Most of them are very graphic and vivid. She also tells about her love for antique furniture and ties it into what happened to the Jews because that's how she acquired most of the furniture. But von Mazar as a crossdresser was a very interesting case, because this was a gay crossdresser, naughty, naughty, and very openly gay. At the end of World War Two, when the West Germans, the Soviets came to power in West Germany, she still remained very open. And I just wanted to read one little passage of here because this, we were talking about guilt and shame on the last show. Now wanted to read this little bit from Charlotte van miles Dorf. She says I never needed to have a coming out. I never worried about who I was. Everything seemed natural. I knew I can't be any other way. Even when the school bullies call me a redheaded goat and pull the hair clips out of my hair. I also had no need to dress up fancy. I still wear a size to a size 12 with small shoulders and estately behind which can fill some things out very well. I prefer gray green darkened sky blue dresses, typical cross dressers you're going to talk about her clothes here. For my 63rd Birthday, birthday bat and Sylvia, the lesbian pair who take care of the museum with me, gave me two peasant skirts that are my great pride. Then she says, but it has always been dangerous to go around the streets dressed as a transvestite. I am glad that during the third right, I was very young, a managed to be spared. Even in the days of the Democratic German Republic, I never fit into any slot. And even today, I know I'm an odd figure to some, I always went my own way, a walk on a narrow Ridge, often with an abyss to the right. And to the left, the endless army of those willing to adapt to a given situation, try to hide behind whatever the circumstances are, and believe them to be inevitable and faded. Better to mistrust, such dubious submission, since it means falling into the hands of the powerful, who like to give their frequently offensive machinations and triumphs, the aura of invincibility. Ah, gosh, this is a gutsy woman.

A month later, the Allies bombed the prison had she been given the cell that she was originally designed for, she would have been dead because the entire wing was bombed to the ground. Instead of her walls, or her prison literally come tumbling down. She walks away. So she never served his sentence, she served about a month and a half of the sentence, the third rise falls, and she falls into the hands of the Soviets. I mean, it's an amazing story. I really would like I want to recommend this book to folks. If you're a crossdresser out there, and you think well, you know, gee, cross dressers, you know, we don't matter this and that this is called I am my own woman. It could be translated as I am my own wife. Depending on how you translate German, yes, her name is Charlotte von maules. Dorothy, this book is available at crossroads and are even in Half Price Books, which is where I got this. And I really want to recommend it. Because if for those of you who think you have transition tough, and you think gee, I can't face one more challenge, read this book, you'll quit feeling sorry for yourself.

I have seen people who did not prepare and then put the families in the position of having to make the decision. And that's really not fair. Not fair either. That it's really not fair.
