And they all three agree that what we need to do is fill the courtyard in front of City Hall with as many people as we can people, families of those who were sent to prison on this evidence that's not credible. And once we have awakened that giant, so to speak, the the attorneys will scramble to get on board, we will file a lawsuit that will make the settlement in Tullio look like a drop in the bucket. And in the interim, they need to either revisit every one of those convictions, retest the drugs involved, or free all those people. And that's my goal. Wow, that's
