He was not so lucky and rousing Irish prisoners of the Germans as an Irish brigade, they still regarded themselves as British, and they pushed and struck casement. The Germans warned him that Christiansen was under suspicion, but he sent him back to Norway, where he thickened his plot with a British legation offering to your casement had to capture for more money. He felt he must warn them not to proceed, or if he failed to die with them. He sailed ahead of the arms ship in a submarine, it broke down or seem to and they had to go back. The Germans didn't want casement to arrive before the arms. The Voyage when it finally happened, was horrible. The sub went on the surface, and casement was badly seasick. When they arrived. There was no sign of the arms ship nor anyone on shore to meet them. plans had been changed too late for the U boat captain to be told. All he could do was put casement and two others ashore in a tiny dinghy and sail away before dawn, the D of a turned them grounded on a sand bank. By the time they reached the shore banner strand near trolley casement was exhausted and lay in the water unconscious. He was ecstatic, though, home in his beloved Ireland while the others when for Hill casement was found by a passing policeman. The dinghy which the others had failed to sink gave him away, and he was taken into custody. A German train ticket a diary, though not one recording anything sexual, and code were found in his clothing. Before they found out who he was. He asked a priest to send a warning to call off the rising as it happened. The message didn't get through. But the Easter morning parade of volunteers was called off anyway. Hearing of this, the English were taken off guard and English troops were given time off to go to the races. So when the rising did begin on Easter Monday, it was far more successful than it would otherwise have been. 2000 rebels healed up for almost a week in Dublin at any rate, Germany and casement were blamed. Its echoes reverberate over Ireland today. In 1918. Shin fain adopting many of casements, ideas, swept to power set up their own administration, and in 1921 signed a treaty with Britain granting self government in the south. But the leaders of East arising were court martialed and shocked. Within a few days, casement

was sneaked into England and subjected to a show trial at travesty of justice. One reason was that no reputable barrister was willing to defend a traitor in wartime. The other was casement's diaries. Casement supporters included the Irish playwright George Bernard Shaw, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and pioneer socialists Sidney and Beatrice Webb. Shaw wanted to write a speech for Casement arguing that those effects were proven. They didn't amount to treason because he was Irish, not English. But the only barrister willing to take the case was an Irishman, Alexander Sullivan, who had the eyebrows and jowls of an unusually sad bloodhound, wanted to take another line, a quibble in the definition of treason, which dated from the reign of Edward the Third, he had his own fish to fry, a legal argument would improve his chances of admission to the English bar. It was doomed, and Sullivan had to swing his argument around to shores but he did it so badly that he broke down. He'd begun to remind the court of other Irish patriots and came close to implicating the prosecutor, Attorney General F. E. Smith, in statements as presentable as casement's. Smith had supported home rule, but now he was a patriotic Ulster Protestant unionist. So he had a grudge against Casement; he was also a crony of the Chief Judge Lord Redding. Sullivan had to apologize abjectly and shortly withdrew from the case, leaving Casement to a junior Sullivan's line of defense. It did have the advantage that Casement couldn't be cross-examined, nor the diaries be mentioned in court. Three diaries had been bombed months before in his Belfast lodgings and passed on to the prosecution. Three pages dating from 13 years before were torn out and photographed with entries like

yet you enjoy just many partners with plenty of affection. Even Ardleigh, Christiane soon who had betrayed him in Europe and now offered to give evidence against him. That kind offer was declined for fear it might reveal British dirty dealings. The diaries weren't mentioned in court. But misleadingly, Fe Smith discussed the harmless diary found on Casement as if it were one of the explicit ones that all a jury by now had heard of; the outcome was inevitable. Casement was convicted of treason, and the death penalty was mandatory. But first Casement was asked a lot of you to save yourself why the court should not pass sentence and judgment upon you to die according to law.

Casement's enemies predictably despise the speech, Smith swapped out, but his remaining lawyer noted that it held the attention of the entire court from first to last on a stiflingly hot June day. And one commentator Wilfred Blount thought it the finest document in patriotic

history. Many people that thought that George Bernard Shaw had written it, but let us survive, in which casement disagreed with many of Shaw's arguments.

The government of Ireland by England rests on restraint and not on law. And since it demands no love, it can evoke no loyalty. If I did wrong and making that appeal to Irishman to join with me in an effort to fight for Ireland, it is by Irishman, and by them alone, I can rightfully be judged. We are told that if Irishmen go by the 1000 to die, not to Ireland, but for Flanders for Belgium, or a rocky trench on the heights of Gallipoli, they are winning self government for Ireland. But if they dare to lay down their lives on their native soil, then they are traitors to their country. If loyalty be something less than love, and more than law, that we have had enough of such loyalty for Ireland or Irishman, self government is our right, a thing born in us at birth, a thing no more to be doled out to us or withheld from us by another people than the right to life itself, than the right to feel the sun or smell the flowers or to love our kind.

Our kind. Doesn't your heart go out to a man who could say that, from the dock of the Old Bailey, with the judge about to sentence him to death, and knowing that the diaries were being circulated. One of the judges had a facial tic that looked like a ghastly laugh as the death sentence was delivered. There was an appeal, which incredibly included a legal argument about whether a mark on the original act of 1351 in Arcade French was a punctuation mark, or just a crack in the parchment. But since it was the same argument just before it was hopeless, there remains the hope of a reprieve by the Home Secretary or an appeal to the House of Lords, but that required the consent of the Attorney General and he was f e Smith. The date fixed for execution left only two weeks for a reprieve campaign, but messages began pouring in from Ireland from the Congo from the Amazon from the USA. much important support collapsed though, when supporters saw the diaries. The villain here is the Legal Adviser to the home office urn Lee Blackwell, who had a malignant hatred of casement. He arranged for Prince of the diaries to be shown to anyone who might have agitated for casements reprieve, including King George the fifth, who said of another gay man, I thought men like that shot themselves. The news of the World newspaper wrong as usual, said that nobody who saw them whatever it mentioned casements name again without loathing and contempt. It was Blackwell who suggested to cabinet that the diaries be used to smudge casements reputation after his execution, and so prevent him from becoming a martyr. We now know that two of that cabinet were Hamas Sikhs who will themselves one liter fled from scandal into exile. The other committed suicide is the character repeats brutal.

has been focusing its attention on on gay bashing primarily. And I mean, if we're driving around, and we happen to see some kind of criminal activity, like burglarizing a vehicle on a site that may not be gay related, then of course, we'll report that to HPD. But, but our focus has

been on on gay bashing. And as a part of our program, what we've been what we've been doing is, if we observe vehicles in the neighborhood with, with street kids in them that don't belong here, they're just aimlessly driving about. We take down the license number and the make description of the vehicle. And we log it in a data bank, we've accumulated several 100 license plate numbers this way, and we review it every month. And invariably there are certain license plates reappear on a fairly consistent basis. So what we've been doing is with those license numbers, we've been

we've been getting going downtown and getting the registration off of the license plate and sending postcards to the address to which the cars registered. Usually, you know, our suspicion is this mom and dad. And the postcard basically says that the vehicle was seen in the Montrose that there is an incidence of gay bashing and hate crimes there and that the license number has been forwarded to federal, state and local police agencies for it Pre into their data bank. And then if we have a description of what the vehicle was doing, for instance, if if we have a description that the vehicle was yelling, sad or queer or something, add members of the patrol or pedestrians, then we write that on the bottom of the cloud. And we sent out, I don't know how many of those we sent out, I guess, maybe 10 to 15. And we have, we've tried to keep a log, or keep a monitor, after we send a card on a particular vehicle, whether the vehicles is seen and we haven't seen some of these, you know, most of these vehicles again. So I think that's been really effective. Because I think a lot of times the car goes to mom and dad that's in the cars, right? District Two, and they get JR and Sally in the kitchen the next morning and say, you know, I got this card from these people and they know where we live in what are you doing driving around Montrose. So actually, one part of our program that I think has been really effective, and, and we're gonna continue that.

they were not here to bash and they were arrested. i We haven't followed up on what happened to him after that, but but they were in possession of firearms. So so they were charged with that, I'm sure.

We've got we've been doing this since Thanksgiving. And you know, we've been doing it and we're we don't we don't run people down in terms of being confrontational. We, you know, we stay at a safe distance. If we're to, you know, whether someone is armed. Then we, we call HPD. As a general rule, we have at least two mobile units, usually three, and there are full patrol. And our full Patrol has a minimum of five people. And it's the first I think one of the first weekend we started doing this. The front patrol was going down Westheimer and people are two carloads of people, in fact, on two different occasions within five minutes of each other through beer bottles and beer cans, but that's really the closest call that we've had. So, you know, I don't really think about it to my childhood. I suppose there's always a danger. But, you know, it's not something that I know that. That bothers me too much.

Yeah, I know that when we were handing out flyers for a National Coming Out Day, October 11. We were out in front of Pacific street bars and think there were three or four of us. We're all you know, fairly young, fairly, you know, I guess, unassuming looking. We're standing around at front handing out flyers and a car, a limousine and a car full of teenagers, little teeny bopper, teenagers came out. And they started shouting things at us from the car. They were shouting queers and fags and stuff like that. And one guy asked a male friend of mine if he was a guy or girl, he's very obviously a man asked him if he was a guy or girl and asked me if I was a fag. And I proceeded to tell him no, I wasn't. That's right. I was a duck and darn proud of it. Thank you. But we realized at that point that that is harassment and that is against the law. And we did call the police on the vehicle. And we had excellent cooperation with the police department. We had not one but two cars arrived almost immediately. And they were very generally true. And we've had, they're very nice to us and they took care of the problem immediately.

There's a couple of us that are in queue patrol now that were involved in a similar organization about 15 years ago called Montrose patrol. And my experience with Montrose patrol logos many years ago was that we got a minimal cooperation from HPD. In fact, I think HPA HPD did everything that they could think of, to, to impede our efforts. It's completely the opposite now. HPD, in particular, the sergeant in charge of the storefront on Westheimer, has been over backwards to, to, to assist us in any way they can HPD has provided us with, with a CB radios for the cars. And so they've really, really been helpful. The response time has been really good. And as we do we get we get a little bit better about reporting stuff. I mean, we don't we don't

report something unless we're fairly sure about it. And that, you know, it's some kind of serious criminal activity. I guess. It was about a month ago, maybe we observed a guy that was running with a purse, a guy running with a person Montrose is not necessarily an unusual. But we decided we filing for a bed, and we did and, and there happened to be an off duty constable that was monitoring us on our channel. And he started following into and he eventually stopped the guy turned out the guy had just committed aggravated robbery, he typed in the perfect gunpoint from a woman. And he still had the gun on him. And so he was arrested and HPD there's not only HPD out here, but there's there's cameras, off duty constable this working out here. You might have seen his vehicle, it looks like an HPD vehicle, but it's but it's wide. And it says Montrose crime patrol or something on it and, and he's been really helpful. So our relationship with HPD has been really good. I and I'm really proud of that. And and I think some of the officers are a little bit uncomfortable with the name Q Patrol, because they have connotations as to what the letter T stands for. But I suspect with a little bit of sensitivity training, they'll get over that.

And if it's your first time and we give you an information sheet and get you to fill out a form that's a release of liability and you're ready to go issue issue your very tasteful and very tasteful t shirt. It's getting to be quite in demand around here. So black T shirt was written on the front of it and so those have been very popular in and it looks really good people I think the response has been really good to the fact that people know who we are now. You know when when you see hands of people roaming around, you're a little bit suspicious of them. And now the worldwide Q Patrol T shirts. It's clear who we are. And so we're getting some really good response. Again, we do this every Friday night and every Saturday night. And basically the areas that we're patrolling now is, is I guess what you'd call a bar area bounded by Westheimer and Montrose down to and then back up to Taft. So, and we stay out until about at least 215 or 230. And let everybody you know, leave the bars and get to their cars and stuff. And sometimes if it's real slow, we cut out early. Or if the weather is really really bad, we cut out early but generally we stay out till about 230.
