Client school officials however, said the lawsuit is premature and that the application still is under consideration along with several other students proposals for in school groups. The lawsuit filed in federal court is against the district superintendent Jim Surrett. And principal Pat Huff. It alleges that the decision, it leaves it alleges that the decision not to approve the club application led by student Maria Duclair violates this quote violates the First Amendment to the United States Constitution and the Equal Access Act because their prohibit prohibition of the club is based on the content and the viewpoint of the speech of the clubs and its members. The ACLU is asking federal judges in Texas and in Kentucky and a similar lawsuit to force the school districts to allow students to form gay straight alliances on campus. So that is pretty much the deal. What is going on here?
