Gay men are often considered at mid risk for contracting the virus that can cause liver damage and even death. A first of its kind bill passed to the Texas legislature last year sponsored by openly gay State Representative Glenn Maxi aims at bringing the issue of hepatitis C to light by finding out how prevented the virus is in the state, educating people about the risks and making testing available for the virus at AIDS clinic. And the Center for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that there are 60,000 Texas, Texans carry the virus. But that number is extrapolated from national estimates, and is simply not accurate enough, according to Glen Maxine.
