We briefly reported last week that an Ontario Appeal Court ruled that the Canadian Human Rights Act protects gays and lesbians, even though discrimination based on sexual orientation is not specifically outlawed by the Act. As Rob Atkinson explains, that decision could have far reaching implications for lesbians and gays throughout Canada.

The Ontario Court of Appeal ruling is the latest legal hurdle jumped by Joshua birch, a former Canadian Air Force pilot and formed after telling his superiors he was gay, that he would receive no more postings, promotions or career training. Birds decided to take the Air Force to court, he won his legal challenge. What's more, the Court told the federal government it had six months to amend the Canadian Human Rights Code to protect gays and lesbians, or it would rule the entire code to be unconstitutional. Not surprisingly, the federal government responded by appealing the decision, but now has lost that appeal. Ken Smith, a Vancouver lawyer and prominent gay rights activist explains the implications of the court's decision. What the judges have said in the Ontario Court of Appeal decision is if you're not going to do it, we are and they basically say that it is inconceivable to them that indirectly quoting at this point, enlightened human rights legislation does not include sexual orientation as prohibited grounds of discrimination. And assume, therefore, that the legislative intent is that it should include sexual orientation. I think that it will have an impact on a number of other areas such as spousal rights under federal statute, and those kinds of things. insolate may have an impact on a number of fronts on which gays and lesbians are fighting right now. The federal government has the right to appeal the latest Ontario decision to the Supreme Court of Canada, but it might prove risky to do so. Earlier this year. In an unrelated case, the Supreme Court ruled that lower courts had

the ability to lead in words that are missing from federal and provincial laws designed to protect or benefit the disadvantaged. In other words, the courts themselves could expand the list of prohibited grounds of discrimination in the Canadian Human Rights Code. If the federal government did not like what the lower court read in, it would have to legislate civil rights exceptions, thereby causing a political and public relations nightmare for itself. If the Ontario Court decision stands, gays and lesbians all over the country will finally have protection in federal areas of jurisdiction. Meanwhile, Canadian gays and lesbians are attaining faster success on the provincial level. Recently, British Columbia became the sixth province to amend its own Human Rights Act to include sexual orientation. Another Province will pass similar legislation by the end of the year. By then provinces and territories protecting gays and lesbians will include a 5% of the country's population. For this way out, I'm Rob Atkinson in Vancouver, British Columbia.

Meanwhile, San Francisco attorney Paul Wattman recently filed seven job discrimination lawsuits against companies in the Bay Area, charging that they fired employees because of their sexual orientation. Although the San Francisco Bay Area has a reputation for being liberal and open minded, plaintiffs in the lawsuit say their experience shows otherwise. One of the plaintiffs Steven Greenberg claims he had received a promotion and a pay raise as a manager as assistant for the Nestle beverage company in San Francisco three weeks before he was abruptly terminated, allegedly for inadequate performance. While working at Nestle, Greenberg says he often heard disparaging remarks about gay people. I feel that the issue at large is very real. There aren't many other minorities people would have the nerve to be so blatantly verbal in their abuse of apparently they don't think we're fighting back but we are. Chad Liburd says he was given increasing responsibilities as a collection specialist until he was suddenly fired. He says his supervisor repeatedly mocked him for being gay, telling other employees that he would not have hired him had he known about his sexual orientation, and that he was keeping a close watch on him so that his next mistake could be used as justification to terminate him as a supervisor as the vice president, who actually took a garment of clothing off my sweater Put it around him Imitate me mock me as a homosexual human being. This is in front of an open office and at least 35 to 50 people behind closed doors. This man basically said that no fans were going to be in this workplace. Attorney Paul Whiteman says that it is easier to fight such occurrences in court with anti discrimination laws on the books it becomes a matter of proof becomes matter of witnesses. For example, in Mr. Library case, we have a statement from another employee who has now been fired and is willing to talk that his supervisor so we don't want any facts around here. We didn't know he was gay people can be more blatantly because they think it's not even prohibited. In 1991 Wattman won a \$5.3 million lawsuit against Shell Oil Company for gay employment discrimination, utilizing the state labor code sections which prohibited discrimination on the basis of political activities to win the case. In 1991, the California Legislature passed a gay employment rights bill a b 101, which was then vetoed by Governor Wilson. Wilson declared that a b 101 was unnecessary as there was not evidence of widespread discrimination, and that the labor code sections which prohibited discrimination on

the basis of political activity already protected gays and lesbians. In response to the governor's veto message. Suddenly monetary Friedman of Los Angeles introduced AB 2601, which confirms that labor code sections do indeed prohibit discrimination against gays in employment. Attorney Wattman says he gets at least 20 complaints a week of discrimination against lesbians and gays in the workplace the problems game climate discrimination is pervasive and widespread. And it's very important that this bill passed.

I'm a 20 year old lesbian 20 year old lesbian Jewel, living in a white suburban hell where there was virtually no trace of other lesbians or gays. So I've had little opportunity to learn about our history. Recently, a friend of mine who attends Evergreen State College in Washington, sent me a button reading. Stonewall means fight back Smash, lesbian and gay oppression. Please forgive me for being so uninformed but what exactly was Stonewall Island was that it was a riot or riots in 1969. Any information you can give me and any other isolated, uneducated lesbians out there will be greatly appreciated. Timmy has this great a rap that talks about it which we will play just momentarily. Let me finish reading their answer the answer reads. Thanks for your honesty. There are probably a lot of people who have little idea what Stonewall was or what it meant. We're happy to provide more information. The night of Friday, June 27 1969, wasn't unlike any other night in New York's Greenwich Greenwich Village, until about midnight, when the night ignited the beginning of the modern Gay Rights Movement. Around midnight, four cops raided the Stonewall Inn a gay bar in the village. The rate itself wasn't unusual. Cops routinely rated gay bars and arrested people without IDs and efforts to shut the places down. Why the riots occurred that night and why at Stonewall? No one seems to know but that night patrons and matrons, by the way, have the Stonewall and decided to fight back. In fact, it was a die who first resisted arrest. And it says Yes, sister, people through things that police set fires and generally refuse to sneak off or be subdued. Violence flared up, off and on for two more nights. A year later, more than 5000 lesbians and gay men were watching us to celebrate the first anniversary of Stonewall. Four years after Stonewall, the American Psychiatric Association removed homosexuality from its list of mental disorders. One reason cops had so much influence and power in the reins, was it gays could be committed to mental institutions just for being gay, that helped keep people shut away in closets. Even members of the machine society one of the earliest gay rights groups use aliases to protect themselves. 22 years later, Stonewall is anonymous, who is synonymous with gay rights anonymous, anonymous. 22 years later, Stonewall is synonymous with gay rights, with the refusal to be beaten down by police and society at large. It's our shot heart around the world. And what that means that shot her shot heard around the world. Oh, it's a typo. That's what it is. It's our shot heard around the world, I get it. But at that time, the New York Times merely reported this explosive birth of the gay rights movement with a headline for police heart and village violence. And that was from dinner. And that was someone from Kingwood. It's important to say, I don't know when you don't know. That's right. So you can find you can get that information. Nobody's gonna give it to you if you don't say I don't know it. Right.
