And the nice thing is about that, as it gives the actors and the audience a real level of communication. That's not possible. And, you know, some of these gargantuan venues, and I think, in a show, like the last session that that connection with the audience is really important and imperative. This is a very interesting show. It's a comedy, but it's a comedy, basically about a guy who's probably tired of life, and has basically chosen to end his life. And he's a musician. Music is his whole life. He was a gospel singer, and then he started producing people's music. And as a tribute or legacy really, he decides to bring all of his friends together for a last recording session, hence the name of the show the last session. Well, during the session during the recording session of his own works, that he's composed, his friends find out what has happened. And they essentially during the course of the show, convinced him not to do it. So it's a it's a show with kind of a dark beginning but definitely on up to uplifting show and Anna comedy at that strange as it sounds.

One of the beneficial things about this piece is that each character is given opportunity to develop and mature and change through the show and specifically in the case of the, the the youngest character in the show, buddy, he he you see kind of a catharsis or a metamorphosis that happens to him, he comes into the recording session, idolizing the character, Gideon was a Gideon was a gentleman that he looked up to, you know, as a young fundamentalist Christian musician. He later finds out that Gideon is not only gay with HIV positive, and and this this gentleman who is really kind of from a backwoods type of environment, really has to think about what does that mean to him? And what are the labels that are that we put on people?

And there's a song in the show called connected. And it talks about how we are connected to each other. And what happens in that process. And one of the great things you see is even though the lead in

the show is a gay man, he has this whole kind of rainbow of friends literally that come from different backgrounds, each of their backgrounds is explored during the show. And their relationship to this gentleman is is

So he's the, the totally green boy that has no idea what he's walked into, because we have Gideon who's the lead in lead in the show who's the gay HIV positive man, we have Trisha, who's a woman of color and a mother, played by Regina Hearn who has an incredible voice. And we have the other next character is a woman named Vicki who was actually married to Gideon, as a youngster in an earlier life. And now is, is kind of, you know, somebody that that takes care of him. She's a wild woman, and a real a real rocket. And so this unsuspecting kind of Baba comes into this situation, totally unaware of these personalities. So not only does he have to deal with Gideon, and his lifestyle, he has to deal with all these other people he's probably never come into before. And a lot of this hinges on his change and and the, the way you see him really look at things differently from the beginning of the show to the end, and he actually sings the show is very well structured and that it starts out with an ensemble number there are two big ensemble numbers one at the beginning and one at the end of the show. But this young fundamentalist Christian during the course of the recording session, sings what is really the only love to it in the whole show. And he sings it with Rick with Gideon with the other man. So here's a guy you know from backwoods Texas, that is is all of a sudden thrown into Hollywood and thrown into the midst of all these people and he sings what is really the true love to wet in the piece and one of the highlights of the piece. Well, this show is currently running in LA to just rave reviews and it won the GLAAD award for best gauge dramatic effort. It's a show that really is not about a specific subject really the the subject of this of Gideon and his plan suicide is really just a springboard for a whole host of other things and other emotions and through the piece we really get to know the characters and what they're about and what they think and you know what their attitudes are about life, about sexuality, about religion about there's a little bit of discussion. It's, it's termed in the show a theological chess game. You know, you have basically two preachers, kids quoting Bible verses at each other. It's a little bit like a, you know, a biblical contest. And so a lot of these dueling Bibles. Exactly, exactly a lot of these issues are all mixed in with this. So this isn't just one narrowly focused topic and, and the the last number is, is really uplifting because it's a number actually that the young fundamentalist Christian, he brought the tape to his idol and said, Would you be would you play this? And would you listen to this piece of music for me, and they ended up the show with that piece of music. So that kid has come full circle in the in the course of the two hours.
