Well, that's that's also why he's involved in LF, which is Adults for Legal Freedom. And that's the fight against what Jew Don Boney and Helen Huey are doing.

What are you talking about the adult bookstore?

J Jimmy Carper 14:47

Yes.

S Sarah DePalma 14:48

Because, you know, I have no feelings back.

J Jimmy Carper 14:51

I know, it's a First Amendment thing. And you know, if it's adult bookstores now, it's gay bars later. It's It's the [INAUDIBLE].

I don't have any I don't have a problem with it with the bookstores. I have a problem with some of the topless bars. That's-. So you've Ray comes on ee'll talk about that because I have some real issues with that so-.

Oh, yeah. Yeah. And if there's anything that KPFT believes in the First Amendmen.

I mean, the fact that this show was on the air, tells you that KPFT believed the First Amendment.

That's right. And Cheryl Causton, who was a guest on this show, several several months back. Cheryl caster is an openly transgendered person who does commercial radio or Howard Stern type radio show in Washington DC is on the verge of getting her show nationally syndicated on a commercial network.

But I would have given anything he'd gotten share up from Cheryl Kosta, Kate Bornstein, and myself on that show, Springer would still be looking for his ear lobes. It would have been fun. It really was. I am before we go to our guests in studio, I want to talk about some of the stuff that will not Dr. Cole. Oh, okay. Part of what you're going to hear us talking about tonight you'll be hearing is talking about spousal issues. And I wanted to take a few minutes to do some setup and explain to people what what it is that we're talking about. There are there are relationships that exist now. And there are far more of them than you might think. Where a couple might be become legally married, they and you know they are legally married as husband and wife. And after marriage, or after a certain amount of time goes by and during the mere afternoon one of the partners says, Honey, I love you, but I want to be the opposite gender than the person you married? Not a small ask.

J Jimmy Carper 20:03

No. I can't imagine you-.

S Sarah DePalma 20:05

No, no, no, you, you, you if you're a typical heterosexual couple, and the male's portion of the couple says, Honey, I want to become a female. I hope you don't mind too much like- marriage.

J Jimmy Carper 20:20

Tough, that's very tough, very tough.

S Sarah DePalma 20:22

It's probably if it isn't the worst thing that can conceivably happen in a marriage. It's, I guess, outside of the partner dying. In many ways, it's pretty much the same.

J Jimmy Carper 20:32

Well, you know, I guess it's a it's a, it's like a coming out thing. Hopefully, the relationship is strong, because the partner who wants to change is has been thinking about this for years and years and years and years and years. And the other partner this is, this is a new thing.

Sarah DePalma 20:54

Honey, I love you. But boom, yeah, exactly.

J Jimmy Carper 20:54

But you have to get very used to it.

I have a hard time imagining anything that's more difficult in a relationship than this. And yet, despite all of that, many of the marriages survive.

Evidently that leaves the relationship is strong.

Phyllis and her wife had been married 26-27 years. And tonight, we have a guest with us, who is legally married. You've heard her her other half on the show, Beth Richard. And tonight, we have best wife, Teresa Teresa with us. And the other part of the relationship equation are people who are not legally married, but choose to have what would from the outside world look like the same sex marriage?

J Jimmy Carper 21:40

Yes.

S Sarah DePalma 21:40

And that was and so tonight, my life partner Lori is here. And we'll be talking about that. Spousal issues. It's something that it's paid lip service in the transgendered community. But you don't really see much being done to help spouses. I'm not aware of a single program in the transgender community, to help the spouse of a person who's in the middle of transition. And one of the things that was it was interesting to me, when we went to Dr. Cole's get together is that there were at least two or three couples there. Were the were the the person that was transitioning was in the early stages. And if you listen to the difficulties that was being created in their marriage. How badly they want to keep this marriage together. In some cases, there were children involved. And yet, the the transsexual partner said, I've got to do this. If I don't, I'd rather be dead. Very tough issue. And so we'll be talking about that in a little bit. Also, there's another another equa- part of the equation here, and that is being the spouse of a crossdresser. Now, you would think that at first, those issues are the same. But they're not. If you're the spouse of a crossdresser, yes, it's a crisis in your marriage. But for 85% or 90% of the time, you still have a man around the house, through for the spouse, betraying-.

The outward are the outward appearances.

Sarah DePalma 23:21

For a transsexual it's as if their partner died and was reborn in a new gender true. So the issue is not exactly the same. Having said that, if you discover that your spouse is a crossdresser, it's a crisis in the mirror.

It's a crisis, you know, of being transgendered kind of answers the question, do you love this person for the person? Or do you love this person for the genitals?

Sarah DePalma 23:44

Yeah, and let's face it, you know, it's a big shock when the person comes to you and says, Honey, I love your clothes. I've been wearing them for a couple of years now. That's, you know, and there. And so later on tonight, we're going to give the interview with Francis and she'll be talking about that. And she raises some terrific issues. I think it's maybe the best discussion that we've had about cross dressers since we have Linden and Cynthia Phillips on the program. So some of that's coming up. So any further ado, do our guests do they have their headphones on?

Good evening, y'all. My name is Lori. I'm Sarah's life partner. And I'm particularly thinking happy holidays.

Happy holidays to everyone. Okay, now, let's, Teresa, why don't we start with you. Tell folks a little bit whatever you feel comfortable telling you about your relationship with Beth how you met that sort of thing.

Okay, Beth and I met in college, I guess about 15 years ago. And we fenced one fencing team together. And she went away for about two years. Foster's to private school versus public school type of things. And then she came back. And and I guess in my senior year, or both of our senior year, we started going out. And about a year after graduation, we got married. And as of May we'll be married for 10 years.

So you've been married for 10 years?

Now close to it. Yep.

Okay. Now, how, how far into the marriage, were you when Beth came to you? And said, Hi, honey, I got it. I love you. But I gotta talk.

Well, when when we are engaged, I found out not to do this by pronouns by history, right? I can't do it. I found him in a teddy. And like, major shock and type of things like that. And we were talking. I don't know why I didn't leave. But I didn't leave. And we were talking and decided to keep going, you know, I can do this, I promise we won't, you know, I won't do this again. And that's, that's a whole separate issue. We'll get into it a little bit. But that's always that's a real clash. Now, Lori, you and I met in different circumstances, why don't you tell about that?

I knew Sarah was trans when I first met him, he met at a party that was held at my house given by my roommate. And we became apartmentmates about maybe four or five months later. That went up very well. It's kind of odd that when I go and get my skirt, and I find that she's wearing it, he is wearing the pair of shoes I want. I haven't had my necklace since I left home, my sister wore my stuff.

It is very it's it's different. In her her mom doesn't quite know what to think of our relationship. Her mom was very interesting. At one point, she said something to the fact that there's something really different about Sarah, but I can't put my finger on it. Well, yes, there is something very different. So yeah, that that does make for an interesting sort of thing. Now, Tracy, you have something something a little additional to what we do, because you've got two.

So for those of you who are out there, and you say to yourself, how can this be? How can you possibly have a spouse who's transsexual and have children? The answer is, you can be just fine. And it works very well. Thank you very much.

Yeah, well, Katie has she six and she's I was pregnant when basically the hit the fan. Oh my. And so she has literally lived with this her entire life. So it's really not she doesn't really know any difference. And Christopher was, you know, two and a half at the time. So and we were basically very honest with him, which is probably the most important thing is to be honest with your kids and tell them what's going on, you know, to the extent of how old they are.

Okay, now, one of the first when we were at Dr. Cole's there were several issues that were brought up issues that were obviously very difficult. And so I want to start with some of those. The first issue that we heard from people is people are gonna think I'm a lesbian. People are gonna think my sexual orientation changed. You know, in suburban, suburban Houston.

We were worried about it. When we moved in, we live in a rather conservative area. And I was concerned when we first moved in. And it was really funny. The kids used to come around our house, right up to the point that figured out they were two women living in the same house. Ooh, and they kids. And then they discovered that we looked out for their house when they were on vacation. And we picked up the newspapers, and the burglars wouldn't know they were gone. And we kept the yard clean. And the kids came back.

Lori Rice 31:38

They loved it as well.

Sarah DePalma 31:40

Yeah, it was really interesting. So whatever the initial hang up was, they got over it, and what they think about us, I don't know. And I think our general feeling is we don't care. You almost have to have if you can do this, I think it seems to me that if you care what other people think your chances of success are zero. You know, Lori and I walk down the beach holding hand all the time. And we're very aware that people look at us, they all go out there to lesbians. And we don't care. Think what you want, you know, your opinion and 50 cents of profit McDonald's. My favorite thing.

This is important to us, to heck with you saying but that's not everybody can do that. Right? It takes a certain it takes a certain kind of person that you have kind of interesting because you live in an apartment complex.

I live in an apartment complex, we got a lot of Bubba's, let's say, living around, but for the most part, people don't. They, they've figured out that we're honest people and, you know, relatively trustworthy, and we're not going to hurt their kids or, you know, hurt their stuff. So they're not too worried about, you know, they've gotten to the point that whatever you do in your house is your problem, not ours.

And isn't that the bottom line? It's how you are as a person.

One of the things that was brought up? Uh, Dr. Cole, I actually made the list is the discussion was going around the room. The way that Dr. Cole's get together is set up is first, they basically go around the room and everybody sort of gives a little check in, you know, Hi, I'm so and so. And I'm a transsexual, and, you know, sort of reminds me of an AAA meeting at first. But then as people begin to loosen up, some of the stories begin to come out, it becomes very interesting. And I sure I took notes as the discussion went around the room. And the first the very first issue that was being raised was the issue of family rejection. You know, maybe, you know, the inlaws said, you know, don't you marry this person because this person's something weird about this person. Now you gotta get back. They'll say, well, Mom, you were kind of right. So what let's let's talk about the family rejection is the Laurie and I certainly organized certainly hasn't come up yet. But we have a little different situation, Teresa go.

Okay. Um, I guess I guess from Beth's family point of view, they've been very accepting. They've haven't physically met Beth yet. But they've been very accepting my family. When everything started to come out, they my one brother and sister they were okay and you know, Teresa will whatever makes you happy it's okay with. My oldest sister is a grown up cover are a born again Roman Catholic. And I think my mom, mind her, we gave her push. Because she wasn't really, being Roman Catholic, you can't say, get a divorce. But I think my mom really would like have liked me to do that. But somewhere along the line, I think my parents went to see a psychologist and the psychologist basically said, she's a big girl. She'll know what she knows what to do. So she, they kind of like are they're ignoring Beth versus, Bea harassing my sister for about three years was severely harassing us via calling CPS.

Yeah. And, you know, we're getting little Christian care packages every single time she sees my kids, you know. And right now, I don't know if she officially has our address or not so she hasn't been harassing us since we've moved down here.

So it's funny thing about my family is very strange. My brother is a police officer. And of any other people in the family that I thought would be accepting. I thought he would be the one most likely he is his wife isn't. And his wife actually asked him if this was a problem that the kids could tell.

Yeah.

Sarah DePalma 36:22

Yeah. Now I just sent a Christmas card with a check in it and told my brother to buy some presents for the kids from aunt Sarah in Texas. Oh, and I'm gonna be very interested to see whether he keeps the check. Or whether it comes back saying thank you, but we can't, yeah. So that that will be interesting. My father is a deacon in the Pentecostal church, so you can kiss this bye. For a while I was getting these letters, telling me how hot the fires and hell were going to be and how well my father was going to be there stoking and waiting for me when I got there again. And for I got to the point where I simply decided I would stop reading my father's mail. And Laurie will tell you, I got to the point that when my father's mail came and sat on my desk for a week before I would open it, because I just didn't want to hear it anymore was just enough. I finally got to the point. And at one point, I wrote him back and said, Listen, if you can't do any better than this, stop writing to me. I'm a big girl. I don't need your approval. So if you want to get along with this, this is great. And if you don't stop writing me. Now I get hard address to Dipalma. No first name. No, no, no, no. She she really was she was surprised when I got married. She was the one least surprised by my being transsexual, because she remembers my coming through when I was five years old and saying Mom, I'm a girl. I want to get fixed.

Sarah DePalma 38:35

So and my mother has accepted Laurie, very well. She says, you know, she considers Laurie part of the family. And she has a photo of the two of us sitting at her piano and so she's come along pretty well. And Lori wants to talk about your parents because that's kind of interesting.

Well, my family's met several times. My dad this last trip my dad's put up the door to our computer room staring at a I'm transgender my vote bumper sticker over up over there stood up poster and he just stood there and stare for about 5-10 minutes and then just walked away. I think they've come to accept so quite a bit they know how important she is to me but P docs and I've told them that Sarah is my primary person- a month into Christmas gifts this year.

Sarah DePalma 39:27

That was kind of a shock. We did our personal documents we did our powers of attorney and medical powers of attorney and that sort of thing. Because we don't have the same legal rights that you just said Teresa and Beth. So we went had it done and it came was kind of a shock to her mother. I think she discovered that she was second on the list behind me on some of these.

Lori Rice 39:47

She's already solved the case. I know where you are and you know where to find me. And I mean this this is just the way it should be.

S

Sarah DePalma 39:56

I had a big puzzle of the desert poster in computer rooms with a I'm transgendered and a vote bumper sticker underneath it. And I wasn't there the day that her father saw this, I wish I had been, it would have been real interesting. Now we have a big, we have a photo montage, a memory, we call it our memory wall. And we've got photos of different faces of Ben and people that we've met and stuff. And a lot of those ever, Laurie and I are holding hands, or we're doing something that's fairly intimate. So when they come into the house, you almost have to be blind, deaf and dumb not to know there's some kind of a relationship going on here. And I've since then, I've won a couple of awards, and I've got an award from Transgender Law conference, the transgender plain University word sitting on the wall. And it's gonna be really interesting when they come back again, because I mean, you almost have to be like willfully ignoring things not to know what's going on.

Yeah, and to be the spouse of a transgendered person is really, really tough. Because first of all. mother in law may not have liked the person to marry. You know. which is fairly rare

happens lots of times. But now sooner or later, Mother in law finds out that well, that person would be married, has changed genders.

Whoa.

S Sarah DePalma 41:25

And Mama, you may not like it, but you have to get a grip, too. And that brought up the second issue and that was the lost or retained family relationships. You know, how many people have brothers and sisters that simply disappeared and said I can't deal with this never came back.

And I think that's lots of gay and lesbian people have that issue.

I'm there. Yeah, my whole family deserted me at age 17 at age 17.

Yes. Yeah. So I've been estranged from my family for over 30 years.

And they never got a grip about it.

Never Never.

I had no idea. And here you are. This loud activist is doing this radio show for 10 years or whatever. No. Do they- Are they aware that you're HIV?
