There are reports from several sources that in separate incidents Iranian authorities recently arrested almost 100 gay men and executed to a private party celebrating the wedding of two young gay men was raided in late August, leading to the arrest of the couple and 90 guests. The couple was charged with committing a homosexual act in public. The Stockholm reporter give citations from the Iranian penal code that intimate acts other than sodomy between men or women can be punished with flogging or execution. In another report, a university professor charged with sodomy was executed in early August, a physician identified as Ali mozaffarian of Shiraz was reportedly executed for homosexuality later that month.

There's additional scientific research supporting a genetic component to homosexuality. Science News recently reported a study of lesbians and they're twins performed by doctors Richard Pillard and Michael Bailey. 115 pairs of lesbians and they're identical or fraternal twins were interviewed along with a control group of lesbians with adopted sisters. follow up interviews with other family members generally confirmed the women's own statements about their sexual orientation. The study found that about half of the identical twins of self identified lesbians were all So either lesbian or bisexual, compared to about 1/4 of the fraternal twins, and 1/6 of the adopted sisters. The researchers project that genetics accounts for about half of differences in sexual orientation.

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Researcher Dean Hamer has reported preliminary results of an ongoing genetic study of sexual orientation at the US National Institutes of Health. family trees have been developed for 250 families in a study which will ultimately involve 400. Although Hamer downplays the early results, he reports that gay and lesbian children seem more likely to have a gay or lesbian among their immediate relatives than among more distant relatives suggesting a genetic component. Also that lesbians seem more likely to have lesbian sisters than gay brothers, while gay men seem more likely to have gay brothers than lesbian sisters. And the gay and lesbian relatives seem to appear more on the mother's side of the family, suggesting the X chromosome might be involved.

two executive orders signed by Republican Governor William weld made Massachusetts the first state to recognize domestic partnerships. Although the orders apply equally to heterosexual and same gender couples, well chose to sign them at a meeting of lesbian and gay professionals, where he delivered a strongly supportive speech. About 150 inmates with HIV or AIDS have ended their strike at the state prison in Vacaville, California after a week of protests. The prisoners had been refusing to take their medication to call attention to insensitive and inadequate medical care after facility. They were joined in demonstrations of support by members of Act Up San Francisco. Michael Nicolay has the latest.

The quiet suburban community of Vacaville abuts against the barbed wire and closure of the row upon row of white block buildings at the state's main prison medical facility. But nearby residents came out for a taste of some act of activism at the front gates. Under Attack, what do we do? About a dozen HIV positive inmates have died there during the past month, Helen of ACT UP read a letter written by JT child before his death at Vacaville last week from AIDS. I'm writing this letter because I feel that we are no longer getting quality care from the medical staff who show indifference and no compassion at all. We had excellent doctors Mesa net diamond and Clark who all left because they were limited in practicing their skills as a specialist. We now have substandard medical care, and we have been transferred to a unit with no electric power. Inmates are being sent back to the unit in worse shape than when they went to the hospital. There is little or no precautionary medical care, and the doctors are very confrontational. I personally think they are stressing us out so bad that more people getting sick faster. Learn spring, several aids physicians left because they couldn't deal with the resistance they constantly met from the prison bureaucracy. Jan diamond is a part time doctor who's trying to fill the prisoners needs the biggest problem is that they need more aid competent positions. And they do not have adequate social worker services. They need a social worker who will adequate discharge planning. And we'll think ahead of time if you don't arrange for disabled patients to have the Social Security range before they get out of prison as soon as they get out to come right back. But diamond sees some hope on the horizon. The Vacaville facility has just hired a new medical director Dr. Ray Andreassen, who she says could turn this prison health tragedy around. Protesters accused city police of harassment and brutality in the city's predominantly gay Castro district during a police sweep after an October 1989 rally. 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Congress often makes decisions without realizing the full impact of what they're doing. I think that's what happened in this case, rather than them actually making a political priority of children over adults.



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But William Freeman of the National Association of people with AIDS sees it differently. Freeman says it's easier for Congress to fund children's research because children get more sympathy than gay men and IV drug users



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with heartstrings they can be pulled in special ways with kids. We hate to see children who are suffering. Secondly, though, particularly in HIV disease, repositions kids as quote unquote innocent victims, everyone with HIV disease is innocent.



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The National Institutes of Health have cut back virtually every adult aids clinical trial in the country to meet the congressional target for Pediatric AIDS spending.
