And I have been brought on three committees, which is the Personnel Committee, disease control committee and public health or public promote promotion committee. And in all three of those committees, you have a lot, a lot of power to introduce a lot of good ideas. And as well as having 5000 employees underneath you that when you ask for information or data research, they come and give it to you. But what happens here is basically I can start I've been studying the educational system, the Board of Health Rights curriculum for the health, High School. I'm looking at getting homosexuality introduced into the health classes, I'm looking at the feasibility of getting it into the educational system as early as first grade. We're talking about that working a lot on HIV and the special issues they are because the state gives a lot of money and a lot of the federal money comes to the state. So I'm very involved in that very involved minority issues, overall, the equal opportunity, or officers that we have on our campus of the Board of Health, I think there's been some problems there. In discriminating against people of color, and all minorities. So I've become really active in that. It's just so much to be active environment. I mean, I, you know, what's going on a Whole Foods with coke with taking some of their vitamins. I have to get involved in all that. It's to get tested now, find out what your T cells are now, I went to a conference today Dr. Rios this conference, Houston's AIDS Conference, which great news on a combination therapy early early like it's 700 T cells, you're going to live much longer if you start and you find out early, you're HIV positive and start these medications. And it's really exciting. As far as early intervention stuff is really neat. Body Positive is for that and maintaining health before you get sick. That's what it was there.
