with news wrap a summary of some of the news in or affecting the lesbian and gay community for the week ending July 19 1992. In Nicaragua, there's been a delay in the progress towards enactment of what activists have called the most repressive sodomy law in Latin America. The Nicaraguan National Assembly had passed article 205 on June 11. And President Violetta Chamorros deadline for action on it was expected to fall on July 11. In fact, the assembly recessed immediately after voting on the article, and apparently the bill will not be forwarded to show tomorrow until after the legislature reconvenes in early August. Activist now expect to have until late August to lobby Chamorro to veto the bill, which would punish not only gay and lesbian sex acts, but promotion of homosexuality and possibly even cohabitation. Amnesty International, the International lesbian and gay Human Rights Commission and Nicaraguan gay and lesbian rights activists are calling for an international letter writing campaign to pressure Chamorro

19 members of the Japanese organization occurred journey to San Francisco seeking support for its lawsuit against the city of Tokyo, the first lesbian and gay rights case to be heard in a Japanese court. The group had first complained of harrassment during its meetings at a local

youth center. The Tokyo Board of Education responded by denying them meeting space at any youth center. San Francisco Board of Education member Dr. Leland Yee joined openly gay board member Tom Ammiano, openly lesbian San Francisco supervisor Roberta Achtenberg and San Francisco Human Rights Commission director Edwin Lee in writing letters of support.

Over 1000 Lesbians and Gays joined a noisy Pride march in Sydney, Australia. Their June celebration marked not only the anniversary of the New York City Stonewall Rebellion, but also police abuse of marchers in the first Sydney Pride event in 1978, and the passage of persecutory legislation by Nazi Germany in 1935. The March ended with a rally to dedicate the new Stonewall gardens and the planned site of a gay and lesbian Holocaust Memorial. A stop was made along the way at the Tasmanian Tourist Bureau to protest sodomy laws there.

However, the Tasmanian police commissioner has made a strong statement against discrimination in police personnel practices. He said that sexual orientation should be irrelevant to hiring and promotions and that discrimination within the department should be addressed.

The first Euro pride celebration drew an estimated 100,000 gays and lesbians from all over Europe to London late last month.

of America's policy of discrimination against gays and lesbians continues to stir up controversy. Even in the United States Congress. Only a procedural vote prevented Louisiana Republican Clyde Holloway from introducing an amendment to appropriations for the US Treasury and postal service that would have punished three organizations for defunding the scouts. He proposed on the House floor that local United Way chapters protesting the scouts policy, be denied use of the postal system, and that major bankers Wells Fargo and the Bank of America be denied funds in the Federal Reserve System.

On the other side, the Unitarian Universalist Association, which previously had been identified as a chartered organization of the Boy Scouts of America has followed the Union of American Hebrew congregations in denouncing the scouts policy. And the Chicago Council a boy scouts has been placed on probation by the United Way of Chicago and stands to lose about \$700,000 per year 13% of its annual income if the policy isn't changed by mid 1993.

And finally, you may be familiar with Dusty Pruitt's name because of her lawsuit against the US Department of Defense, which dismissed her after six years active duty in the army and nine years in the reserves because she is a lesbian. After that dismissal on grounds of moral dereliction Captain dusty Pruitt became Reverend dusty Pruitt in the gay and lesbian positive Metropolitan Community Church. MCC founder Troy Piri believes it's time for Pruitt to combine her two careers and has submitted her name to the Pentagon for consideration as a military chaplain. Having a chaplain open to gays and lesbians would make all the sense in the world for all the gays and lesbians in the military. He told the press. But could she minister to the heterosexual soldiers? Perry says, I don't see it as any more a problem than a married couple going before a celibate priest. Or as Lily Tomlin told herself in modern scream,

I'm a gay man with AIDS. And if there's any honor and having this disease, it's because it's an honor of being part of the game lesbian community in America.
