And his this madman and I just kept busting through the crowd. All evening, I'd made Danny my slave stay away from me and pretend like she was a member of the audience. So she was just socializing, pretending like to be another art gallery patron. And so I plan to get to her after I'd gone through most of the crowd. And finally I discovered her in the crown. She's talking to some guy and I just threw my arm around her neck and dragged her off her feet and started dragging out the back of the gallery. And the guy she was talking to started chasing me going Hey. So I turned to him, tell him mine his own business. And he, he did. And so I had my friend Pete was assisting me and Pete's about six, four and weighs about 400 pounds covered with tattoos and a shaved head, not the kind of guy you usually want to mess with. And so nobody, we were actually kind of interested to see if anybody in the audience would intercede on the girl's behalf. And unfortunately, nobody did. We thought that would be we thought that would be kind of interesting to have some interaction with the crowd. But so we we brought her back in, we actually put her in some combat boots that we bolted to a big four by four block. And so brought her back in, ripped her dress off of her and hooked her to the block and twisted her upside down over the canvas. So she's hanging upside down by her feet. And I took my knife and I cut her clothes off. So she's naked and you could hear the whole crowd. This is the art crowd now. And you could hear the intake of their breath collectively, like every time I would do something. And it was great. I put paint brushes on each of her hand and I flogged and played her over the canvas and made her paint. And of course she's an artist. So this was very interesting for her. And the crowd was just, they just could not believe it. I took an old flogger that I hated and dipped in red paint and bitter with it and the stuff splattered all over the canvas and everything that fell in to the canvas became part of the painting. And about halfway through the scene we had a we had another lady who was a part of us who was a ringer too she was hiding in the audience. And about halfway through the performance, she

started singing very loudly. That's not art. That's who is that that's not art, who let them in here. And the crowd kept looking at it like you better be quietly. So on cue, Pete had enough of it. And he reached into the crowd and grabbed her and dragged her into the scene, took her over his knee and started giving our spanking. And I'm busy playing with Danny on the other side of the canvas and I hollered out. Now that's not good enough, I want better but, and immediately this entire crowd just collectively started going chanting bear. He gave them what they wanted. He gave her a really serious spanking and made her kneel on the canvas and say Yes, sir. It's art, sir.
