The anti gay rights amendment that set off a nationwide boycott of Colorado was declared Are you ready on constitutional Tuesday by the state Supreme Court, which said it denies homosexual an equal voice in government. The right to participate equally in political process is clearly affected by amendment to keep justice set wrote in a six to one majority amendment to which would have struck down anti discrimination ordinances in Denver, Boulder and Aspen was never enforced. It was challenged immediately after his passage, and has been a subject of court battles ever since. After amendment two's passage gay rights activist launched a nationwide boycott of Colorado's tourism and they said that it cost Colorado over 120 million and laws convention

business and I know it lost one little ski trip for me. The ruling is a decisive authority affirm an affirmation of lesbian and gay rights and a crushing blow to the radical rights efforts to curtail important constitutional protection. said Suzanne Goldberg, who was an attorney at the gay rights organization, lambda, Legal Defense and Education Fund. Also speaking of these crazy amendments, I'm going to read you sound gave me a copy of the Idaho code, which is up for vote now get this, provided that no state agency department or political subdivisions, shall grant minority status to persons who engage in homosexual behavior, providing that the same sex marriage and the domestic partnerships shall not be legally recognized, providing that elementary and secondary school educators shall not discuss homosexuality as acceptable behavior, be providing that no state funds shall be expended in a manner that has the effect of accepting or approving homosexuality and on and on and on. It's absolutely disgusting. This is going to end up in the United States Supreme Court and that's where it'll all be decided out and the way things have been going so far in these amendments, they've been pretty much the government's been working in our favor, so hopefully the Supreme Court will do the same. out of Washington, the Justice Department officials Thursday we're studying the weekend murder of two gay men in Laurel, Mississippi, in an effort to determine whether the FBI should enter the case. National Gay rights activist meanwhile, claimed that the local authorities lacked the will and the competence to investigate violent crime in the county. That has been the side of anti gay confrontations. The 16 year old student is now in custody as the suspected killer. Gay Rights Advocates reported that one victim that the victims can't wear down around his ankles. Well, I think that's a pretty good indication that maybe he was sexually abused. However, they're saying that that just happened when the body was dragged. At the Justice Department Civil Rights Division lawyers were making information about the crime with federal civil rights statutes and a 1990 law giving the FBI jurisdiction to investigate so called hate crimes. Now right now hate crimes are limited to violent crimes against person the person's because of race, color, religion, or national origin. Sexual orientation at this point is not covered by the statutes. Gay rights advocates, however, have long sought to have sexual orientation included. Also this week was coming out week or next we had Coming Out Day on I think it was Monday of this week and Amanda burst, who last year announced that she's a lesbian and gauged encourage claws of homosexuals to reveal their true selves Tuesday and Thursday, during National Coming Out Day. It sets them up to be more visible in the gay community and to be more honest in their own lives. And of course, she's one of the stars and Fox married with children. Her quote is, it's wonderful to be all of you, all of you and whoever you are. In Maryland, David Cay North can visit his three daughters for several hours on the weekend, during daytime only, no holidays, no overnight visits. That's because a judge doesn't believe that the gay HIV positive North who's now living with his lover can be trusted to hide his homosexuality from his children. Notice the appeal of that 1993 ruling has given the more Maryland court of special appeals, its first chance to decide whether homosexuality is a reason to limit the rights of parents. Nora's former wife had sought to terminate his visitation rights completely after learning that her ex husband get this a former Baptist minister was gay. Currently in 21 of the 25 states where the issue has been decided at the appellate level, courts have ruled that a parent's rights cannot be limited solely because he or she is homosexual and living with a partner. This week, John capers 36 and AIDS activists became the first person in Georgia to be quarantined because of a drug resistant strain of tuberculosis died of AIDS. He was a registered nurse and he was placed in involuntary quarantine. Last April. He had contracted the deadly drug resistant type of TV in 1991. The two month quarantine sparked criticism from eggs activists and others who contended that the confinement was unnecessary and discriminatory. The confinement was lifted on May 18. On a local level, the first judicial candidate David Jennings Willis, asked that an endorsement from the Houston gay and lesbian Political Caucus be withdrawn once he got it. He said he didn't want it. Then he changed his mind. So will us a Republican running for the Harris County Civil Court bench will appear on the caucus lever

letters and then Aren't Smith cards after all? Well, let's talk to the gay rights group weeks ago about his candidacy against Democratic incumbent Carolyn marks Johnson. But after he won the endorsement, he wrote the caucus on Tuesday saying that he was deciding this. He was declining the support, because the group's policies differ markedly from the views, opinions and values of many Republicans. He then sent a copy to GOP county headquarters and of course, that's Dr. Steven Hautes. Who's a Christian I hate to use the word like Christian conservative, he's a crypto fascist later, who opposes gay rights. But on Tuesday, Willis decided to accept the endorsement after talking to caucus members. I don't know if you've kept up with all this. It's a little bit confusing. His quote was, it's unfortunate that the Republican Party is not more broad minded in all of its aspects. There was an interesting picture and an article in the Sunday paper about Marguerite tech camera Meyer, after being similar early dismissed from her post as an Army National Guard Colonel, for acknowledging that she was a lesbian. She took the military to court and won back her job. Can't remember 52 was a 26 year veteran and a recipient of the Bronze Star, which is the highest ranking woman ever discharged for being a lesbian. And she's telling it all like everybody else in serving in silence. There's also going to be a movie coming out and Glenn Close is going to play marguerites Park. When she was asked about what she thought about Glenn Close playing the part she said, Well, some people would say that there are similarities between the two of us, but obviously not enough. I wish you could see the picture of Marguerite and and Glen, I, there may be similarities, I'm having a little bit of trouble putting the two together. We were together for 22 years, and I never dreamed he had AIDS until I read it on his death certificate. Sally is one of the dozens of lower income black women who are HIV positive. And like many other she has never used drugs or prostituted herself. But her test for the AIDS virus shows that she was policy. She said that she tried to find a support group where she could talk to women like herself, who faced the same problem. And she was told by local agencies who care for HIV patients and churches, that there were only support groups for gay men or for people who are prostitutes or HIV users. Apparently this is a growing problem and it's not getting the attention that it needs. And it could have been predicted years ago in 1991. Two medical groups studied heterosexual couples in which one member was HIV positive, and found that men infected their female partners 15 to 20 times as frequently as men infected men, as men, as women infected men. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention has for the last three or four years reported the rapid spread of the virus and heterosexuals on a local level. Houston's health department has shown a steady rise in positive tests and women with minorities especially blacks leading in the numbers. As long as heterosexual continue to think casual say sex is safe and as long as their partner doesn't look sick or gay, they seem to be keep having unsafe sex. The AIDS virus is spreading among the low income blacks and Hispanics for the same reason that the drug same reasons drug use users, poverty and lack of education. A woman who worries about paying for groceries is not going to ask a man who buys the groceries to get a blood test. This is Suzanne Anderson speaking out for lesbian and gay voices.

Mary Helen. Inside Out productions and the Houston Skyline theater present the final weekend of the run of the play band by playwright Martin Sherman, directed by Bob Maddux sat in pre World War Two Nazi Germany, where the war within had just begun. Bent follows the lives of three gay gay men who one by one succumb to the social purification process that would

eventually be known as the Holocaust, though afforded some privileges and protection during the initial stages of the Nazi ascension to power, homosexuals eventually fell out of favor, and were hunted and often killed. If taken alive, gays were sent to encampments like dark owl, where the second half of the play takes place, and imaginable as it is there that there would exist a hierarchy and a human abyss like Dachau, one does exist. And at the very nature of the hierarchy lies the homosexual prisoner. Though there are a few records and accounts of the treatment of gays in German concentration camps, it is generally agreed that gays were given the most dangerous jobs in the camps. That among that the average life expectancy of a homosexual prisoner was significantly shorter than that of other classes of prisoners, and that the designation of the pink triangle of color chosen because of its suppose it effeminate and weak nature represented the lowest most disdain member of the cast of camp prisoners. The play band opens in the comfortable if modest, flat of two gay men, Max and Rudy, who are living together in Berlin. We soon learn that men are partners and that the goings on of the previous night have involved a third man, Wolf, who emerges from the lovers bedroom, much to the surprise and dismay of Max who seems to have suffered from an

their lives in Berlin and live on the run, until they are finally captured and transported to Dachau. Though the scenario of the cruel Nazi has been referenced repeatedly as the archetype of evil, Martin Sherman strokes upon a more philosophical and intellectual examination of a Nazi war victim, and though it is never even suggested that we know or understand the motivations of the captors, Sherman does more than to explore the relationship of the captor to the captive. He offers us an understanding of the relationship with a prisoner to himself. Through the character of Max, we come to question the many dichotomies of our own existences. Who are we really, when are we gay or are we gay always? When is it love and when do we choose between love and survival? And are we our own captors? Director Bob Maddox has except has assembled an excellent cast to provide the full dimensions of Martin Sherman's brilliant play. The performances are passionate and electric. Travis Ammons is mesmerizing as Horst and Joel Stark delivers the story of this play with great integrity and range. Special kudos go also to Alex feitelson and Ken codename for switch hitting and filling the shoes of four completely different characters. Director Maddox is pacing and staging set a tempo that never affords the audience and emotional exhale. And the set for the final act of Ben is effectively disturbing. Inside outs production have been achieved theatres, highest aspirations, to inform, to tell a good story and to evoke feeling, which this play does in great measure. Curtain time for the final weekend of performances for Ben is eight o'clock this evening and tomorrow evening. Homophobic remarks by one member of the Canadian Parliament has spurred another to come out as a gay man. It was while the Canadian Parliament was debating a hate crimes bill, that Liberal Party member Roseanne scopes said, homosexuality is not natural, it is immoral and it is undermining the inherent rights and values of our Canadian families and should not be condoned. It was not the first time Scott had made such remarks both inside and outside parliament. But this time New Democratic Party members spend Robinson. Up until now the only open gauge that serve in the Canadian Parliament demanded that the Prime Minister eject her from his own Liberal Party caucus. Robinson called a news conference where he said I think it's shameful that she continues to sit as a liberal Member of Parliament while she continues to spell out this kind of thing. If she'd said this about any other group, she would be out of the Liberal caucus in a minute. In joining Robinson is called for Stokes ouster. Block Keba Swan Member of Parliament rail Menard said that he was speaking for the community to which I belong. When the media asked if this was a public statement that he is gay. Menard said yes, it can be interpreted that way. That is what I meant. The next day, Menard said, what I want people to remember is not that I'm gay, but that there is a social minority that is deprived of fundamental rights. But Menards gesture failed to impress either scope or Prime Minister John Chretien, who has refused to discipline scope. pitchy hands on plans to propose legal protections from discrimination based on sexual orientation have caused a split within the Liberal Party.

Several 1000 gays and lesbians marched through the streets of Johannesburg in early October, celebrating pride and the protection from discrimination they are granted under South Africa's new constitution. Although the new constitution has slowed the formerly vigorous prosecution of sodomy cases, homophobia remains a force to be reckoned with. Activists estimate that there are three gay bashing murders in South Africa every week.

In RB Shan capital of the Ivory Coast, the mainstream newspaper Eve was SWAT was a target of direct action by transvestites after a reporter and a photographer crashed a private gay party. Those two news men were said to have been beaten when their identities were discovered. But some of the party goers took their outrage to the offices of the boss wall as the paper reported it about 10 Young creatures dressed in bright cloth be jeweled and with appropriate hairdos spilled out of three taxis that got the The attention of the editors who met with demand for two hours.

Or you Dina's gaze for civil rights organization held a news conference this week to call attention to police abuse. Amnesty International joined their protest of civil rights violations. Most of their complaints centered on police edicts ordering the arrest of transvestites and bar owners who allow same gender couples to dance together. Police in Argentina raid gay venues and were also accused of making death threats against the leading lesbian activist. The day before the news conference, police had beaten the man apparently because he had AIDS. Gays for civil rights claims that the courts and government do nothing about the abuse.

In the first US immigration decision since Attorney General Janet Reno recognized gays and lesbians as a sometimes persecuted social group. A Pakistani gay man was granted asylum at the end of August, I would be a dead man testified to Pakistani who was identified to the media only as a leader. In Pakistan, a sodomy conviction can result in a sentence of two years to life imprisonment, while Islamic law which can also be enforced legally provides for as many as 100 lashes or death by stoning. Elise said he was one of four men who were in a private home when police broke in arrested them and beat them. His own father then threatened to kill him if he was in fact gay. Alia has been living in Kansas City with his lover a US citizen.

A US federal jury ruled in mid September that the 1992 seizure by San Francisco police have copies of the gay and lesbian newspaper Bay Times was a violation of the civil rights of lesbian publisher Kim Corsaro. The jury ruled against officer Tom un inspector Gary del Agnes, and then Chief of Police Richard hunky still, it was hunky Stowe who ordered the confiscation of more than 2000 copies of one edition from free distribution racks and action which got him fired. Not only did the addition in question contain an article highly critical upon these still, it's covered showed hung Ystos head on the body of a lesbian and police uniform, holding a nice stick in a suggestive position with a caption Dix cool new tool martial law. Although the jury declined to award in punitive damages, Corsaro was awarded \$36,000 in general damages because the police were acting under orders. The city of San Francisco may also be liable for attorneys fees incurred by both Corsaro and Hongyi. Still, totaling hundreds of 1000s of dollars.

Homophobic US Senator Jesse Helms has finally been defeated in his effort to defund any public school districts offering teaching counseling or materials relating to homosexuality. He'd previously succeeded in placing this condition on almost \$13 billion of federal funding through an amendment to the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, while his Republican colleague Mel Hancock won a similar amendment in the House of Representatives. The anti gay and lesbian provision was then removed by a house Senate Conference Committee, which returned the revised version to the House and Senate for approval. Despite helm's threat of a filibuster, the Senate voted by a three to one margin to deny him the floor and pass the revised version on October 5.

In another legislative close call. Under Virginia law, private acts of sodomy between consenting adults of any gender are still a felony punishable by up to five years in jail, and a fine of up to \$1,000. But at least there is the possibility of parole. Virginia's Republican Governor George Allen recently proposed a bill to abolish parole for all felonies. And it took a major last ditch

lobbying effort by the gay and lesbian civil rights group Virginians for justice to remove consensual sodomy from the measure before it passed in both the State Senate and the State House on September 29. forcible sodomy and incest are covered by the no parole provision.

But a past conviction for a gay sex act won't prevent Michael Turnbull from being named Bishop of Durham this month. Turnbull is now the fourth ranked official in the Church of England, where he has been a vocal opponent of the ordination of openly gay priests. But 26 years ago, while married and serving as chaplain to the Archbishop of York, Trumbo was convicted on a charge of committing an act of gross indecency with a male farmer in a public restroom. Although that conviction was recently publicized by the tabloid News of the World, the church was already aware of it, and both Archbishop of Canterbury George Carey and Turnbull himself believed the past should be forgiven and forgotten. The British group the Lesbian and Gay Christian movement called Turnbull a hypocrite.

You know, for one thing, one of the things I think, that people always think is, oh, there's different sexual activities for different people and the androgynous women are off is the 50s and each do everything exactly the same. And that turned out to be true. In fact, of these four sort of major designations, there were absolutely no differences between any of the four like who initiated dancing who took care of kids who took out the garbage who fix cars, you know, all that stuff that we have these fantasies about, that set us up into a what I consider to be sexist. It discriminations within our own community. So it really none of it turned out to be true. None of the stereotyping we have of androgynous women that are the stereotyping we have put women in a stereotyping of STEM women turned out to be true. When people reported about themselves, and when they describe themselves in relation when they use words to describe themselves or when they use words to describe others in those designations. Like I'd ask androgynous women. What was it Do you would you use to describe some women or butch women or androgynous women? It was interesting that what ended up happening is in the survey people divided those up under extremely sexist lines, and I was fascinated by it. Now, in the IPF, a list of words that is used on the BIM survey of androgyny, upstander BIM survey that describes what characteristics we ascribe to female male and androgynous people completely fell out exactly as one might think of in a sexist society. So ever since then, I've been on this one person campaign if I go around the country to really start to push up against our concept of one gender, which is really what I'm working on now my gender Jael book. So I really wanted to say what makes anyone think a butch woman has anything to do with being male. And what makes you think Any femme woman has anything to do with a heterosexual vision of the passive female I haven't met a passive them in my life. And then I also wanted to know what people why people put androgynous women in essentially sexless roles. So, I've really been pushing up against the whole concept and trying to come up with fluids and trying to come up with language and, and that's really what I'm talking about now, lots of different ways of describing that. A lot of different ways of trying to shake us up and look at what we've, what, how we are truly sexually, not how we have a mythology that we are not how the outside world influenced us. But really how lesbians are. So that's really what my, my passion is today.

Now, a lot of people flip out when I say that law, lesbians go wacko when I say that, and yet, I hear all the time about butch lesbians, why does she want to act like a man? Well, in my opinion, she's acting like a man, she's acting like a butch, lesbian. And when androgynous women talk to me about the fact that sex isn't important, and I, and I don't believe them, and I feel like our movement was made to be the sort of sexist political, androgynous movement, and I just don't think it's so I think, and I think that there are truly androgynous women, it's not like I'm saying androgyny doesn't exist. And I think that my reputation is sort of preceding me around the country where people think what I'm saying is everybody needs to choose up a roll and get back to the 1950s. And that's not at all what I'm saying. I am saying that we have we pushed out the Butch femme role concept, because we decided that it was heterosexism. And it has nothing to do with heterosexism, in my opinion, and it's, in my opinion, is two of the erotic positions in our lesbian community arm that there are many, many more, including anthrax. So like, one of the things that come up is that I've been using idea of how is it that you actually relate sexually, like who initiate and how do you initiate so? And then I also want to know, who does Who do you do her more at the time? Or does she do you more the time? If you're the queen of everything? How would it work? You know, we have this mythology and lesbian community that we're all 5050. And when I've been going around asking audiences to actually show of hands or stand up and say, you know, which percentage are you? And do you do her more than get done? Or do you get done more than get it then do her? It's fascinating, because one to 5% of the audience is truly 5050. And, and yet, that's all mythology that we're all 5051, we're not. So I think that this subtlety, the gray areas, the ways in which we are that we have sort of more of a circle, you know, I'm saying when you're doing who's doing when someone's doing you, are you getting done? Are you doing them, I always think, you know, when we offer ourselves to someone, we're really we're really doing them. lesbian sex, that's what's so exciting to me about lesbian sex is it sort of just keeps going in this circle. And that's what I that's what I find so thrilling about the fact that I sort of say, you know, like, The New York Times is the newspaper of record. Lesbians are the people of record, we are the ones that are challenging every gender concept in the world. And we have been for many, many centuries, probably, certainly, since the turn of this century, we've pushed all the boundaries about gender lesbians out loud in that, right, and we are also the ones that have have spent endless hours processing content, trying to deal with these topics that are really crucial to the culture in general. And I want to keep in my book, I'm writing my book for mainstream for anyone, and my and I'm using lesbians as the example. I'm interviewing lesbians on how they see themselves in their gender differences. I am interviewing lesbians and I am putting out to women in the world. Look at this is what lesbians have done around gender. There is every option in the world available to us. So that's really what I'm, that's really what I'm talking about and talking about the fact that lesbians are the in the forefront. We may not know that we're revolutionary. But we truly are.

And, and I want I want to hear in depth with yourself. Who are you attracted to? And why are you attracted to that? I really feel that this construct hang up in this constant. Processing ourselves in relationship to heterosexual culture has done us. And I think it's part of why we

don't have sex, I think it's part of why we don't see ourselves as sexual or sexy. I think it's part of why we aren't putting that out there is because we have this fear that either they're going to think that we one of the phrases that the goddess gave me on stage, I always say that, you know, I opened my mouth, and the goddess pours words out of it. And one of the great things that the goddess gave me on stage last year, I was in Oregon, where, of course, they're fighting, terribly good fight against that horrible organization that wants to outlaw queers in all shapes and forms. And I was on stage and saying, you know, what, I don't get they think that we want to be men, and that we hate men. How can it be both? We can't want to be men and hate men. And I think, of course, my dad said for many years, the big scary thing is that we are indifferent to men. It's not men, it's about women, that our lives are focused on women. Our lives are in worship of women, our lives are with women. And it's not the we hate men. We don't have to live with them day in and day out, like straight women, do I you know, I don't have them why? Why would I do it? You know? And so it's, it's looking at how is it that we can explain who it is that we are without getting constantly hung up on and stuck with this heterosexism dichotomous language?
