And he committed some very brutal sexual assaults, people ended up with permanent physical damage, nerve damage in their hands. A friend of mine ended up with a couple black eyes and a swollen head, he held one guy for several days against his will. I mean, it was some pretty severe abuse that was going on. And unfortunately, because of the nature of the setting where these guys met this perpetrator, they didn't talk about it, you know, there was a lot of shame around, and nobody said anything. And so this man was able to get away with these assaults for years. And it wasn't until actually somebody posted something on the internet. And it got a couple other people talking. And you know, a bunch of guys realized that they weren't the only one. And GMs ama took a leadership role in in outing this person. And what it really came down to, we had his name and knew who he was. And one night, out at the war, one of the big leather bars here in New York, somebody pointed them out to me, and I confronted him. And I actually ended up chasing them out of the bar. And from there, we thought he had had disappeared, there was lots of rumors about you know, he was in jail and this and that. And this

was a senior managing partner at Bear Stearns, after the village have always had a couple of front page articles about the assaults that were taking place. And a criminal investigation was launched. It's my understanding that Mr. Pate was called back from vacation, and shortly after that, he resigned. But there's at this point in time, there's an ongoing criminal investigation. None of the victims were willing to press charges, there were only two or three who fell within the statute of limitations, and that the district attorney's office felt comfortable arguing in court. And unfortunately, because their work situations just wouldn't allow them to move forward with this, there was every indication that it was going to be public and ugly. And for example, you know, one of the guys taught Catholic school, you know, and it would ruin

his career as well. Yeah. Yeah, that's, that's, you know, it's hard. And we we have people who are, you know, to our eyes, to the communities eyes, perfectly innocent. I mean, like, this couple in New York, I don't really know what the whole story is. But what we've heard was that, you know, basically, they're out a mild play party, and somebody's got a video of them, the video gets out, and they lose their kids because of it. And, you know, there's been, you know, \$25,000 raised by the community, to help defend these people and help them get their kids back. Now, I don't know whether that's just or not, I'm not sure about the whole situation, I would reserve judgment. But basically, you know, it's really hard for us bring down somebody that we know, should be brought down, you know, in a lot of this is because of the the general situation with, you know, repression, with people being afraid with the discrimination that's out there, the reality of the discrimination that's out there. That's why we need to change the situation to protect ourselves. So another thing

is, what we did here in New York was basically a two pronged educational awareness around, you know, this man in particular, and to try to encourage other victims to come forward and at least seek some counseling and get some help that way. But we also worked very closely with the anti violence project here in New York, and just, you know, raised the awareness around you know, can sensuality and assault if, you know if, if you don't agree to it, you know, it's rape. And no matter what anybody else says, you know, if it's against your will, it's not okay, and just try to let guys know that you had talked a number of times about novices and protocol and how you get involved. But, you know, he was forced to resign from a job on Wall Street where he was making well over a million dollars a year, you know, so there's certainly some punitive aspects of that. But but we also forged a wonderful working relationship with the anti violence project here in New York and have continued to partner with them on all sorts of projects. And we've also, you know, I was invited by the DEA 's office, to meet with their detectives to do an SM 101. You know, so I mean, the outreach that we were able to do, the head of the Sex Crimes Unit brought me in to talk about SM issues when they were reviewing the cases. You know, I mean, it was a tremendous step into legitimizing our whole subculture, our whole way of of organizing that they were they were acknowledging and seeking help from the SM community. That was a huge step forward.

Now, there have been other break for the breakthroughs that GM SMA has participated in in terms of, you know, the work that you've done, besides this particular event?

Well, I know we've done a lot of work recently, with pretty much a newly formed organization,

GM SMA, I'm actually on the board GM SMA is a member partner, a group called the National Coalition for sexual freedom. And basically, it's an advocacy and policy entity, and doing a lot of work around fighting for the right of freedom of sexual expression. And I don't know if any of you gentlemen happened to catch 60 minutes last week. But there was a piece on there that dealt with basically gay curriculum in universities. And a big part of it was about a conference that happened here in New York, at the State University up in New Paltz. And out of about, there was a women's conference of, say, 40 workshops, one of them had to do with lesbianism, and one of them had to do with like an SM 101. And they just jumped all over the SM 101. And they had the head of the trustees on 60 minutes, just you know, can you believe they were doing this with money from the state and just on and on? Well, the National Coalition for sexual freedom has been lobbying, demonstrating to just raise awareness around you know that SM is a viable sexual expression, and it shouldn't be censored.
