Members of a special panel formed in January to investigate rentals food markets employment discrimination policy, and to negotiate with the company for inclusion of gaze net policy announced Monday that on April 5, a meeting with rentals to top officers with 90 to 95% successful. At that meeting the father and son team of Robert and Randall Armstead, the grocers, Chief Executive Officer and President presented a letter to the committee members stating that sexual orientation and aids are included among protected groups and the company's written anti discrimination policy. The representatives of the grocery chain insisted this week the statements did not represent a change in policy, and the meeting and letter were merely for clarification and community assurance. The discrimination policy in effect has always covered gays, lesbians and people with AIDS or random spokesperson said. Additionally, the unsteady told the committee that an AIDS policy had been included in the company's recently printed employee handbook. Randall Onstad, reportedly posted on presenting the handbook, quote, I believe were the first to do this unquote. Although the group said at the conference, the inclusion was new Randles public relations director Rebecca link house stated Tuesday that identical information was included in the 1989 handbook and that employee education attempts regarding aid had been ongoing since April of last year. Houston gay and lesbian Political Caucus officially called off its shop elsewhere campaign against brambles at the group's regular meeting Wednesday, April 18. Despite an impassioned plea from Phyllis Frey, who noted that the letter submitted by Randles corporate office assuring that the company's non discrimination policy covers sexual orientation made no mention of transgender roles only five members of the motion meeting voted against motion. Also the Houston gay and lesbian political caucuses third annual a tisket a tasket Food Drive held Saturday April 14 at Mary's raise 2418 in cash and then estimated \$8,916 in goods for stone soup food pantry. Easter food drive. Also an official AIDS Foundation Houston event was the most successful since HGL. PC started three years ago. The goods value is based on an average 90 cents per unit, with a total of 9090 units collected. At a general meeting Tuesday night the action on AIDS coalition voted to continue actions against the health care plan proposed by the Greater Houston AIDS Alliance. co chair Scott symptom thanked and congratulated everyone who participated in April 5 administration during the Alliance's meeting at the Thomas street clinics. Though the group will not formally pick up the Alliance at the next meeting, they will attend the meeting to voice opposition. Eugene Harrington president of the age equity league addressed the group of plans for further collaboration against the Alliance's plan. The age equity league

will work in the boardrooms and behind the scenes with action on a toward the front lines. David Fowler, director of the local chapter of cure AIDS now gave a report on the international march to cure AIDS now that will take place during the economic summit on July 8. Fowler stressed at the March is not a protest, but a means of directing the international media and world leaders attention to the AIDS crisis and will include participation from all communities. Action on aid and cooperation with a Miami based security it's now organization will be the sponsors of the event. At the first of a series of issues luncheons to be held in his 18th congressional district in Houston, US Representative Craig Washington announced his co sponsorship of HR 655, the gay and lesbian civil rights bill. Representatives of several local and statewide gay and lesbian organizations attended the lunch conference organized by Margie Harris issues Chair of Washington's Houston staff. During his speech, Washington urged gays to also support hr 4000, the civil rights restoration act and education initiatives. Washington was introduced by Linda Morales, A plaintiff in the Texas human rights Foundation's court challenge 2106 to Texas sodomy statute. The lunch was held at Texas Southern University on Thursday, February 12. The House of Representatives gay and lesbian civil rights bill was introduced by New York Democratic Representative Ted Weiss on January 24 1989. It would amend existing civil rights legislation shouldn't add affectional and sexual preference to the list of protected categories such as race, color and religion. The bill would affect sections covering employment, housing, public facilities and accommodations and federally assisted programs. A Senate version identical to the House bill S. 47, was introduced January 25 1989, by Senator Alan Cranston, Democrat California.
