Towards the end of her life, many knew her to suffer from severe depression. But among other things, and one of the things she talked about, I remember and I interview just before she died about a year before she died, she talked about losing so many people who were close to her, due to at that time, the early AIDS epidemic. Six months before she passed, her brother also passed from AIDS. As we all know, just within hours of Miss Hyman going on to do Apollo. They found her body lifeless in her hotel room. So tonight,
