way. Now, this is a watchdog group, I think many people in the audience are going to be familiar with them. And the way this report was put together, is they analyzed the specific language of various state party platforms of the 50 state parties. 19 produced no platforms, really, of the remaining 31 state parties. 20 produced platforms in 1996 to produce them and 95 that are still current, and three will produce new platforms this fall after the Republican Convention, six were unable or unwilling to provide their platforms or were unresponsive. So this analysis is done on the basis of 22 platforms that had been provided to them by the Upstate Republican parties.
