Gary Barnett again passed away on July 6, he was a big time member of the community and he was a an untiring leader in the community. He was born on February 2 1942. And back in 1975. Gary Renata game was the founding president of the gay Political Caucus now known as the Houston gay and lesbian Political Caucus. He was the founding president of that he was also He also founded the executive professional association of Houston, the Montrose Activity Center, the Log Cabin Republicans, he served on boards for the ACLU, PFLAG and hatch, the US Scholarship Foundation. In 1976. He was made co chair of the National Gay Task Force. He was the first male co chair of the gay rights national lobby now the gay rights campaign. He was co founder of the Texas Human Rights Campaign. Gary was also was also chair of special candlelight service remembering Matthew Shepard back in October of 98. And he was past chair of the EMA Ryan White Planning Council that distributes over \$15 million annually to different AIDS organization. People like Gary Vannatta game are going to be very sorely missed. He was a very untiring member of the community, another member of the queue Unity who's going to be very sorely missed is Mike Stubblefield, who passed away just four days later on the 10th. Monday, July 10. He was 38. Mike Stubblefield. In addition to being on the board of trustees of the Houston gay and lesbian Political Caucus, he was one of the people that I sat on the board with. And I know that Mike Stubblefield also, if there was a person in this community who was in trouble, Mike STUBBLEFIELD And Ray Hill, both of them will be there for that person if it was a medical problems or if it was legal problems. Both Mike STUBBLEFIELD And Ray Hill were there and Mike Stubblefield must have had some Irish Scotch in him because he loved a good, good political fight. People like Mike fulfill again are going to be sorely missed, and they are so few so rare to be found.

And still have a somewhat somber note the 13th and 13th annual International AIDS Conference has closed session in Durban, South Africa. Excuse me, a lot of controversy was started in here in the beginning and the end, starting off with South African President Thabo Mbeki, who is pushing very hard for a fact that he's talked to scientists. And there is some divisiveness in the community about whether or not HIV actually causes AIDS. President Mbeki is one of those who has listened to the evidence and is feels that there's a African aids for version out there. That's also being caused by poverty. The conference ended with former South African President Nelson Mandela, who says that bold initiatives to prevent new infections among young people are needed, as well as large scale actions to prevent mother to child transmission. Some of the things I heard from here for about this conference, it was very surprising is in Botswana, one out of three adult males have AIDS.

The in Africa 70%, of the 34 million aids sufferers live on the continent of Africa. And they are expecting within five years 85% of the teenagers in Africa will have contracted AIDS through one form or one waiver and 5% 85%. They're saying that you're seeing more children orphaned by this disease in Africa than you are than what you we saw in all of the wars. of recent note. Basically, there, you didn't get much information out about the AIDS conference, I have to say I heard a lot of it on the BBC here on KPFT and Pacifica news, and also on PRI on the classical station. But the figures are pretty dramatic are saying 5 million Americans are expected because of decreased use of protection and common sense. In this disease. Everyone thinks that that protease cocktail that's out there will save them. But they're still saying that they're about 10 years away from a vaccine. And still not really even talking about a cure.
