Bush caves into the right wing, the right of choices is one i You're not gonna see any give by George Bush on the abortion issue, not just of George Bush giving it into the right wing, but unfortunately of the right wing influence in the Republican Party.

I think we have a good chance of that, but it's some years off. And fortunately, it is further off because of the actions of the governor of the state in which we now sit Pete Wilson. The reason is this if you look at the history in the United States anti discrimination legislation protecting

IS THIS, IF YOU LOOK AT THE HISTORY IN THE UNITED STATES, anti discrimination legislation, protecting women against discrimination, racial minorities, various ethnic groups of various religious groups. In every case, what happened first was that a fairly large number of states passed the law. Only after we had got enough political power on each case to get a dozen or more states, were we able to get the national wealth. So that's for two reasons. First of all, if we don't have the political power within a lot of states, obviously, it's an additive process. You don't have it at the federal level, but to whenever we try to deal with anti discrimination legislation The defenders of the status quo engage in the most outrageous distortion of what will happen if the bill passes. You had this with the Equal Rights Amendment. You had it with the civil rights restoration act, the right wingers, the Jerry foul wells and others engage in conscious distortion because these people may be morally quite unattractive to us, but they're not morons. And you would have to be literally a moron to believe some of the things that they believe, but they get people who aren't paying a lot of attention. And say to them, oh, if you pass this to that end of discrimination law, all these terrible things will happen. What of course happens is that we personated discrimination law. And the major problem is almost always it is under enforced. It is never the case, people can point out very, very few examples of abuses that came from excessive enforcement of anti discrimination laws, we need to get a few of those laws passed in various states, so that we can build up some experience with it. And we can say to them, you know, what you're saying is nonsense, because we've had one in Massachusetts and in Connecticut, and Hawaii and in Wisconsin, and we now have in New Jersey. And if we could have added California, I think most people expected Pete Wilson to sign that bill. He certainly made pro gay and lesbian

what happened they had a Republican state convention in California, in which the dennemeyer people came and I agree that dynamite people can scare the faint hearted. Even people who have an instinct to be pro gay within the Republican Party, find it is very, very difficult. When dynamite talks nonsense, no one in Washington take Bill datumize. Seriously. But when you have P Wilson veto, again, as human rights bill that reverberates that says us damage or the moderate republican governor of Maine, John mckernon, again, a member of the moderate republican wing. And when a gay rights bill was about to pass the Maine legislature, he announced in advance that he would veto it, which led to which being killed because members said well, now why bother with it? And I was very disappointed in that. But it's once again, an example of the end game that has been pressures that reverberate in the Republican Party. And it's why I wrote a book which says to my game has been friends and to feminist friends and people interested in civil rights and others. Yes, I agree, there will be many times in the Democratic candidate will be imperfect, and we should work to make them much better. They may be even not very good. But the key is, when you come down, we'll give an election, who's better and at the presidential level. For all of this past decade, the Democrats on all of these issues have been extremely better than the Republicans. And I guess the question I would pose to some of my friends is, if we don't have enough votes to control the nomination process, then

direct that person, how does forming a third party get us any more votes? I mean, the problem is not mechanical, it is not procedural. It's who's got the votes, and you don't multiply your votes by going to a third party, what you do is divide them. And at least when I took arithmetic, if you didn't have enough, division was not going to get you more, the more committed you are to liberal principles, the more committed you are to be thinking about exactly what kind of compromises what kind of adjustment to reality in this country today is going to best implement them is the point of a third party to feel better, is appointed a third party to go down to defeat with a fairly small number of votes, but in great moral purity. That's a valid purpose to suck and help me.
