related story Suicide Prevention Week September 4 through 10. According to the most recent statistics provided by the Texas Department of State Health Services suicide is the second leading cause of death in Texas among 25 to 34 year olds after accidental deaths, and the third leading cause of death for youth and young adults between the ages of 15 and 24. It is estimated that gay and lesbian youth are up to five times more likely to attempt suicide. Montrose Counseling Center is a member of the Suicide air Houston area Suicide Prevention Coalition, and sees the results of this marginalization on a regular basis. Some of our clients experience this marginalization to fold in the society that only stigma not only stick to my securitizes, gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered persons but also stigmatizes those who reach out for mental health care. According to the Mental Health Association of Texas if the suicides carried out 90% are related to untreated or undertreated mental illness, experts believe most suicidal individuals do not want to die. Instead just wanting to end the pain. Some can't see a way out of a temporary dilemma. A call to the gay and lesbian switchboard Houston at 713-529-3211, maybe the first step toward reaching out for help. Volunteers are trained to

listen to callers and help them find their own solutions or refer refer them to a professional psycho, psycho. Therapist, psychotherapist, if it's beyond the scope of peer support. And something else that much was counseling center is doing gay by man crystal meth focus group is forming. And that will be starting Tuesday, September 13. At 6pm at the Montrose Counseling Center, gay and bisexual men who have used crystal meth in the last year you do not need to be a client at MCC. And there will be pizza and sodas will be provided. So, I do want to mention something that's already happened last weekend was the history Sunday history. Day over at the community center sponsored by the community center and G Gam Gulf Coast archive and museum. It was really, really a lot of fun. We listened to the history and life story of John kelut from the Kellogg Foundation, John's early days and what led him to come to Houston and to form the Kellogg Foundation, which helps many, many small groups and larger groups get starts and has been there to help out for emergency needs.

there was that group that was speaking out against it. In 10th grade I got involved with a group of people who decided they were going to start a gay straight alliance. So I became a part of it and ended up leading it and helping with their alliances from that school to the school that I had come from. Then, when I was in 11th and 12th grade, I moved again, and since then, I co founded a gay shed Alliance at that school, Clear Creek High School. And we've had a lot of feedback and some of it some positive, some of it's been negative. When we first started it, our principal and Some of the authority figures were very much so against it. And you know referred to it such things as BC ality club and other negative things like that. But as its progressed we've we started the second semester of last year. So we only had it for one semester and we're starting and again, our first official school meeting will be next week. It's been successful for the most part, although we've had some differences within leadership and all of those things. But we found that there are some key issues to address such as organization in a club, how you go about starting on what what is the proper way to go through an authority figure, and to be polite to them so that they are accepting, because we have had trouble in the past of people trying to start groups that are not accepting, right? Well, I

personally, I went to high school with Trixie and Mary. And my first semester of senior year, I had gotten involved in trying to start a GSA and I had barely gotten our mission statement, right. And when I was forced to transfer, when I went to this other high school, I found out that it was too late in the semester, and I could not start a GSA. So that was really disappointing to me. But I did attend the first GSA workshop that is held at the Montrose Counseling Center. And I thought that that offered a lot of great information. But I know that Jeremy, who went to the other high school I went to also tried to start a GSA. So you want to talk about what happened there?

And our GSA is 15 minute topic time, which is our first couple of meetings, we write out topics Ticknor box, and for 15 minutes out of our we meet two times a week for an hour, pretty much an hour each time. And we have 15 minutes at a time we do a personal topic, which is sometimes it's sex education, and more than once, you know, but we spend about an hour a month preparing for AIDS Awareness Week, which is we have a bake sale. And we have like said the presentation and we go out, we hand out red ribbons, we take donations and we bring it down as finished in Houston, we did last year raise over three \$300 for them. So it's an effective thing. And like I said, we mostly focus on AIDS, but a lot of the time, we do include other aspects of it. And hopefully we will include that more this year since we didn't really have that much of a chance to last year. But moving along, one of the issues that we have had in our GSAs is talking about being inclusive of all parts of the GLBT community. And I found a lot of the time even in say monitors, we leave out the transgendered part. And one of my good friends is transgender, and she won't know identifies herself as a guy. And that's completely okay with me. But it seems like in our GSA, we tend to leave out the transgender part and not really see that and or promote it. And I've found that that's probably not a good thing to do.
