving, nightcap, jizz injection, ride the white horse, driving the red Corvette, sowing oats, planning the seed, cranking, taking a test drive, bada boom bada bing, the business, grooving, nailing, the big plunge, docking the submarine, walking Johnny, working it, backseat boogie, 12-pack workout, pinning, home run, touchdown, holding one score, free throw, slam dunk, juicing, head banging, unloading, rock the Casbah.

Kiss the sky, mojo rising, missionary mingle, ice the cake, dip the wick, mow the lawn, stoke the fire, come through the front door, stab in the dark, making bacon, and an appointment with the gentleman.

MICHAEL OK. Let's say you don't want to say-- well, you want to do that word we can't say on the air because the FCC

CRAWFORD: don't allow it, those were a whole bunch of words you can use instead. And it's really funny because while you're listening to KPFT Houston 90.1 FM, Jimmy was standing in the background literally shaking as Greg read the list.

HOST 3: He was writhing.

MICHAEL Oh, OK. Sorry. Writhing. Greg, I want to thank you for stopping by.

CRAWFORD:

GREG: Well, thank you. It was really fun.

MICHAEL And are there like any final comments? Wait, plug what you do. Yeah.

CRAWFORD:

GREG: Oh, come to Montrose Counseling Center. In fact, we're going to have a workshop on September 7. It's free to all men, gay and bisexual men, which is the secret of long-term relationships. So if you really want to find out what the secret is, and I'll give you just a little hint, there really is no secret if you want to stay together. There you go. It's all about commitment. But we're going to talk about that.

MICHAEL OK, what's the phone number?

CRAWFORD:

GREG: 529-0037 at Montrose Counseling Center. That's Wednesday, September 7 at 7 o'clock, 7:00 to 9:00 and 529-0037.

MICHAEL OK, great. Thank you.

CRAWFORD:

GREG: Thank you.

MICHAEL OK. That was "The Ubiquitous Mr. Lovegrove from Dead Can Dance. And you're listening to *After Hours* here on **CRAWFORD:** KPFT Houston. I'm Michael Crawford.

ERIC DEUTSCH: I'm Eric Deutsch.

MICHAEL And?

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: And up ahead, we still have some explicit stories from James Dean's sex life. I'm going to have a request from Pansy Division. We got a shout out to Michael out there. And now for--

MICHAEL Well, we need to plug our queer caravan the Lollapalooza again.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Yeah, we've got a name-- we got a list of names going. We got quite a few. And if you'd like to, just say that you're going to be there. Maybe we can meet up around one of the mist tents. They are so popular.

MICHAEL Exactly.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: You can call at 526-KPFT.

MICHAEL Or you can leave a message at 866-4007.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: OK. Let's see the Beastie Boys at "Sabotage."

MICHAEL No. No. No.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: That's not "Sabotage?"

MICHAEL No. That was before, and that didn't work out. We're over "Sabotage." We're on to the new single.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Been there, done that.

MICHAEL OK, great. What's the new single? "Get It Together."

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Yeah, the new single is "Get It Together."

MICHAEL OK, great.

CRAWFORD:

JOHN BEAUPRE: Here we are in the lobby of the Pennsylvania Hotel across from Penn station. And this has served as a kind of queer central for all these events. We heard that somewhere here, in an exposition area, they were selling a kind of sunglasses in which there was embedded a tiny television set, so you could go out in the sunlight and watch your favorite TV program all at the same time. And we have to find those sunglasses.

Your name is?

PERSON 1: Oh, I'm Unicorn from San Francisco.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Hi, Unicorn from San Francisco. You bought--

PERSON 1: I bought--

JOHN BEAUPRE: --your own official Unity 94 bag in which you put a Unity 94 bag to the other.

PERSON 1: I put two Unity 94 bags in it. And I--

JOHN BEAUPRE: You got a corner on the market.

PERSON 1: And I'm wearing one.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Why did you buy these?

PERSON 1: Because I love to shop.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Now, if you actually-- honestly, if you saw this merchandise in Macy's, or Bloomingdale's, or Nordstrom's, would you have actually bought that?

PERSON 2: Without this on it?

JOHN BEAUPRE: Without the symbols on it?

PERSON 2: No. I wouldn't have.

JOHN BEAUPRE: You wouldn't have?

PERSON 2: No.

JOHN BEAUPRE: In other words, it was a cheap piece of merchandise. Just because they stamped on a gay symbol, you--

PERSON 2: No, no, no.

PERSON 1: Oh, no--

PERSON 2: It's not cheap.

PERSON 1: --no, no. It's quality merchandise.

PERSON 2: And for the memory--

JOHN BEAUPRE: Oh, it's an expensive piece of merchandise?

PERSON 1: Well, no it's quality.

PERSON 2: This one was more than his.

PERSON 1: It's inexpensive, but it is quality. I checked out the seams and the textures and stuff. It's not going to rip real easily.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Who we're talking to?

PERSON 3: Suzanne.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Suzanne, describe the jewelry we're looking at here.

PERSON 3: This is all handmade from papier mache. Each piece is an original. And then it's the same.

JOHN BEAUPRE: These are original-- but these two look actually an awful lot like.

PERSON 3: Yeah. But in fact, they're not. They have same color combination.

JOHN BEAUPRE: A lot like lesbians and gay men.

PERSON 3: Right.

JOHN BEAUPRE: No two are alike.

PERSON 3: Exactly.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Some of them look alike, but not quite the same. And they're on sale?

PERSON 3: Yeah, we've got a special on today. There are two for \$15.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Two triangles for \$15.

PERSON 3: Yep.

JOHN BEAUPRE: So it's sort of an obfuscated oblong that you can get for \$15.

PERSON 3: Right.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Thank you. We're at one of the booths here. And we have in our hands "Game can change the world," the official candy bar of Gay Games for the gay bar. Can you tell me what else is in this?

PERSON 4: That's milk chocolate.

JOHN BEAUPRE: So what makes it a gay bar?

PERSON 4: The label.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Oh, just the label? Have you had one yet?

PERSON 4: Yeah, I just finished one.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Oh, really? Are they good?

PERSON 4: Very good.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Are they better than like Hershey's or Nestle's?

PERSON 4: Well, no.

JOHN BEAUPRE: No, they're not? If you had-- honestly, be really honest. If you were going over to the candy store at Penn station and you had to spend your money on some chocolate, would you buy Toblerone or Nestle's, or would you buy a gay bar if it was being sold there?

PERSON 4: I'd buy a gay bar with my lesbian money.

JOHN BEAUPRE: There you go. OK. That's good. And how much do they sell for?

PERSON 4: \$1.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Actually, let's open one and do a little sample, see if people really like them. Does anyone here want a free taste of a gay bar?

CROWD: Sure.

JOHN BEAUPRE: There you go. Now, honestly, tell this microphone here if you think that's better than Hershey's or better than Nestle?

WOMAN: Definitely better than Nestle's.

[INTERPOSING VOICES]

MAN: Definitely.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Better than Nestle's?

MAN: It's creamier. Yeah, it's a gay bar. You got to get one.

JOHN BEAUPRE: OK. We're going to come back and get some more gay bars later, OK?

PERSON 4: OK, see you later.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Bye. Here we are. We found them, the television glasses. Have you heard about these? This is-- who are we talking to here?

JACKIE: Jackie.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Jackie, you can wear these glasses and watch TV at the same time? Is it a good view in there?

PERSON 5: Oh, yeah.

* Go ahead. You can change the [INAUDIBLE]

JACKIE: No problem.

* Slide up and down for focus.

JACKIE: No.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Just no? Would you pay for a view of snow like that?

JACKIE: No, but I would pay for a good view of what it was supposed to be.

JOHN BEAUPRE: And what are these running for?

SELLER: \$800.

JOHN BEAUPRE: \$800? I definitely-- can you get a Home Shopping Network on here?

SELLER: Yes.

JOHN BEAUPRE: How do you do that?

JACKIE: You can do one thing and then do something else at the same time together.

JOHN BEAUPRE: Yeah, I guess if you were reading your Charles Dickens' *Tale of Two Cities*, you could always be watching the movie at the same time. Maybe that's what virtual entertainment is all about.

OK, I'm going to watch these for a few minutes and see what else is on TV. I think what I've got is an old episode of *I Love Lucy*-- no, I'm sorry. It's Mary Tyler Moore. Oh, this is the one where Mary gets her toe stuck in the water faucet and she can't get out of the bathtub. I love that one. For *This Way Out*, I'm John Beaupre. This is still stuck in there. Oh, this is good one. I love this one. This is great.

MICHAEL OK, I apologize. I thought it was going to be funny, OK? Jesus! People are so hypocritical. OK, but I'm going to **CRAWFORD:** make up for it now. Actually-- oh, I should probably tell you what you heard. That was this little piece from *This Way Out*, making fun of all the stupid crap that people were selling during Stonewall 25 in New York. Yes?

ERIC DEUTSCH: I forgot my Shades Of Gray catalog.

MICHAEL Yeah. We could have made fun of lots of stupid stuff.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Talking about the merchandising-- -disement of our queer shirt.

MICHAEL The queer movement. And OK, like the polo shirts that have the red ribbon already attached.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: And the cut out red ribbon bumper stickers.

MICHAEL And the red ribbon tattoo.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: And the red ribbon beach towel.

MICHAEL The sequins red ribbon, and the leather red ribbon. That's the [INAUDIBLE] red ribbon. Oh, God. Oh, wait, can we
CRAWFORD: talk really bad about the rainbow flag now?

ERIC DEUTSCH: Yeah, let's face it.

MICHAEL OK, great, because I personally think that the rainbow flag is going the way of the red ribbon. While at one time,
CRAWFORD: it may have seemed OK an OK symbol of concern or whatever, it's becoming just trendy and totally a sham. I mean, I'll admit that in '91, and maybe even in '92, I wore the rainbow, the freedom--

ERIC DEUTSCH: Rings.

MICHAEL --rings?

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Yeah.

MICHAEL Yeah, but I don't wear those anymore. And I think it's pretty appalling that people slap a rainbow sticker on the
CRAWFORD: back of their car and say that they're out, when most heterosexuals don't know what it means-- in fact, most queers don't know what it means. So it's a pretty useless symbol of, pretty useless excuse for activism. OK.

ERIC DEUTSCH: Exactly, I agree completely.

MICHAEL Oh, great.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Are we Nine Inch Nails?

MICHAEL Oh, yeah. We're going to Nine Inch Nails now, which is how I'm going to make up for that *This Way Out*'s piece.
CRAWFORD: And this is one of my very, very favorite songs on this album. Actually, I love every song on this album.

ERIC DEUTSCH: Being that it's the anniversary of the Charles Manson murders-- we know that he recorded the album in the Manson House that-- in the--

MICHAEL Where Sharon Tate was murdered.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Sharon Tate was murdered.

MICHAEL I didn't know it was that anniversary. But thanks.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Well, it was the week before Woodstock.

MICHAEL Oh, OK. Which is going on right now. And if you were to watch MTV, they would tell you to call pay per view and
CRAWFORD: request it.

ERIC DEUTSCH: Jimmy and you and I are all covered in mud and naked in here. We're celebrating Woodstock.

MICHAEL Hey, hey, mudslide in the lobby! OK, this is our "Ruiner" from Nine Inch Nails from the album *The Downward Spiral*.

OK that was the Nine Inch Nails. The song was "Ruiner" from the album *The Downward Spiral*. Hey! Yeah, you got to love it. It's very, very loose. And we're not talking about-- I'm not talking about any part of my anatomy.

ERIC DEUTSCH: I know but you're using a reference that is very personal.

MICHAEL OK, great. We've been talking very personal here tonight. Oh, also-- well, right now, we're going to be doing
CRAWFORD: announcements, which is basically-- excuse me, hello, thank you-- which is basically the segment where we announce what's going on in our community. And I'll go first. OK.

MCCR, Metropolitan Community Church of the Resurrection, sent out a press release saying that the Reverend Lasher is going to conduct a homosexuality and The Bible seminar.

"Everyone has heard what the bible is supposed to say about homosexuality. That it is a sin. That it is an abomination. And that you are not loved. ERIC DEUTSCH: OK, all you Generation Xers and Nexters, the 20-something of Houston, a group for young adults, ages 20 to 29, addressing issues concerning bisexuals, lesbians, gays. What am I announcing?

MICHAEL Oh, the meeting.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: They--

MICHAEL Meet every Thursday.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: It doesn't say that on here.

MICHAEL Oh. Well, it does. They do.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: They meet every Thursday, if you would refer to a calendar on--

MICHAEL On the back.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: --the back-- double side printing-- at 7:30.

MICHAEL At Bering Memorial Church.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: It's a lovely church. Probably, they meet in the parlor.

MICHAEL They do in the parlor. Everybody who's anybody meets in the parlor.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Get there early to reserve a couch seat. If you'd like more information, please contact Quincy at 541-4217.

MICHAEL OK. The gay comedy jam, freedom tour--

CRAWFORD:

MAN: Yes!

ERIC DEUTSCH: Yes.

MICHAEL --Freedom tour featuring gay stand up comics performing gay standup comedy. Jesus, OK.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: You'd love Lea DeLaria.

MICHAEL Well, it doesn't say her. It says, direct from Las Vegas on national tour. Last Houston appearance for 1994. Don't

CRAWFORD: miss it. It's going to be on Monday, August 15, which is next Monday-- two shows, one at 7:30, one at 9:45.

And I can't tell you how much the tickets are. But tickets are available at the club, which is the Laff Stop, which is 1952 A West Gray in the River Oaks Shopping Center. For more information, you can call 524-2333. And let's see, starring Scott Kennedy, starring Kevin May, who Jimmy knows and has done.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Name dropper.

JIMMY: --really well. What, Tenneco, or I used to work with him?

ERIC DEUTSCH: All of it.

MICHAEL Well, the fact that you used to work.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: No, no. No, that was-- that's been a while. And the special guest--

MICHAEL The ever-lovely Nancy Ford.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: Ta-da!

MICHAEL Wait, she's having a birthday party soon.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: Yes, she is.

MICHAEL Do you have information on that?

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: She's popping up just all over the place.

MICHAEL Where is that information? Somebody find that for us. Hey, Sarah, find the information on Nancy Ford's birthday

CRAWFORD: party, should be in the Houston press.

JIMMY: OK. And while we're talking about that, there's going to be a car wash tomorrow at EJ's, which is located on Ralph and Westheimer. It's a fundraiser to send the softball team to the gay world series in Nashville. Let's see. Car wash at noon. And about 3:00 PM, there's going to be barbecue with a show that starts at 7:00, so it's a fundraiser all day long. Rainbow and BJ Williams will co-emcee.

MICHAEL Oh, I thought that was-- OK, never mind.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Is Rainbow a friend of the station?

MICHAEL See?

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: All right.

MICHAEL Cool. Hey!

CRAWFORD:

MICHAEL Triangle dozens.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: [INAUDIBLE].

ERIC DEUTSCH: And that'll probably be the only event happening in Houston.

[LAUGHTER]

ERIC DEUTSCH: Wait.

MICHAEL Now that you mention it, we have a couple of months to plan.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: Yeah.

MICHAEL OK.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: Yeah. What is Greg Cason doing? I mean, he did put together--

ERIC DEUTSCH: He looks cute.

JIMMY: --the first--

MICHAEL Yeah.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: --National Coming Out.

MICHAEL I mean, he was-- OK. We're going to talk about Greg. And hopefully, he's not listening, so he won't be

CRAWFORD: embarrassed while he's driving home. But he was totally cute, and he was totally cool and really, really sweet and really nice.

JIMMY: He is always cute.

ERIC DEUTSCH: And he knew his stuff. So if you want to lay on anyone's couch--

JIMMY: Wouldn't you like him to know your stuff?

MICHAEL And it's really weird because when you think of like mental health educators, and counselors, and that kind of

CRAWFORD: stuff, you don't think of people like Greg.

JIMMY: No. You think of these--

ERIC DEUTSCH: You think about Freud.

JIMMY: --kind of like really stodgy folks--

MICHAEL Yeah

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: --somebody who's actually going to understand you.

MICHAEL In tweed with leather patches and paunches and stuff. Well, Greg's cool. So if you have any problems, call him at

CRAWFORD: the Montrose Counseling Center.

JIMMY: 529-0037.

MICHAEL Cool. Thanks, Greg. We're not going to do this announcement here for the Texas Gay Rodeo Association because
CRAWFORD: well-- gay ro--

JIMMY: The Texas Rodeo was in Austin this year.

MICHAEL Didn't I just say we weren't going to announce that?

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Oh!

MICHAEL Well, I mean, because it's promoting cruelty to animals.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: Really? What?

ERIC DEUTSCH: If you have any questions--

JIMMY: I've been there.

ERIC DEUTSCH: --214-720-6051.

JIMMY: They don't do those things anymore--

MICHAEL OK.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: --cruelty things.

ERIC DEUTSCH: And also, if you have any questions about anything or the Lollapalooza trip, 526-5738.

JIMMY: The most cruel thing they do is put underwear on goats.

MICHAEL Isn't it great that we can have on air fights? Love our show.

CRAWFORD:

ERIC DEUTSCH: Yeah.

JIMMY: I had a great time at the rodeo when it was in Houston.

MICHAEL OK. Well, I'll go this time.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: Well, it's in Austin.

MICHAEL Oh, I wouldn't want to go there for that. OK. So call us if you're going to Lollapalooza and you're queer at 866-

CRAWFORD: 4007 or 526-573-8526 KPFT. And in mere seconds, we're going to be going to the Queer Music Zone, featuring Jimmy.

JIMMY: Oh!

MICHAEL OK. And with that-- I don't know. That--

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: That ought to do it, huh?

ERIC DEUTSCH: Yeah.

MICHAEL That did it. OK.

CRAWFORD:

JIMMY: Here we go.

Hello, Houston. It's Jimmy with the QMZ, the Queer Music Zone, heard every week on *After Hours*, a continuing tradition on KPFT Houston 90.1 FM. *After Hours*, the most popular gay and lesbian show that no one knows about. And the QMZ, of course, Queer Music Zone, music by out, gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender artists.

Now we know we have problems finding transgender artists. But hey, when we find them, we play them. Starting out tonight, number one, we've got a request that someone called in really early. And this is super cool because hey, folks out there are listening. This is a request from Pansy Division's latest album, we've only been playing it a couple of weeks, and it's my favorite song. It's called "Kissed."

Now coming up a new group to *After Hours* and QMZ, some music that I got via Eric. And it's a group called Huggy Bear. Eric, can you tell us a little about Huggy Bear?

ERIC DEUTSCH: Yes, it's our group.

JIMMY: Hey, cool!

ERIC DEUTSCH: No. I think they're from London. And they've been around for a while because, like Anonymous Boy puts dudes wearing huggy bear concert T-shirts in his cartoons. And they're all queer, and they're really grooving.

JIMMY: Yeah. I've got a kind of a selection of kind of shorts. And I think I'm starting in the middle of the song, and I'm going through, maybe, 1 and 1/2 more because I kind of like this. This album is more like something you sit down and listen to the whole thing.

ERIC DEUTSCH: Yeah.

JIMMY: It's kind of a continuous thing. So I'm just taking an excerpt.

ERIC DEUTSCH: Yeah, I didn't like it the first time. But the second time I heard it, I really liked it.

JIMMY: Yeah.
