So for the marriage to survive, it starts to become an economic issue. And most marriages don't survive economic issues. Regardless, regardless whether you're heterosexual, gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender. Well, if you have economic issues piled on top, because the person is transitioning is the most is just an incredible stress on a relationship. And Lori, you've you've watched me go through that once you talk about that.

I've seen so about those several jobs I don't think having transgendered had to do with not retaining any of them. I know she got one to two jobs, I think because of her transgendered.

Sarah DePalma 13:10

I actually got this job because-.

And your previous job was done very well, because of your activism and your transgendered situation.

Was very interesting. When I went to interview for the current my current job. The the guy that was interviewing me stopped and said, are you that? Are you the person that does that radio show?

That wasn't that I don't I don't think would ever come to that because he's he's very liberal. But she said nothing not quite tell him.

Tell the new Kingsbridge campaign to take something more than once you more than one and loudly as I recall. Now you have you. You've had some of the economic stuff but not as much because Beth is I think she's been employed through most of it has-.

The most economic was was just because of the job. The job disappeared. company went out of business. So that was that was the major part. That's a problem that basically transition And within about three months, her boss didn't like her anyway. And she got a chance after being a year at the company to be able to transfer and she transferred in as Beth. So it was it's kind of a non issue. And a lot of them do know that. I mean, I was I'm assuming that they think we're a lesbian couple.

It is very interesting. I met persons that have known before I actually knew for a while. And it was Michelle Ballinger, Michelle believes your works with the prison systems for the state of Texas, in transition while working with prison system.

And a lot of employers have sexual orientation protection now. And I think, although they don't know, they don't know transgenders legally wouldn't fit under that. And so some transgenders are benefiting almost by accident.

What point did you finally did, it finally dawned on you that this was going to be progressive, and she was going to just keep going?

But really go through life saying why me God? You know, it would be easy to go through life, being self pitying. And Lori's not like that at all. Lori uses look, okay, I was dealt a rotten, rotten set of cards.

That's it. And so one of the things I've learned from Lori is I've adapted her attitude toward the sex reassignment surgery. And, and looked at and said, You know, I could do this too. There's a courage there that in and I did I draw a lot of courage and have learned a lot from watching Lori and apply that into the look. Yeah, all right. I was not dealt with the deck of cards I wanted. But life goes on.

Very few of us. I think we're dealt the deck of cards we wanted.

S Sarah DePalma 24:55

Yeah, not everybody gets to wear leather pants and look gorgeous with their shirt. Yeah. And so it's something that I've learned. It was actually something I mentioned to [INAUDIBLE] goals to bring in some of the whining and kind of brought a hush over the room, I think. And I'm not sure making a decision and surgery based in from fear is a smart move.

You know, there were other questions I had. What if I was in a car wreck? Would they send me to the male ward? I don't want to have that happen. Again, making a cert- a life altering surgery. I'm on the basis of fear. That just, you know, the more I thought about it, the more I thought that these fears are irrational. And you're right, I've watched I've got a friend that's in Montreal right now. I mean, she's in Scotland for her surgery at two years on the die. And I fear for her, I wonder, did she ever take time to stop and think about any of this? And say, when I come home, I'm going to be a mess. I'm not going to be able to walk, I'm not going to be able to work? I'm gonna have to go through an aftercare of at least two years and put up with stuff. Did she ever stop and think about what all the consequences were? You hope of in she'd had a good therapist, you hope? But yeah, I think my attitude about surgery is a lot different because I've had more time to think it over. And from what I've heard Beth say, I think she feels the same way, right. Beth is one of the most mature attitudes approach surgery of anybody that I've met. Because she and I have talked about it. And as far as I can tell, her attitude is yeah, I'd like to have it but the world will not end if I don't right. In and again, I think that's pretty rare. I don't think you're too many transsexual sees say the kind of things you've heard this say.

Yeah, I mean, one thing that I got off the subject a little bit, but when you brought that up is the probably the worst time that Beth had probably was the depression was I think, in '91 is because a '91 in her mindset in college, she said, Oh, that '91 will be I'll have enough money for surgery. So when '91 came rolling around, she was sitting there going, kind of like what am I doing here? I have two kids. I just bought a house I had enough money to go for surgery. Now what am I doing? You know, so that whole year was really a very difficult time for us now when we got over that hump, but I mean that was you know, in '91 was the year of surgery in her mind so I mean that was kind of a difficult time. I mean, that was before I met her and and first started going out with her.

And then all of a sudden, you got a nice smooth face, maybe not as smooth as your own, but it's significantly smoother. And, you know, that kind of changes takes a little getting used to, and, you know, getting the things for the hormone change. I don't know, I guess Beth wanted-.

You know, sexual identity issues are difficult. Imagine being the spouse and watching his partner slowly change as you sleep next to this person every night, right? This is this is rough all the way around. You know, Lori, how about you?

And you know why? That cured it. I haven't haven't grieved for it since that's, that's part of being in a relationship that you don't hear the right wing fundamentalist ever talks about right but to me, that's what relationships are about. And so I have to say that as we come to the end

of this here, that it seems to me that if you're the significant other of a, of a transgendered person, you have to be one of the most incredible people on the planet. I just did the obstacles that a person has to go to with being able to be married to a person, have the person change their gender, and stay with them anyway. And adapt all the changes that go on. It's beyond it's almost beyond my comprehension with what all that's like any you never hear it's an interesting thing. Jimmy you never hear it discussed much. I've gone to God knows how many different transgendered meetings and you never hear the wives discuss. Now, one of the things that Lori and I are doing is we have decided that we're going to start sort of a social group for transgendered couples, nothing formal, we're not going to name it. We're not in any of that stuff. But we've decided that just because, through this show, I've met people in you know, there's one maybe a couple of weeks in the spring. And there's a couple that's in wood and there's a couple but and none of us know one another. So everybody's out there feeling isolated. Everybody's thinking they're the only transgendered couple in the world.

You also need involve them since I have the kids, we also need to bring in the kids darn right because they have I mean, I'm not worried right now. Like I asked their school when they're teenagers, though, I asked their school therapist to find a psychologist, a child psychologist, not that they're having problems now, but if they have any questions or have need somebody to talk to, they'll have somebody to talk to by the time they hit teenage years.

You know, and so we're going to start that way, it's nothing fancy, just get and contact us, we'll get together and have coffee or something and get to know one or the other. Maybe we'll put together something of an event every three months. Just something to knock down the isolation. If you're a transgendered couple out there, if you're transsexual, one of the partners is transsexual, you're really not the only ones because I hear from so many. And we're going to try and make something good happen. Use the show for that.
