JIMMY CARPER: Isn't that Chumbawamba? OK. That's also from Eric. Eric has been supplying a lot of the QMZ tonight. Huggy Bear and Chumbawamba. And you may be hearing more of this good stuff. Now, we've got a request. Of course, we always take requests for queer music on the UMC. This one is from George. And it's kind of works in with, what's going on with that kind of--

SPEAKER 1: It's the '90s. I can accept anything.

JIMMY CARPER: OK. And so for George, Melissa Etheridge and his fave Come to My Window.

(SINGING) Come to my window.

JIMMY CARPER: All right, Melissa Etheridge and "Come to My Window." You're listening to it on the QMZ which is heard every week on *After Hours*, a continuing tradition on KPFT Houston. And now, we have one more-- one more request.

You wanted to do zine reviews, well, basically give us an idea of where you're getting this from and then have at it.

SPEAKER 1: All right this is from Anonymous Boy's other zine, violin outbreak.

JIMMY CARPER: [INAUDIBLE]

SPEAKER 1: Anonymous Boy drawing cartoons.

JIMMY CARPER: Oh, OK, great, thanks.

SPEAKER 1: He's just called Anonymous boy.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, great.

SPEAKER 1: Available out of New York City. OK, so these are his zine reviews. And the reason I like his zine reviews is because everything he reviews is \$1. And let's see. The first one is my zine.

[LAUGHTER]

JIMMY CARPER: No, not a bit of self interest.

SPEAKER 1: Yeah, homo boy. And it's really cool. It's on its fourth issue. As you remember, the third issue was the sell out issue with Dennis Cooper and everything.

JIMMY CARPER: And the new issue is entitled the Andy Warhol issue?

SPEAKER 1: That's correct.

JIMMY CARPER: OK, great.

SPEAKER 1: And it's available across the nation and every great bookstore. And it's \$1. And it's just-- it's an anthology of different bar stories and different cool pictures from the factory years with Andy Warhol and my own review of the ex girl fashion show hosted by Kim Gordon of Sonic Youth. Next one is a really cool zine called Cheese, not necessarily homo. But on the cover, there's a picture of Jane Fonda from her Barbarella years. And it's a zine dedicated to cheese and cheesy culture. It's very enjoyable to read and filled with cheese facts. This has very important article on French fry etiquette which asks the question, why is it when you have a plate of french fries everybody thinks it's OK to pick them off your plate? And then answers the question with categorisations of french fry gophers which is spelled correctly. An upcoming gig listing a column called on the beat and-- let's see, lyrics to cheater songs, [INAUDIBLE].

Boink, which is for boys and girls supposedly inspired by sassy magazine because they hate it so much. The first issue includes a debate over whether briefs or boxer shorts make better underwear. And it's pretty sick with GG going on about raping people on stage and how they deserve it, also a really great cartoon called, Spot the Owl, fanzine and punk record reviews an editorial, also spelled incorrectly on homos in the military, and a whole lot more. I would just like to make a speech. When you go to crossroads market, please say, hey, where's the zine section? And they'll say, well, we only have one or two. And you'll say, well, that's ridiculous because queer literature is sparse enough but there's a whole homo punk, literary, intelligent, alternative indie rock scene going on. JIMMY CARPER: No, it's not. It's a series of interviews with men-- gay men, gay bisexual men about the first time they were anally penetrated. We interviewed Jimmy a few days ago, hysterical story. And we're looking for other people to interview and so on and so forth. SPEAKER 2: It's to celebrate our sexuality and that's the wonderful part.

JIMMY CARPER: Exactly. And hopefully--

SPEAKER 2: And thanks. I really enjoyed it.

JIMMY CARPER: And hopefully, young people will see it and realize that it's not bad being a fag. And hey, this is one of the cool things we can do. Let's see. Since we were doing the whole zine thing, I think it would be fitting to play another band that's going to be at Lollapalooza. And that band is Smashing Pumpkins. And we're going to be playing a song from the first album, *Gish*.

SPEAKER 1: *Gish*.

JIMMY CARPER: And the song is entitled "Bury"-- wait, let's try that again. OK, and the song is entitled "Bury Me."
