I think that for bisexuals, a lot of times the coming out process takes even longer and there may be some going back and forth. I know for me, I I, you know, after initially identifying as heterosexual when I got involved with the lesbian community, there was a lot of pressure just to identify as lesbian and to kind of put all the relationships that I'd had with men in the past, and say, well, now I'm definitely lesbian, since I'm acknowledging that I'm attracted to women, and I'm having relationships with women and having sex with women and going out to lesbian bars and going to lesbian events. Now I'm, I'm just a lesbian. And well, I found myself still

seeing the same man. At the same time as identifying as lesbian, I had a pretty steady relationship with a very special male, and he was bisexual. And he was kind of effeminate and very accepting, and just really wonderful person and really encouraged me to go out with women and to explore what it meant for me to be with women, and I couldn't very well write him off as macho pig jerk. The way a lot of the way, a lot of lesbians were, you know, talking about their relationships. And there were a lot of women who had been in abusive relationships, really bad things and wanted to leave it all behind. But it was kind of like at that point in time, they had the climate control buttons in their hands, and you either identified as lesbian or straight and the bisexual world just didn't really exist. But my friends would say to me, you know, Sarah, if anybody is bisexual, you are just from your behavior.
