But that's also true of gay bureaucrats and gay politicians and, and gay radio people. We're the most talented people in our fields, whatever that is, because we compensate for the discrimination that is out there. And we also compensate for perhaps an estimation that we might not be as good as others.

And we all thought that would be a good idea. But then there's so many funds out there going that we didn't know exactly how to do that. And as I was reading Tess's letter and waiting for her to return my call. I got a call from the People at the Houston house theater. Now that's the theater on the ninth floor of the Houston house apartments down on Fannin street downtown. It's a big gray building where a lot of very friendly people live. And they got to theater up there on the ninth floor. And they're going to do a production of that sexist spoof classic women behind bars now, if you're not familiar with the play, the role was defined by divine right gives you some idea this is serious. Bondage discipline lesbian camp here, folks. All right, the cast is going to be mixed but it's it's it's wonderful play is overdone to the max, if, if you were in the old Rocky Horror Picture group, this is the kind of thing you're looking for. All right. The performances for that, we get two nights into our six performances. There are three performances each night show night is August, the 10th and the 11th. That's Fridays and Saturday, a Friday and a Saturday. Shows are at eight o'clock. For those who want to go to theater and then go to dinner. 10 o'clock, for those who want to go to dinner, then go to the theater. And then for you Rocky Horror freaks. I mean, he says I'm the First Amendment guy. All right. And let me tell you this, of all it really bothers me. All the things that can be said about this court. And obviously, the reversal of Roe vs. Wade in the Webster case causes some concern they didn't do worth a huddly Dang. On the Hardwick case. So I don't want to you know, I just makes me sick to when when they think about that, but on the First Amendment, beginning before he'll vs Houston, which was certainly a landmark, First Amendment case. And continuing. This has been a good court for freedom of expression. And I actually emceed the rally where that flag was born, was burned. I was up there doing my emcee things, while the group in the back were burning flags. I was the only politically correct person acceptable to all of the radical groups, which are everything from the revolutionary communist party to acorn. That was quite a mix. And I was the only politically correct person that they would all accept. So I went up there to do that. I know the young man that burned flag, chatted with him on several occasions. He is not as radical as he seems in the media. He was kind of a weekend radical at the time, but And I'm a person that believes in the system. You hear me talking about constitutions and, and things of that nature. I believe in the system. I believe that what is important about this country is not symbols and flagwaving, things of that nature. But the reality of the Constitution of the United States, it does two things. It structures our government. So we know where things are and how they're going to happen. And a lot of things in that structure don't happen the way they're supposed to, or they don't happen the way I like them. Right. But more important to that attached to that structure was the Bill of Rights. The First Amendment was first because it was the most important kind of little thing here. Oh, man. Sure. The First Amendment says that Congress shall make no law respecting the establishment of religion. That's where the problem traditionally lay. Is people would take the religious institution, connected to the state in European countries, and oppress other people. Their problem was originally religion. And so that's the first thing they did with the first amendment was separate church from state, there shall be no state church. So Congress shall make no law respecting the establishment of religion, nor prohibiting the free exercise there Robins, the other side of that separate state from church, nor shall government limit freedom of speech, and of the press. That's important. Let me bring freedom of speech and of the press. Nor shall there be limitations on the right of the citizens to peacefully assemble and redress their grievances. It is the redress their grievances part that burning the flag falls under and if you read all the decisions in that case, you will find that they keep referring to that if you are from Nicaragua, and the government of the United States has been declaring war unofficially, still maintaining diplomatic relationships, but financing a war to overgrow overthrow the government of your nation, and you want to redress that grievance. Maybe burning the flag is not too extreme. It might be for me, and it might be for you. But maybe you think that there ought to be some emotional impact to your complaint about this government, overthrowing your government, whether this people people appear, like it or not,

it is still the government of those people. That's what Justice Brennan was trying to say. If we outlaw the desecration of the flag, does that mean we're going to punish people for burning it? What about the people that commercially exploit it? wave the flag and put the flag on their logo and then sale? Lemons for people? What about the people that wave the flag and provide services to the elderly? That are shotty in second grade and cheat them out of their money? Is that not the same desecration. If you're going to start punishing people for desecrating the flag? The question is not are you going to start but where do you stop? Do you stop when somebody soles a flag on the asset of their pants? Well, if that's the case, what if they saw a flag on their sweaty hands to cap? Exactly. So the trouble of it is, is once you get let that cat out of that bag, then then then how do you control it? And I don't appreciate people using these emotional issues to incite political panic, wrap themselves in the flag and wipe their ass with the Constitution. No baby keep your grimy hands off my constitution because that is the contract between me and this nation. And it is sacred. The flag is nice. I happen to like the flag it's designed. I happen to appreciate what it stands for. But what it's it as a symbol is not as important as the substance of the Constitution. It's the constitution that I don't want burned or messed with our politicians on a short term basis getting the grimy hands on it. I don't like that at all. The only two nations in the world that you can actually go to jail for burning their flag is Red China and Iran. Think about it.

Well, I don't think Playboy had anything to do with the reason he left that particular woman. The situation is that after they did all that the son of meese commission shows up as proposed legislation in the federal government. And it's real nasty legislate legislation, it would allow the federal government to go into states that have no obscenity law. Are you ready? There are three states in the union that have no obscenity laws, New Mexico is the nearest one. So if all else fails, you can get your advocate in New Mexico. Nevada is another one. And the third one is Hawaii. Those three states in the United States get along quite nicely without any state laws to burn destroy. He sees otherwise prosecute people for selling adult literature. And but the nice commission is was very upset about that. And so they wrote laws, they would allow the federal government to go even into those kinds of jurisdictions and arrest people and seize property for selling what they defined as material harmful to minors, which they hope by this legislation get around the traditional court established definition of obscenity. The obscenity laws means that people have several criteria, but a book has to go around the corner and be pretty significant to be obscene under the Miller test. And the people who would like to control mine in your life, the religious folks and the censorship folks would like to get around the Supreme Court established definition and they hope to do that with this new federal legislation that said that maybe even a playboy certainly twit. Certainly the Montrose voice, is material harmful to minors. And therefore, nobody minors or majors adults have cannot have access to this material. And those who sell and distributed can

be prosecutable under the law. Now, for many years, I have represented the adult industry as a lobbyist before the Texas Legislature. As matter of fact, that's basically how I pay my bills. And I'm expanding that, because there is a whole bevy of other laws, including this piece of federal legislation. It is right now real important, because the Republicans would like to force it onto the floor of the house, so that Democrats who are traditionally more sensitive to free speech issues, can vote against it, and they can say, A ha, he's for dirty books, or she's for dirty books. She's in favor of obscenity, she's trying to destroy her children. It's a phony issue. It's an exaggerated issue. And coming in a campaign year. It's it's a potentially explosive issue. Now, I have talked to some members of the House of Representatives and some members of the Senate. And the Democrats generally do not want this issue before the House of the Senate before the election. And so the the religious fanatics are using their radio stations and their media to drum up an avalanche of letters. So finally, I and those people write letters, right. Oh, avalanches. Just mean, you know, one of the great greatest things in my life was along came the Last Temptation of Christ and diverted their energy. Otherwise, Washington would be knee deep in letters from religious fanatics trying to censor what you and I have access to. And people ask me all the time, but why? I'm so adamant about first amendment rights and censorship. And number one, first amendment is my priority. I believe that that under the cloak of First Amendment, say I remember back when they used to open the mail from gay organizations. And then postal inspectors would literally confiscate the mail that I wrote Franklin Kemeny because it said the word gay in it. And we're talking about the United States, we're talking about the United States Post Office, we're talking about the way they did it in the 60s. Back in the 60s, they literally, they knew Frank Cameron his name, and they knew my name, and they knew Barbara Giddings name. And as we would correspond to one another, and get a little note in my post office, saying the postal inspector has determined that a letter from Franklin Kenneth Kennedy was deemed to be obscene and unfit for us males. And basically what it was talking about is some political idea, like the invention of gay prank weeks, and it took us a long, hard struggle to get them away from that, and I'm not ready to go back there, I'm seriously not willing to go back there. And another aspect of it is not only just first amendment, and our free flow of information, because if anybody gets censored, it's going to be us. Of course, people are going to do that. But the very same people that want to kick down your apartment door, and my house door and everybody else in restless out of bed and throw us in jail, are the ones that are trying to close studs, news and diners, news and the adult bookstores, I would much rather fight those people at the front door of the bookstore, then fight them at the front door of my apartment in years. And there are a lot of just awfully naive gay people out there that thinks that this is not our issue, that we really ought not to get involved.
