And this letter was written and sent to me it says, As I typed this letter to the readers of TW T I do it in fear that someone I work with might come in and see the reasons for the fear is that I am one of the Houston Police. I had the reasons for one of the fears is that I am at one of the Houston Police Department substations. I listened to the radio program that Mark timmers Did on KPFT. And I laughed with him a lot. But I also cried because I know Mark. I worked with him and felt that he was the one one of the most caring police officers not only for the people of Houston, but for other officers. I know how I felt because I too, am again, police officer. I know of all the troubles Mark had with the police department and how hard he tried at first to hide the fact that he was gay. I then saw Mark just become self and go about his business as a police officer. Other officers seldom insulted mark to his face. But the worst is what I saw what they would say about him behind his back, I would see Mark walk into a row call room and have to sit with him and have to sit by himself. Even though Mark knew what was going on, he kept doing his job better than anyone else I feel. I feel a lot of fear. Mark didn't know what to do. And listen to the advice of one of the attorneys and resigned from the police department. It was sad for me and I don't think the community will ever realize how much they lost and how much it hurt them. I don't know what to do. I'm afraid to do anything because the department feels mark as a criminal. And so to the state. I know better. Mark is not a criminal. He just knew he could never try Is anyone with authority on the Houston Police Department? Because there is no one who cares. It's just the one who wants to stand up and fight that wins. I don't want to say anyway, because I'm not like other the other officers who wrote in the twit, sooner or later,

I will do something. And God only knows they will transfer me or worse yet, fire me too. I have not talked to Mark since he left the department, but I know he will succeed in life. I just wish you were back out on the streets of Houston, watching my back and helping people like me, and helping the people of the city as much as he did. PS to any internal affairs sergeant, you should get a medal on how you scared Mark timmers into not knowing what to do, or trying to talk with you. Maybe there should be a commendation from the chief's office for your Nazi methods. As usual, I will not find this letter, it may not get published. And the editors of TW T will probably not printed, and possibly the readers will not hear it. But in case they do. Thanks for listening to the words of another gay Houston police officer who will help while being in the closet. And that's something that's wonderful. I remember when Mark was on I do.
