And these guys were doing it openly, you know, very public and the judges let them loose. About 10 days ago, a 16 year old boy was acquitted for possession, just recreational possession, because the judge felt that the laws had not been what was the word he said they had been adjusted, but not actually posted before Congress and you know, made into a new law, as had been requested by the the Supreme Court. Gosh. Third one was another medical marijuana situation where the judge let off a gentleman who was a legitimate patient who was driving down the road, when the policeman pulled him over, the man had a joint in his mouth was hitting it as he talked with the cop. The cop therefore arrested him for being under the influence. And yet they could show no basis for the charge because he did not seem incapacitated. And it was more just a jihad by the cop. And the judge, let him go. And just yesterday, a court ruled that the excuse me the Canadian marijuana laws were unconstitutional. And let another man go.
