So if you are one of those people or you've been out there and been verbally harassed or assaulted or any of a wide range of criminal activities that could be perpetrated against you, give them a call and let them know about it. This information is compiled. It's anonymous and confidential. And numbers are handed to people. I think it's the FBI tentative eventually. And they will use that for deciding whether hate crimes will be, you know, big laws and things like that will be decided with that information. So if you were someone who's been attacked or verbally harassed on the street, give, give the hate crimes hotline, a call at 5299615. There was something else about Oh, yeah. And Cindy, Cindy called Cindy and let us know that she was listening. And she asked for more interviews, which was surprising to me. I thought people wanted more me as she wants more interviews. So Cindy, we'll do what we can. Cindy also asked about Buddy. And I told Cindy what I'm going to tell you, but he has moved on. He's doing other things, other important things.
