And I'm Art Tomaszewski. Pressure from Australia's gay movement is continuing to liberalize the country's sexual offences law. The state of Victoria has decriminalized homosexual acts between consenting males and lowered the age of consent to 10 years. As long as there is no more than two years difference in the partners age based reality is the only net unnatural offense now remaining in the state criminal code. In the Northern Territory, the government has introduced legislation which would repeal all homosexual offensive laws, which would establish 13 as the age of consent. The proposed changes are supported by both the government and opposition and are expected to pass without incident. A similar move toward reform was blocked in New South Wales 800 gays and lesbians demonstrated angrily outside the parliament buildings when the government refused a free vote on a private member's bill, which sought to amend new sexual assault legislation. In New South Wales. There is a seven year maximum sentence for forced buggery, while consensual buggery can incur a maximum sentence of 14 years.

In Paris, the socialist government of Francois Mitterrand granted an amnesty August 6 256 gay men in prison under laws which singled out homosexuals for a special punishment under public decency and age of consent laws. The new government will probably repeal the last of these discriminatory sections of the criminal code in the current setting of the legislature. The government also moved June 11 to dissolve the homeless squad of the National Police is subsequent directive from the minister of the state to the Director General of the national police described and unacceptable as unacceptable any discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation in the course of investigation. The reforms initiated by the socialists have provoked new kinds of a crisis for the French gay movement. Michael storms a psychologist at the University of Kansas, has conducted a survey and found that homosexual men are not less masculine, and lesbians are no less feminine than their heterosexual counterparts. Storms sample consisted of students and undergraduate psychology class, as well as members of gay organizations on campus. The wrist residents included 107 heterosexual men and women 35 gay men, 19 gay women, nine bisexual men and 15 bisexual women, respondents were asked to choose an overall label describing their own sexual preference, masculinity and femme Nitti were determined by asking students to rate themselves on personality attributes. The Senate gay rights bill was introduced October 6, with a healthy increase in the number of co sponsors. Seven senators up from the previous four signed on including Paul Tsongas, Democrat from Massachusetts, as chief sponsor. New on the bill, our Edward Kennedy, Democrat from Massachusetts fulfilling a pledge he made during last year's presidential campaign also are Alan Cranston, Democrat from California and Daniel Uyen way from Hawaii. The seven co sponsors represent considerable clout in the Senate and their political parties. Cranston was considered one of the most outstanding members of the Senate is really willing to endorse lost causes. Moynihan, who, who has held appointments in both Republican and Democratic administrations is frequently linked to the

more conservative wing of the Democratic Party. In the current Congress, the importance of the bill may well be the names attached to it, rather than the chance for passage which is removed.

A survey by two professors at the University of Texas at Arlington shows the Moral Majority is in the minority as far as the citizens of Dallas and Fort Worth are concerned. A total of 771 households in 10, Metroplex cities were questioned to gather opinions on the conservative religious group founded by Jerry Falwell. The poll was conducted by students and supervised by sociologists, and Tony Shoop and Bill Stasi, of those surveyed 28 and a half percent said they didn't support the religious organization, and nearly half said they were indifferent. A meager 14% supported the Moral Majority. Both sociologists said they considered their survey, an acid test of Falwell support. Quote, if you can't find it in the Bible Belt, it's doubtful you can find it in the north. They wrote in their report.

Chicago police recruits who attend orientation sessions on gay and lesbian issues are giving those sessions high marks more than 94% of the recruits present at sessions August 17 18th. And 19 responded positively 24% said very good and 40 42% said Good. Less than 6% responded negatively to pours and two very pours. All recruits who graduated from the Chicago Police Training Academy are required to attend one of the 15 minute sessions, which are held for a new class of recruits in September and October. Presentations include a question and answer period and whenever possible are led by gay men and lesbian. These sessions are a joint effort of gay horizons, the city's gay Social Service Agency and the Illinois Gay and Lesbian Task Force a statewide lobbying group.
