Chapter 10 It's not illegal to be gay. Before detailing the general legal position of both young and gay people. We want to stress that a very small percentage of either group has trouble with the law. There are teenagers and reformatories and gays in jails. But most are there for specific crimes. They are not in prison only for being young or being gay. The vast majority of teenagers and gays of all ages will never have legal problems. Nevertheless, there are laws about sexual behavior. And many, many people think that homosexuals themselves are somehow illegal. Let's look at what is actually going on. When we refer to the law, we will almost always be referring According to state laws, the federal government has passed very few regulations specifically about youth or sexuality. State laws vary tremendously. So we will be speaking of the general kinds of legislation in force today. If you need to know the exact law in your area, ask a knowledgeable person. There are now legal clinics or legal aid societies in most cities, which could help you for minimal charge, you might consider the American Civil Liberties Union, which has chapters in many cities. Another possible source of information is the referral service run by most County Bar Association's in the eyes of the law, young people are distinguished from adults by whether or not they have reached the age of majority. This legal majority is rarely the same as the voting age or age at which drinking is legal. In most states, it is 18 But in some states, it is 16 or 17. This distinction between minors and adults is important. Adults are subjected to penal code in the regular court system. Juveniles are judged according to special codes, or a separate juvenile justice system. Laws for adults involves punishment for specific offenses, while the basis of the system for juveniles is rehabilitation. Theoretically, this difference isn't that is an advantage for young people. Usually, they are shunned special consideration and segregated from adult criminals. Nevertheless, since most states have a category of juvenile law, called status offenses, young gays may encounter special problems not faced by adult gays. For adults to become involved with the law, they must be reasonably suspected of having done something The law forbids. They cannot be arrested simply because of who or what they are. Juveniles however, can be involved with the law by appearing to be in need of supervision. This vague phrase is often defined by terms like incorrigible beyond control or habitually disobedient. These laws are under attack in many states, because they are so poorly defined and could be interpreted unfairly. However, they are still considered constitutional because of the intended rehabilitative rather than peel nature of juvenile law. Many people have the power to ask a court to declare a young person in need of supervision, police, school officials, parents and guardians. Police officers can arrest a young person on grounds as brought as being and surrounding surroundings which endanger health or welfare. Young gays rarely face legal action for their gayness alone. But for young people having trouble in school or with their parents, their gayness may be considered and important, usually negative factor in a court's decision. There are also juvenile legal codes in most states. These are lists of specific things you must not do. There are curfew laws, laws against loitering laws, which prohibit the purchase or possession of alcohol, marijuana or pornography. These apply to all teenagers. But like similar adult laws, they may be used selectively to harass gays, for example, until recently, any material about homosexuality might have been considered pornographic. Violations of these codes in turn, may be used as evidence that supervision is needed. If you become involved with the juvenile justice system, you have many of the same legal rights that adults have. These include formal notices of your rights if you are arrested, and protection against unreasonable searches and seizures. You also have the right to an attorney

who will be appointed to you by the court if you or your parents cannot afford one. However, some lawyers themselves can be a problem for young people. An attorney will not necessarily represent you in the manner you wish while she or he is charged with serving your best interests. The whole philosophy of the juvenile court system is that young people often are not mature enough to know what their best interests are. An attorney hired by a young person's parents may represent their point of view, especially in a case involving gayness. Parents' ideas may be different from the juveniles' own view. You would have the right under such circumstances to petition the court to appoint a new lawyer. But this is not always successful. A young person can be judged delinquent, or in need of supervision, after either a court hearing or informal and formal proceedings. The judge and various juvenile officers then create a plan for rehabilitation. They may simply prohibit certain activities or companions may be prohibited. Some specific treatment such as counseling may be prescribed. Some young people have been forced to undergo psychiatric counseling. Courts cannot require church or synagogue attendance. Due to the doctrine of religious freedom. It is perfectly legal however, for parents to require a son or daughter to attend. A young person may be committed to a juvenile home or detention center, if judged in need of more stringent supervision or if the probation terms are broken. In most, but not all states. There are restrictions against putting young people in adult institutions, the length of the sentence is usually indeterminate. That means a young person may be kept there as long as the court considers necessary, or until that person reaches the age of majority. The juvenile court may also order commitment to a mental hospital, that this was always a rare event, and now is almost never done in many states, and mental health law requires a separate hearing and finding of mental disability for this to occur. Simply being gay is rarely considered sufficient cause for hospital commitment today. Juvenile court proceedings are not criminal and juvenile court records should be confidential. However, many states do not strictly control access to juvenile records. An employer may sometimes ask if a potential employee has a juvenile record. Occasionally, such a record may be obtained. The situation for adult gays is much better than for minors. Being gay will not involve an adult with the law. Gay men and lesbians have all the same rights of free association and free speech as other Americans, gay organizations may be legally formed for any lawful purpose from starting a softball league to starting a gay rights group. By the way, did you know that organizing to change the law is a lawful purpose. It is and it is one of our most important rights. The right to Association includes gay student organizations and state universities and in public high schools. This means that gay student groups are entitled to the same privileges and services as all other Association student associations in that school. However, there have been some legal cases contesting this issue in several states. In general, any organization has the right to keep its membership lists confidential, that this is not an absolute guarantee. A sufficiently compelling state interest may require disclosure of a group's members' names. This was done in many groups in the 1950s when the government was looking everywhere for communists. If such government attitude ever returned, gay groups could be investigated. Unfortunately, lesbians and gays are not protected from a reaction to their exercising their rights of free speech and association. You cannot be sent to jail because you're openly gay, but you may lose your job or be turned down for an apartment. This is because it is still legal for employers and landlords to discriminate against gays, except in a few cities, which include gay people in our equal opportunity statutes. The government generally accepts the responsibility to treat all citizens fairly without discrimination against any group. This has not always been true in practice. It has been required that government employees be in good health and have good moral character, and being gay was sometimes considered proof of poor moral character. With this has been challenged by gay government workers, the courts have generally ruled that gayness alone is not cause for dismissal. One ironic provision in the armed services and Federal Intelligence agencies was that gays could not be given security clearances, because they can

be blackmailed about their homosexuality. But if a gay man or woman is out of the closet, how can they be blackmailed about what everyone knows? The courts have finally realized that such security policies make no sense. And I've said that gayness alone cannot be used as a reason for denying clearance. Gays, however, are still fighting legal battles to remain on active duty in the armed forces. We want to emphasize that most gay women and men do find jobs and apartments. Gays find employment and housing with more, no more trouble than anyone else simply because gays look and act like everyone else. It may be more difficult for gay activists, but even they are virtually all working and certainly have all living in houses or apartments. Another type of civil law affecting gay people is that defining divorce and child custody gay fathers and lesbian mothers have never been shown by any study or survey to be bad parents. But courts and judges rarely treat them as they would straight parents. Although heterosexual mothers are allowed to keep their children almost without exception when they request custody. The reverse has been true for lesbians. Their children have been placed in foster homes instead of being allowed to stay with them. This situation is gradually changing. But in the meantime, many children teenagers and parents are cruelly separated by prejudiced judgments, which may deny custody or severely limit visiting rights to a gay parent. There are three kinds of criminal laws which gays may encounter. Two of these or two of these solicitation and loitering are very vague, although they can be applied to almost every one anywhere. In practice. These are occasionally used to harass gay men in cruising areas where they're trying to meet other gays. The third category is sexual conduct laws. These statutes which prohibit oral and anal sex, even in private between consenting adults, or applicant applets, are actually applicable to heterosexual as well as gays. However, they are considered to apply primarily to homosexuals. While many heterosexual couples perform these legally outlawed unnatural acts without any fear of proceeds of prosecution, or conviction on any of these criminal charges can be considered evidence of moral turpitude. This in turn can be the basis for denying or revoking a person's professional license. This does not mean that you cannot or should not enter a licensed profession if you're gay. It merely means that until such laws are changed, gays must be more discreet than their straight coworkers. It is illegal for any adult to have sex with a minor. Technically, this code could prohibits relations between an 18 year old boy and a 17 year old girl. But this is not the intent of the law. Rather, statutes, which prohibits sexual intercourse between an adult and a minor are designed to punish child molesters. child molestation is considered one of the most despicable crimes, even by other criminals in prison. Heterosexuals are much more frequently guilty of this crime than are homosexuals. Nevertheless, newspaper headlines and TV news programs often refer to criminals homosexuality, as if this had something to do with a case. While a straight offenders sexual orientation is not considered the the cause of their act. If anything, adult gays tend to avoid any social contact with minors because of the possibility of being charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor. To sum up, you have no reason to be afraid of the law, the courts or the police. There are statutes governing the conduct of minors, and the sexual behavior of adults. However, these are not designed to to punish responsible young or gay people. If you have specific code Questions. Or if you have, if you have a legal problem, try to obtain good legal services.
