And when you also read about all these pogroms and whatnot that they had brought against the Jews throughout Europe, if you take the word Jew out of there and insert the word, gay or homosexual, you've got exactly what the political and religious right of today are saying about us. Oh, and it is so god awful scary.

That was rampant in those camps. But a few were kept for posterity. And these few and even the fewer triangles, pink triangles, but you also see in their big you have videos being played, that were shot during World War during the Nazi era. videos shot by the Nazis showing the actual persecutions No, really. You see the dead bodies, and you see the ovens and you see all that memorabilia, you see? Diaries, and wow, that people had captain. Of course, you see the German uniforms?

Yeah. I'd heard that. They also had interviews with camp survivors. Yes, that's on video.

Right. You have the day that I was in there. Not all the bugs were worked out. Oh, I say okay. And they had a little bit of technical difficulties with it. But I'm sure by now the bugs have been worked.

It's interesting. I've I've read quite a few articles on the opening of the Holocaust Museum, and several of them had interviews with camp survivors who Houstonian camp survivors. Yeah, yes, that's right. And it one struck me. It was because all of the interviews there was like a half a dozen interviews with different people. And in each interview, they talked about the person who was in the camp. And then they talked about that person's family, either spouse or children, and all of that, except for one man. They never talked about his spouse. Right. And then they showed a picture of him when he was about six months after he got out of the camp. And he posed for a picture in the camp uniform. And I don't know, maybe it's just me, but he looks pretty gay to me. So I'm thinking that, that we do have definitely have have a gay voice in the Holocaust Museum.

And I can tell you that that's that's underestimated because only a fraction of those get reported. Right. And there are two problems in Houston that I can tell you about. First of all, if an incident has anything, first of all, an incident to be characterized as a hate crime, when gays are involved has to be the person has to say derogatory terms and do whatever Yes. Now if there's a robbery involved, then it's considered a robbery. It's not considered a hate crime.

Right. And but there's also another problem in this in these in these numbers as well.

The other problem is reporting. Right and I know in Houston you can report that to the hate crimes hot line, but hardly anybody knows that. And they certainly don't know the number and the hate crimes hotline doesn't have the money to advertise. Now, Q patrol will let you know, to report a hate crime to the hate crimes hotline, and that's at 5299615. But we just we just don't have the money to advertise it enough.

And then there's another problem with that, too. Yeah, that many victims, gay and victims of gay bashing. Gay hate. They don't want to report it. They don't want to report it because there is a lot of internalized homophobia within our gay community. People think well, I deserved it. And I'm saying that it was something that I did

That's like being a certified public accountant. Oh, this is the designation that will follow me for the rest of my life. Oh, and so

And one of the best places to have sex. I mean, if you're gonna have a lot of sex, and if you're gonna have promiscuous sex

or sex with people you don't know very well, one of the best places, is that the tubs, right? For a lot of reasons. Number one, it's clean environment. Number two, there's lots of condoms and safe sex information around and let's say and the fact that after hours got a plug in the Midtown journal news. Oh, we did? Yes. Oh, yeah. Midtown spa puts out a journal every month. And they gave us a little plug. After hours, a weekly program that provides news interviews and music for the gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered community airs on 90.1 FM. The show was entertaining and the topics are enlightening. We encourage you this is to support KPFT in their endeavors, for they provide a community service that is beneficial to our community as a whole. Not nice. Oh, that's

But to some disappointed young people, the report and its medium fanfare were just more government talk and no action. They're saying that the report really isn't doing something for the youths. And there is a need for accountability. And we've got to have sex education of some sort. In the schools and yet the religious right fights the school boards. And they fight the AIDS foundation from presenting this sorely needed information. They they keep saying that what we need to do is just teach them abstinence. Well, I got news for you out there and radio land. I am 45 Ever since I first started attending public school that I can remember back in the 50s. Abstinence was taught and it didn't stop us then. And it's not stopping us. Now.

I don't understand it. Weren't these people ever 15 or 16 years old and have raging hormones?

Oh, they probably did. But it was all right for them. And you know, Jim, I remember you and I were talking a few months back how that we were Jim and I were talking off the air back how that I know this thing is gonna we were talking about AIDS. And I said, I know this thing is really going to explode on the, in the high schools in the junior high schools age bracket, because there's so many of these young women that are getting pregnant. Now women do not get pregnant by themselves. That just doesn't happen. You need another guy. Yes, you need a

guide to get a woman pregnant. And if a guy is having sex with a woman, he's having unprotected sex and with such a high rate of children having children. There's got to be a corresponding one I rate of not just aids but other STDs. Sure, sure. There's got to be, and don't tell me that it's not. And don't tell me that abstinence. I'm not gonna give you the name of the school I went to, but I went to a private Roman Catholic boarding school. I had more sex and that Roman Catholic boarding school than I ever had ever tops. And it wasn't just, in fact, I was voted by the powers that be in that Roman Catholic boarding school when I was a teenager. Yes, I was voted as one of the 10 best kids in that school. I want to say some my grades weren't that great. My Grades and that kind of board of schools see these a couple
