The month of March ended on a high note for Iowa gays and lesbians as civil rights bill SF 22 A one was passed by the full state Senate and a committee of the State House. The bill adds sexual orientation to the list of classes protected from discrimination in employment, housing, credit and education in the Iowa Civil Rights Code. The 28 to 21 vote in the Senate was probably the

most challenging step towards the bill's passage since the same legislation died in a Senate committee in 1989. After passing in the house, this time just a few hours after the Senate when the House Judiciary Committee approved 22 a one by a whopping 14 to two with two abstentions, and a house floor vote and signature by the governor are expected to make the bill law in a matter of weeks. The key lobbying group in the effort to make Iowa the sixth of the United States to protect gays and lesbians from discrimination has been idea, Iowa dignity and equality advocates whose Legislative Director Michael current remarked, if it can happen in Iowa, it can happen anywhere.

And soon after winning their civil rights in the city of New Orleans, Louisiana, gays and lesbians now have their first statewide protections against discrimination. Governor Edwin Edwards has signed an executive order banning discrimination by state agencies in employment services and contract awards. However, the honors authority does not extend to counties cities or school districts.

A few weeks ago we told you about the controversy surrounding popular University of Colorado Head Football Coach Bill McCartney activist charged McCartney with improperly using his affiliation with the university in his advisory board capacity with a right wing Christian political group called Colorado for family values. At the minimum 50,000 signatures are validated. Colorado will vote on whether or not they wish to be the first state in the country to write discrimination of gays and lesbians into their constitution.
