Eventually the case came before the World Court, which I think happened in about 98 or nine. And the decisions and the ramifications of those court hearings really are still trickling down to various countries and state courts. The intent was to try and motivate the international court to to push for a ruling. But I digress on this. We as a community raised an awful lot of funds to help push that cause through and bring that case to justice, and bring these men for simply practicing life the way they chose. Now, there are a number of other smaller funds in place to help with a very specific situation. The AIDS emergency fund of San Francisco is an example. The breast cancer emergency fund that Mama Sandy Reinhart chairs is another example. The maca Dory fund that's monitored by the Chicago health Hellfire Club is a different example. But they're all geared to very specific things. There are a number of great minds coming together in the wake of Katrina, and now read it for going, we've got to have a vehicle in place to help our own people. And it's a fledgling idea. This, this little bird is still in its egg, really, because people are only now just talking. But at least we are talking about helping our own and having emergency, not just funds, really, but emergency banks of talent as well in place when our community needs assistance.
