As co authors of lesbian nuns breaking silence make their talk show circuit on the nation. The Westinghouse TV stations ban them from being interviewed at their stations and a report from the first International AIDS Conference in Atlanta from National Public Radio. Houston police at Friday. Their courtroom lost in a prostitution case will not deter them from setting up future modeling studios meant to lure customers willing to pay for sex. The police also called County Court at law judge Billy Regan, liberal minded. They said they were not surprised Thursday when Reagan found Jim Bazi age 23 innocent of soliciting prostitution reach Friday, Fonzie said his discussion with his lawyer the possibility of filing a suit against the Houston Police Department. The attorney Steve mess call said it would be appropriate for the department to pay his client \$100,000 impugn To have damage award. Pfizer was videotaped at a studio on December 2, as he talked to Charlotte van court and undercover police woman posing as a prostitute. In the tape Fonzie could be heard asking van court for half and half. Van court testified that she interpreted the request for oral sex and intercourse. However Fuzzy on Friday said he explained to his friends that he was referring only to a mixture of milk and cream fancourt said Friday she did not feel she entrapped posi. She said she also was very surprised what Reagan's ruling. He seemed very bitter about the whole things than court said. She said she would never pose as a prostitute again in a police sting operation. Again because she was getting married in June Fazi, a student at a computer technology school said he feels the Houston Police have violated his civil rights, especially his freedom of speech. All I did was talk. He said the charge against him also caused him to miss a lot of school. Fozzie said several of his classmates were calling him Hollywood Jim. A few girls came up and asked me what half and half is. Fonzie said of his troubles. My girlfriend was laughing about it. She took it pretty easy. Houston vice officer says Reagan in the past has usually found their suspects innocent of charges against them. Reagan was in Louisiana on Friday and could not be reached for comment. According to Reagan's court coordinator, and in the first sting operation of its kind in Houston, Houston police in November set up their own modeling studio at 108 Westheimer and staffed it with undercover female officers posing as prostitutes. About 290 men were secretly videotaped at the studio, resulting in 180 of them being charged with soliciting prostitution. Captain Jack Fulbright, head of the vice division said 118 of those have since been convicted after pleading guilty or opting not to contest the charges against them. Reagan said he and other judges have accepted those plays. But Fozzie was the first vendor to come to trial, in his case was quickly thrown out of the court by angry

Reagan, who called a police sting operation and entrapment. And put a criminal record on a lot of people to judge said at the end of the trial, I'm Fulbright's said he was not surprised by Reagan's action. He's very liberal minded when it comes to prostitution laws, adding that in the past have been very hard to win any convictions and Reagan's court in vice and gambling cases. Fulbright said he feels that the judge has injected his own opinion in finding FISA innocent innocent, rather than following the letter of the law. He said 44 cases from the sting are scheduled to go to trial with only three cent and Reagan's court. Fulbright's said he does not expect any of those other cases and Reagan's court to end and a conviction but welcomes the cases to be heard by other judges. I feel then other courts the judges are more professional and will disregard the personal opinions to act impartially. The captain said. We're very confident how we stand as far as the law goes. Fulbright said the police continued to search for 18 men caught in the sting who have yet to serve with arrest warrants. He said that Reagan's ruling will not prevent police from staging similar things in the future, the case will be heard will have no bearing on doing other ones in the future. Fullbright said Houston Police Chief Lee Brown said he did not believe his officers and trapped anybody at the studio. Brown. Brown said that before the operation was set up his department consulted regularly with the Harris County District Attorney's office. Brown would not say whether sting operations will be conducted in the future. But he added we subject we suggest to those who do not want to be arrested not to go into places where they feel prostitution is going on. He said it does not make any sense for that purpose for him to complain about Reagan's ruling. Once again, a book being banned in Boston is having an effect on the literary world. And partly as a result, an extraordinary new book about homosexuality among nuns is gaining national attention. The book published by a small series feminist and lesbian press in Tallahassee, Florida, is called lesbian nuns breaking silence. In it are the accounts of how 51 Women 42 of them former Roman Catholic nuns, and nine who are still bound by their vows came to grips with their lesbianism, edited by two college teachers who are lesbian and former nuns. The book is just reaching store shelves almost a month ago, when the Reverend Peter Conley, spokesman for the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Boston learned of it, he saw an article in The Boston Globe reporting that an interview with the author's Rosemary curb and associate professor of English in Rollins College in Florida, and the NC Manahan, a teacher until last year at Napa Valley College and California would be broadcasted by Channel Four and NBC affiliate there in May, about about the same time. Father Conley saw publicity flyer on the book, and the title is from a publishing house nynuk Press. One title leap out economy has been pornographic, and he decided without even seeing or reading lesbian nuns, that the book was sensational. I have no problem with anyone who knows us at the church. knows that we are frail said Kali. We know. We know sin, but it is sensationalism that I object to he wrote to Thomas Goodgame, Vice President general manager of Channel Four, saying that the program would be affront to the sensitivity of Roman Catholics. Good game said that he did not know the program was scheduled until he got commies letter, and when he found out he did not approved. It was a singling out of a small segment of the population, he said, and I wasn't comfortable with that. He wrote calmly saying that the program had been canceled. And then he said The Boston Globe ran a story and all hell broke loose. The news service picked up the story of the banning of the nuns and the Tallahassee press. Barbara Greer present of the 12 year old nine out press was delighted and all the telephone calls from reporters. This is crazy. She says I am a mouse giving birth to an elephant. The fallout from it was immediate GREER SAYS if they want to kill the book, all they had to do was keep their mouth shut. The Roman Catholic church many years ago realized that one of the dumbest things they were doing was banning books. Lesbian nuns does not seem destined for obscurity, although it is being carried in about 800 Gay and Lesbian bookstores grow says be Dalton Waldenbooks are counting it to now neck press has printed 125,000 copies 10,000 and hard covers and almost all of them GREER SAYS have been taken up by orders. A book like this will go into supermarkets and drugstores and terminals all over the country said Mark Greenberg, president of Warner in house advertising agencies. We are not counting on controversy with the church but if it's there, we are going to sell books. The official release date isn't until May 24. Greer said it ought to be a big best seller. By then. The prospect leaves her jubilant career said as she realized her own lesbian sexuality at the age of 12. I wanted to read about people like me, she said, but you can find almost no books on the subject. She started and I had press 1973 with about \$3,000 and has since published novels History Series poetry and books on science fiction, romance and self help all with a lesbian theme. The book has had its genius when Kurt and menahan were introduced. Both had already left the convent and had began to seek out former nuns who are lesbian. Some of the women included in the book have gained prominence through the movement of gay rights. One of them is Virginia Puzo, Executive Director of the National Gay Task Force, who has just recently been appointed Deputy Executive Director of the New York Consumer Protection Board by Governor Mario Cuomo. I hope the result of the books had curb is to eliminate the centuries of silence and to end the taboo against lesbianism to make it clear that lesbians are everywhere and that some of them are leaders. International AIDS Conference closed today in Atlanta, closing on a somber note at the conference more than 2000 Researchers from throughout the world compared research findings on the spreading epidemic of AIDS. And scientists now say that Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome is much more widespread than previously thought and be honest. Laurie Garrett reports.

Dr. Robert Redfield is a physician for the US Army's Walter Reed Hospital Today reported that of all cases of AIDS or AIDS associated illnesses seen in the last four years among US military personnel, at least a third involved heterosexual men, none of the men admitted to any bisexual or homosexual context or the use of intravenous drugs. Some did admit, however, to being regular customers of female prostitutes. Blood tests show that image jority of their wives

had antibodies to the AIDS virus. That could mean three things. The women were exposed to the virus but eliminated it or their carriers, or worse, that they will get the disease. Some of the women subsequently developed aids like symptoms. Rachel doesn't know yet whether any of the women will get full blown AIDS, the couples do not appear to indulge in annual intercourse. Dr. Redfield concludes heterosexual transmission of AIDS is definitely occurring. Reto believes the AIDS epidemic may now begin to spread into the heterosexual community among highly sexually active individuals. I think the epidemiologic data that we've gathered, even though not conclusive, is disturbing in that a large percentage of the individuals presenting do not have a risk factor other than heterosexual contact. I don't PURPORT This to prove definitively in any way that prostitutes have transmitted the disease to these particular individuals. But I think having demonstrated heterosexual transmission for men and women, in trying to account for these population differences, that in fact, that's a very reasonable hypothesis at this point. In New York City Health Department also reported cases of heterosexual transmitted aids, Dr. Dale Lawrence, the US Centers for Disease Control. I think the big message is at the populations that have been recognized that risk already will continue to be those essentially at risk for a long time in the future. We're not talking about generally speaking, a monumental epidemic in this country. In groups outside of those recognized groups, the relative proportion of cases into the future will probably come from the same groups we've recognized. Perhaps the heterosexual cases we've heard reported, are the beginning of a proportionally very small problem. In this country, the CDC has developed a new model to explain how long it takes to get sick after exposure to the AIDS virus. Based on recent aids statistics, Lawrence believes most people exposed to the AIDS virus first gets sick five years later, but at this conference, Lawrence said some people may carry the virus for up to 14 years before showing symptoms of AIDS. Furthermore, he warns the AIDS virus appears to cause another non aids disease, brain damage. Several laboratories have shown that the virus invades the brain and can reproduce their patients and suffer memory loss and eventually dementia, Dale Lawrence, the size of the epidemic is easily recognized as continuing for an extended period. But you are saying that even if we found a cure today and a vaccine today that we'd still be seeing cases of AIDS 14 years from now. And you're also saying that probably more thorough positive people will express some kind of symptoms in your life of either central nervous system damage or AIDS associated problems than was previously. Yes, exactly. What percentage is that? Can you put an I can't put a number on it. That means that of the 1 million Americans, the CDC estimates who test positive for antibodies against AIDS, nobody is sure how many will actually come down with the disease. And the meantime, cases of AIDS reported today in Italy, Finland, Hungary, Australia, Canada, Brazil, Africa and the Caribbean. And in Africa, men and women seem to be at equal risk of contracting AIDS. In one Kenyan tribe, over 50% tested positive for antibodies to the AIDS virus.
