And I started asking people and said, you know, tell me two things that you know about the right wing. And they all sort of looked at me and said, Well, I know they're anti gay and that was about it. There was more to it. So I've spent a lot of time on the internet and downloaded a bunch of material, particularly from a group called People for the American way. A very a watchdog group dealing with the police Right. And we're going to go into into some detail tonight explaining what the religious right is, what it is they believe how it is they got control of the Republican Party, both in the state and nationally. And what it means to you, whether you're gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgendered, asexual, regardless of what it is, whether you're a person that wants to adopt children, they have a view on everything. And well, we're not going to try and cover everything. But I did target some specific examples, and even prepared a little musical salute a musical so a musical salute to the political right wing into the Republican Party. And if you those of you who've been listening to the show, if you know me, then you know what you're in for. Kidding.
