while the official opening ceremony character welcome and hopes for the coming week and ended with a charity dinner in an Amsterdam Central Square hosted by Liz Taylor and the mayor of Amsterdam for \$100 seat, packed up marched through the streets and into the conference delivering flour and coffins denouncing human rights abuses and the lack of information on women. Lack of translators in all the opening, closing and large sessions shut out and angered many in a presentation on the effects of homophobia. One man bought his own translator to say that he was dismissed said that so much of the information he desperately needed for his own community was only available in English, and frequently given by participants that shared his mother tongue. Language and the use of became a major topic in many areas. Women campaigned for the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta, to change the

definition of AIDS to include pelvic infections and cervical cancers. Chanting women don't get AIDS, they just die from it. They claim that the current definition denies women proper health care and benefits. Also under fire is the CDC definition of lesbians in the criteria under which they collect data, which defines a lesbian as a woman who has only had sex with other women since 1977. The whole debate of denial of HIV for lesbians, both from within and without the lesbian community exploded, would accept that the Terrence Higgins Trust leading AIDS organization, a poster which advised that oral sex is low risk to throw those dams away and not to bother with rubber gloves, unless it turns you on, infuriated many of the lesbian activists. They cited the complete lack of data concerning women to women transmission, and the unknown numbers of lesbians lost in the other categories of data, intravenous drug users, sex workers, etc.

The biggest topic of conversation was a report on 12 apparent cases of AIDS where researchers were unable to find any traces of HIV. The world's top AIDS scientists disagreed on the meaning of the report. Some said the cases were examples of a new type of AIDS virus as yet undetected. Some said it was an example of a new form of immune system disease. Even though the dozen cases are a tiny number compared to the millions of people worldwide with HIV-induced AIDS. The consequences for the world's blood supply could be great.

A hastily convened press conference with the top US governmental AIDS researchers here tried to put to rest any concern that the blood supply was in any way endangered. They said that these few cases are the first among over 230,000 cases of AIDS reported so far in the US. One of the concerns of AIDS activists here is the unavailability of newer therapies to the 80% of people with HIV infection who live in the developing world. As a symbol of this limited accessibility to drugs, ACT UP members confronted Astra pharmaceuticals at their corporate booth in the conference hall. Astra makes a drug against blindness and AIDS patients. It's called foscarnet. And as the most expensive drug in the world, this is a warning task. Dolly Bronfman is with ACT UP Golden Gate, we will continue to be a patent against Astra pharmaceuticals throughout this conference in the United States, and in Sweden everywhere they are located. All of the pharmaceutical companies should know we will not tolerate AIDS profiteering. We will not tolerate going blind and dying because we cannot afford drug. A more enlightening and empowering session brought a large audience together to talk about the emotional handling of the ongoing losses of friends and relatives. AIDS workers from countries like Uganda, India and Italy talked about their personal experiences in dealing with death and dying. The most inspirational moment came from Native American Terry to FOIA from the University of Washington. He was born and raised in Taos, New Mexico, to foil stepped onto the podium dressed in a colorful vestment of traditional mourning between Native American people around his also in a cycle that when the European people came, they brought diseases through which we had no immunity. And so it was very common within our communities for people to die from mumps, and measles, and influenza, and smallpox. It's estimated, for example, from my mom's people up in the Pacific Northwest that over 80% of our native population died within two generations of white contact because of these diseases. For that reason we have experienced in terms of what it means to have multiple loss.
