Understand this was a citywide election in which people avoided in droves. 6.3% of the 6.4% actually of the total, qualified voters went to vote. That's the lowest turnout in anybody's memory, there were 19 candidates. The leading candidate was Katherine Tyra, she was blessed with the full power and influence of the Republican Party, plus the supercharger of the fundamental this community attached to that. So she had the hosts the machine and everything, and they very carefully did not divide their support between Katherine Tyra and Jim Kennedy, which they well could have done. So the election results shows that that political machine was entirely focused on Catherine Tyra and so she had not just money that that group had cares a lot of money, but she also enjoyed a lot of legwork. Lists, access to people, pamphleteering churches last Sunday and working on that. That's a very difficult thing. She got a total of 15,500 plus votes, which was 33.9, or almost 34% of 6.4%. Right. So I mean, in a real election, the all of the votes that she got, would be insignificant.

It proved that nobody had discipline but us. John PVS votes John PVS black, black judge, it was a family court judge just got defeated in the Republican suite. John Peavy did not get those votes from black precincts. And you know that Ray hill because I've been to black precincts today. I went to the largest three black precincts in Third Ward today. And one of them 27 people had voted all day and another 130 people had voted all day in a third 37 people had voted. Not exactly a massive turnout is not a magic where John Peavy got his vote are predominantly white people who got most of the black votes was the ALMA Allen and Jeanne Moore who spent an awful lot of money in this. And those folks went out and worked hard to get what votes they got. They only got piddling votes 2000 For Alma and almost 3000 for Jean. Jean spent more money than anybody else in this race. So money doesn't do it. But political machines and organizations have. This was the best organized campaign. I don't know whether it was because you were there, Sarah? This is the best organized campaign we have ever done. And it paid off in real numbers. Let me tell you something they gave me the lesbians in the runoff. There's even fewer people can go to the polls in this race. People are just really not excited about this vacancy. Katherine Tyra conservative Republican but I don't call conservative Republicans against her my my good friends have been conservatives, Republicans Roy Cohn. Other wonderful friends that have been conservative Republican that I've known over the years but that she's tied in with the fundamentalist religious right. So she's no friend of ours. We can't go there. Right. And these Parker is in a power broking. But you can only power broke with John Peavy. So a person should do with and he can therefore take us for granted. But we don't have to go to the Pope. So when a nice calls John and gets the word out that she's talked to John, then we need to decide to go to the polls in even better numbers than we went today. Because that's the only way we can keep a hand in the game. And we're standing beside the table, because we don't have a seat. Right? There's no seat for us. We absolutely do not have a seat. And if you know if there are those people out there that want a fraction off and say, Well, this is not the right candidate. Let me tell you something. And these Parker was the right candidate. And this was the right time didn't work. When you come in third ahead of 16 others there could be worse news. Let me tell you something. Our freedom doesn't depend on winning or losing. Our freedom depends on what we think of ourselves and one another. The trust that we build up as a community, you don't have to be community. That's something that we did. Purposely our leadership created the sense of community and it caught on over a long period of time. Gay Lesbian radio didn't begin in San Francisco. didn't begin in New York. didn't begin in Houston either. began in Dallas. A sole voice professional voice who made a living in radio named Dave Lambeau did a program called just before dawn remember the song? The Darkest Hour is just before dawn. It was this theme music every Sunday night. At three o'clock in the morning, Dave lamb will delegate show gay and lesbian show in Dallas, Texas. They were still doing radio. This was in the 60s. Then Wildenstein was created on the KPFT simply because I thought I could do as good a job as day. And I had a vehicle, right? And then after that I am Are you started in Los Angeles. And after that, the gay program started in San Francisco and later New York. So gay and lesbian radio began in Texas by a couple of crazy guys who really didn't know what they were doing, but thought that they could make it work. After hours is a natural heir to a long, proud history of bringing you news information and analysis that you've just heard. Over a nice is right. We're supposed to do that. And you're sitting there and all of this is happening inside your mind, because that's the way radio works. Used to get letters and telephone calls doing Wildenstein on KPFT. From young lesbian saying every week when you go on the radio, I tell my mother I'm going to clean my closet and what

mother doesn't want her teenage daughter cleaning closets. And that way I will not be disturbed and I literally listened to Wildenstein in my closet. The symbol of where I listened to it in my life This is so important. So you're not closeted anymore. That was something that somebody else gave you as a gift. And now it is your turn to continue the process. And how do you do that? You go to the telephone and you call 526-573-8526 KPFT. A lot of you've listened to my voice over the radio for years, I still do radio here, not gay and lesbian radio do the prison show on Sunday. But I've been openly gay on these radio waves now for more than 25 years. And we need or were right at 25 years because the station is that old and one of the first programs we did was tape programs of radio giving lectures at the University of Houston. I don't even like that word. But somebody's got to see it's not their fault. Can you tell us a little bit about what what's known about the origins of transsexuality or transgenderism?

Well, I think traditionally, in years past, experts tended to feel that this was a psychologically based problem that some sort of difficulty in rearing or problems and identification with one sector, the other cause this, but again, we just did not have the technology to fully understand the problem. I liken it very much to the whole problem of childhood autism. And what I mean by that is that decades ago, experts came up with the term refrigerator parent, meaning cold parents who somehow caused this severe disorder in kids. That's all we knew at the time. Now, today, we have the technology, we understand that this is clearly a biological problem, something that goes wrong in the central nervous system. I think that we are on the verge of identifying that same kind of thing when it comes to transsexualism. Most experts today believe that it is something that goes wrong, so to speak, while that individual is developing in the uterus of the mother. In other words, it has to do with hormones, but hormones that are fetal hormones, things that go on prior to birth. As I alluded to earlier, sexuality involves a number of elements and develops across the entire span of fetal development. Some of the first things that occur course, are chromosome sacks, or mono sacks, development of bodies, but we tend to think something may go wrong along those critical stages, such that what happens is the person is born with the anatomy, one sex, but born with the brain sex of the opposite sex. So we do tend to believe that it is biological. And that's why now basically, experts in this area, have stopped trying to psychotherapy, PI's people out of this, and instead, listen to them and instead try to help them with medical interventions to be happy and to be successful. And I might note that some of the follow up data and published articles that we've done through our program here in Galveston shows that people can lead very happy and productive lives once they complete this kind of treatment. Now we have folks that, you know, truck drivers, doctors, lawyers, computer programmers, homemakers, I mean a whole variety cuts across the socio economic span, these folks can be very, very happy and very successful and typically become more happy and more productive once they start being true to themselves and get involved in something like this.

And yes, those kinds of folks occur, but they also occur in the real world and in other kinds of situations. By and large, however, this represents the smallest percentage of the transgender population. Most of our folks, as you well know, from attending some of our gatherings. We wouldn't make Heraldo, we wouldn't make hardcopy we'd be too dull for those kinds of ratings. Our folks are very simple, very ordinary. Their goal is simply to blend in to develop their own lives to go through this kind of real life transition, come out the other end and get on with their lives. And I think we've been very successful to help those kinds of folks that we weren't
